MEET THE COACH Robert H. Whittaker, in fielding his 1947 Falcon eleven, is starting his seventh season as head football coach at Bowling Green State University. The 43-year old Whittaker joined the Bowling Green athletic staff in February, 1941, after compiling one of the most impressive high school records in the state at Sandusky high school. Bob served one year, 1929, as assistant coach before taking over the head man position. From 1932 to 1936 the Blue Streaks won 38 consecutive games -- five more than amassed at Massillon high school by the renown Paul Brown. The teams in 1931, 1933, 1934, 1935 and 1938 were undefeated. At Bowling Green Whittaker has led the Falcons to 32 victories, 15 losses, and 3 ties. In his initial season, 1941, the Falcons enjoyed one of the best seasons with seven wins against one defeat and a tie. Whittaker was nominated as a candidate from Ohio for the "Coach of the Year" award at the end of the season. During the war years Whittaker pieced together some teams composed of Navy V-12 students and a few civilians but he always finished the season above the .500 mark. Born in Greenville, O., Bob attended high school at Lorain and Norwalk, taking part in four years of football. At Miami University he played halfback where his teammate was Paul Brown, the Cleveland Browns' coach and general manager. Whittaker also took part in track at the Oxford school running the dashes and throwing the javelin to a college record. He worked his way through Miami firing furnaces and waiting table, filling in with summer employment by working on -3-

the state highway and carrying ice. In 1929 he was graduated from Miami with a degree of bachelor of science in education. He took graduate work at Ohio State but received his masters degree from Bowling Green State University in 1942. Bob is medium build weighing 164, the same as when in high school, has brown hair and blue eyes. He is married and has two daughters. Jean, 16, and Joan, 14. He acquired the nickname "The Bear" by his boys soon after coming to Bowling Green and it still carries. With sailboating as his chief hobby, Bob maintains a summer home on Put-In-Bay island on Lake Erie. He participates in the Inter-Lake Regatta every year, winning the top honors in 1940, 1941 and 1943. In the winter he enjoys ice skating and skiing. He also likes handball. Whittaker is noted for turning out teams that are always in good physical condition. A phrase which can always be found in his opening talk with the candidates is "if we aren't the best team on the field we will be the best conditioned team out there." And they usually are. AND HERE ARE THE ASSISTANTS George Muellich has been one of Whittaker's assistants for all of the six years that the former Sanduskian has been at the Bowling Green helm. In 1941 while still teaching at Toledo Macomber, Muellich drove down each afternoon to handle the duties of assistant line coach. The next year he joined the staff on a permanent basis and as Whittaker's chief aide handles the linemen, making all game substitutions. George is among the outstanding athletes turned out by Toledo Waite. He played three years of football and basketball besides doubling in baseball and track. After his successful career at Waite, he entered Michigan Normal where he starred as an end in football and all-conference guard on the Ypsilanti quintet. Graduating in 1931, Muellich found himself back at his alma mater, Waite, as assistant coach in football and basketball. In the latter sport he was helping his present boss, Harold Anderson, BG's athletic director, who was then pacing Waite with some good cage teams. Muellich switched to the assistant's job at Toledo Scott for two years but returned to Waite in 1934 to take over the head basketball job and assist on the gridiron. In 1938 he moved to Toledo Macomber as chief cage mentor and developed some outstanding teams in the next four years. In the winter George helps Anderson with the Bee Gee cage team and teaches in the health and physical education department. -5-

Fred Marsh not only handles the Falcon freshman eleven but helps with the varsity linemen and does a good share of the football scouting. Fred is at home in Bowling Green where he starred with the local high school eleven as guard, being named on the all-sectional squad in his senior year. He captained the basketball team from a guard post and also gained district honors. Upon graduating in 1928 Fred entered Denison College where he performed for two years on the Big Red gridiron but returned to the hometown university to finish his education. As a member of the Falcon pigskin squad, he was selected as an all-Northwest conference guard for two years. He is still considered one of the best guards ever to wear the Orange and Brown. On the Bee Gee court squad he played a guard for a pair of seasons, With his degree in education conferred in 1933, he served one year as Falcon freshman coach before joining the Bee Gee high school staff as assistant football and basketball mentor. After 6 years in this capacity, during which time he acquired a masters from Columbia University, Fred returned to the university in 1940 as freshman football and basketball coach and varsity golf chief. In 1942 he was commissioned a lieutenant in the Navy's physical education program serving four years at Georgia Pre-Flight, Norfolf Naval Air Base, and the Norman and Ottumwa Naval Air Stations. He was discharged a year ago as a lieutenant commander and rejoined the staff in his old position. -6-

James Whittaker is the head coach's younger brother, who as the staff's student assistant aids Marsh with the freshman squad and gives polish to the varsity backs. Jim starred on the 1935 Sandusky squad as brother Bob's prize quarterback. He was also a Blue Streak track star, taking runnerup honors in the state Class A pole vault in 1935 and 1936, with his brother Don in first place. After graduating in 1936, he spent one year at Ohio State, taking part in freshman track but left the Columbus institution for a sales position. World War II found him serving 48 months as a Army first sergeant with overseas duty in the Phillipines. He decided to finish his schooling at Bowling Green last year and is now a junior in the college of education, preparing for a coaching career. Jim is eligible for varsity competition but is susceptible to service-incurred malaria attacks so restricts his participation to track. At 29 he is the outstanding collegiate pole vaulter in Ohio, taking this honor at the Ohio College meet last June. SEASON PROSPECTS Without a doubt, the 10-game schedule facing the BG eleven is the stiffest grid slate any Falcon team has attempted. Two opponents, Iowa State Teachers and William and Mary, are new foes, adding some intersectional flavor to the bill which includes six Ohio universities and one college each from Michigan and New York. Last season Whittaker fielded one of the best defensive elevens in the midwest as they won five of eight outings. -7-

The Falcon's offensive threat wasn't up to the usual Whittaker par as the team lacked a broken field runner and the backfield candidates for the most part were inexperienced in college play. Looking to this season, Whittaker finds three tackles and two ends left via graduation so line coach Muellich has a building job at these spots. One letterman is among the tackle group with several newcomers and reserves in line for the other post. Co-captain Jim Knierim, who played an end in 1945, will return to the wing post after a year in the backfield. The guard situation is more heartening with five lettermen on hand. Co-captain Wayne Bloker will handle the center tasks but good reserves are lacking. This season the backfield should function with more finese and show , more scoring punch. Only five men were lost from the '46 backs and with the experience gained, a good deal of improvement should be seen over last season. All-Ohio Max Minnich will lead the ball carrying troupe. THE STYLE OF PLAY The Falcons running attack this season will feature the balanced "T" with a few Whittaker variations and the short punt. Whittaker used the latter setup to much success at Sandusky but this will be his initial attempt to employ it against college competition. The forward pass offense with two excellent passers, Russ Maples and Ennis Walker, both throwing them from the signal callers spot, should add a sparkling flavor to the Falcon game. With excellent runners like Minnich, Tom Inman, and Jack Woodland, the Bowling Green running attack will display more deception and plenty of power. -8-

Was a mainstay on the 1942 eleven and then saw regular action last year. . . Won all-state and all-city honors at Toledo Waite. . . Learned his football from Jack Mollenkopf, new Purdue line coach. . . A good blocker. . . Earns extra change as a barber for the athletes. . . Will coach and teach industrial arts upon graduation. VERDUIN. DON -- One of the two frosh ex-servicemen on the squad. . Looks good on offense. . . Big and rugged and should see more action after some experience under fire. . . Starred at Butler, N.J., Captaining the squad for two years and earning all-state mention. Married.
