THE UNIVERSITY

Bowling Green State University is an integral part of the system of higher education maintained by the State of Ohio. It is governed by a Board of Trustees appointed by the Governor, and is supported almost entirely by legislative appropriations.

A 1910 General Assembly Act authorized an appointed commission to seek a site in northwestern Ohio for a new normal school. Bowling Green was selected and trustees were appointed in 1911 with the first president elected in 1912.

The college known as Bowling Green Normal College opened in temporary quarters in September 1914, and one year later moved into two new buildings on the present campus.

In 1929 the General Assembly changed the name to Bowling Green State College. The present name was authorized by the 1935 assembly.

The university is composed of four main divisions: College of Education, College of Liberal Arts, College of Business Administration, and the Graduate School. Courses are offered in forty-three different departments, and the school is recognized by all recognized accrediting agencies.

The university is located on a tract of 240 acres in the northeastern part of Bowling Green. Over fifty campus buildings are available this year.

The city of Bowling Green, with a population of 7,800, is located 25 miles south of Toledo at the intersection of U.S. Routes 25 and 6. The New York Central Railroad, a branch of the Baltimore and Ohio, and Greyhound bus lines serve the city.

The university is co-educational with a 1953 spring enrollment of 3,201. The breakdown shows 1,745 men and 1,456 women. The anticipated enrollment for 1953-54 is 3,000.

THE HEAD COACH

The 1953 season will be Robert H. (Bob) Whittaker's silver anniversary as a football coach.

As he starts his 25th year in the gridiron business, Whittaker can look back on a most enviable record as a scholastic and college coach.

For 23 years of this period Bob has been a head coach. Only in his first year at Sandusky, Ohio, high school did he serve as an assistant. The overall record shows the keen strategist has 150 victories, nine ties and only 55 setbacks for an outstanding .722 percentage. Not many coaches can point to such a fine record.

In 12 years at the BG helm Bob has watched his Falcon elevens take 63 wins and seven ties in 105 games for an excellent .633 average.

During his time the Falcons have enjoyed several outstanding seasons. Last year, BG's first in Mid-American Conference competition, the Falcons ran up a 7-2 record, losing only to Miami and Ohio U., in the MAC. The 257 points were the most scored by a Falcon eleven.

The 1949 and 1950 seasons were rebuilding years after the undefeated 1948 season. That year the Falcons swept by eight straight foes before deadlocking John Carroll, 13-all, in the season's finale. Several small bowl bids were rejected by the team and staff after consideration.

During the World War II period Bob kept football alive at BG, when many schools gave up the sport. Often he pieced together teams composed of Navy V-12 men and a few civilians but always managed a winning season.

Whittaker began his college coaching career on a high note when he came to BG in 1941. After the progressive Sandusky superintendent of schools Dr. Frank J. Prout moved to Bowling Green as president, he induced Whittaker to leave the fine Sandusky set-up and take over the Falcons.

After a tie by Wooster and a 8-0 loss to Akron, the Falcons recorded seven straight victories and Whittaker was nominated as an Ohio candidate for the "Coach of the Year" award.

His 11-year Sandusky record is even more outstanding. From 1932 to 1936 the Streaks won 38 consecutive games. This was five more victories than recorded at Massillon by Paul Brown. His 1931-33-34-35-38 teams were undefeated. He developed such Ohio State stars as Charles Maag, Edward Bruckner and Leonard Thom. As he left Sandusky for BG his record showed 87 victories, two ties, and only 20 defeats.

Born in Greenville, Ohio, Bob attended high school at Lorain and Norwalk, taking part in four years of football. At Miami University he played halfback where his teammates included Paul Brown and "Weeb" Ewbank of the Cleveland Browns. Whittaker also took part in track at the Oxford school, running the dashes and throwing the javelin to a college record.

He was graduated from Miami with a degree of bachelor of science in education. Bob took graduate work at Ohio State but received his MA from Bowling Green in 1942.

Bob spends most of his vacation at his summer home on Put-In-Bay Island in Lake Erie where he teaches sailing and does all the carpentry work on his home. Besides sailing, Bob likes handball and ice skating and other winter sports for diversion. He is an assistant professor in health and physical education and rated by students as a fine teacher in health education courses.

1953 PROSPECTS

After recording a 7-2 record last season for fourth ranking position in the state, Coach Bob Whittaker must look to 13 lettermen and a host of sophomores to keep this year's gridiron machine on par with the fine 1952 eleven.

The biggest losses from last season are at fullback and tackle. All four offensive tackles were graduated along with all-Ohio back Fred Durig, after counting *for* 62 per cent of the ground game the last two seasons.

Along with the 13 graduating seniors (10 linemen and 3 backs) four others didn't return. Roger McKenzie, second leading ground gainer last fall, was the biggest loss in this group. The senior halfback is working to support his family. Dick Wikle went to service while end Walter Wagner and reserve fullback Hugh Schick aren't returning to school.

Depth again, as always, will be another Whittaker problem with injuries to key regulars a big factor in the success of the season.

The passing game which last year accounted for 15 touchdowns should be as good as last year and possibly improved. Quarterback Bill Lyons, the nation's 17th ranking passer last season, is back to run the T-formation attack and has little all-America end Jim Ladd for his favorite receiver. Sophomore Jack Hecker is a fine prospect at the other flank with Martin Keipp supplying good reserve strength.

The running game which Durig dominated for two years will be more diversified. John Ladd, a defensive specialist for two years, has come up as the best running back and will get first try at the fullback job. Harold Bruck, a linebacker in '52, will be a contender for the job. Veterans Tommy Thomas and Glen Freimark look like best bets at right halfback. Punter Bill Bradshaw will work into the other halfback job with scatback Ray Cimaglio a definite comer. Among the sophomore backs Jim Bryan will give Lyons good backing at quarterback and Sam Epstein should come at halfback as the season progresses.

The regular line will have a complete veteran delegation. Big Bill Robinson will hold down the center job with good support from letterman Harold Yawberg.

The guard posts will go to lettermen Jim McQuaid and Keith Fowler. Both saw action last year, notably on defense with Fowler working some on offense. But it is here that the reserve strength must come from the sophomore ranks. Joe Stanziale and Benny Rowe are the best bets.

The big hole at tackle has been taken up by moving guard Lester Green into the right side hole and last year's linebacker Bob Dallas has moved into the other side. Reserves, also, are a problem here. Both of these boys must be 60-minute performers. The best sophomores are Fred Koch and Dale Duncan with Bill Hall and Jim Longe possibly moving into contention with experience.

The line will average over 200 pounds with good defensive ability and fair speed. The backfield will be comparatively light with a 170 average with two regulars from last year's defensive quartet.

The aerial attack will be depended upon much more than before while the running attack, getting a slower start, should come into forte before mid-season. The abolition of the two platoon system has not hurt the Falcons as extensively as some of the opponents since Whittaker never employed it all the way because of lack of depth. The defense should be some improved over last year and the pass defense shouldn't suffer with the two-way action.
