The University

Bowling Green State University is an integral part of the system of higher education maintained by the State of Ohio. It is governed by a Board of Trustees appointed by the Governor, and is supported almost entirely by legislative appropriations.

A 1910 General Assembly Act authorized an appointed commission to seek a site in Northwestern Ohio for a new normal school. Bowling Green was selected and trustees were appointed in 1911 with the first president elected in 1912.

The college known as Bowling Green Normal College opened in temporary quarters in September 1914, and one year later moved into two new buildings on the present campus.

In 1929 the General Assembly changed the name to Bowling Green State College. The present name was authorized by the 1935 assembly.

The University is composed of four main division: College of Education,

College of Liberal Arts, College of Business Administration, and the Graduate

School. Courses are offered in forty-four different departments, and the

school is recognized by all accrediting agencies. The faculty numbers over 225.

The university is located on a tract of 240 acres in northeastern part of Bowling Green. Over fifty permanent campus buildings are available this year. Two new dormitories, the first of an 8-building plant expansion program costing \$7,500,000, will be open this fall.

The city of Bowling Green, with a population of 12,000 is located 23 miles south of Toledo at the intersection of U.S. Routes 25 and 6. A branch of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad and Greyhound bus lines serve the city.

The university is co-educational with a 1955 spring enrollment of 3,243. The breakdown shows 1,714 men and 1,529 women. The anticipated enrollment for 1955-56 is 3,500.

# THE HEAD COACH For the first time in its 37-year football history, the Bowling Green State University football squad will be under the reigns of one of its own graduates. Doyt L. Perry, a standout athlete in the 1929-32 era, took over the Falcon football fortunes last March after Robert H. (Bob) Whittaker had relinquished the job following 14 years as head coach. As Bowling Green's ninth football mentor, Perry brings a wealth of football and teaching experience to his first head coaching job in the collegiate ranks. After an outstanding 16-year scholastic coaching career at Lorain Clearview and Upper Arlington, the former Falcon quarterback was asked to join Woody Hayes' staff at Ohio State in 1951 when the Buck coach moved from Miami University to

For four years Perry served as the Buckeyes' backfield coach. He helped in the development of such Big Ten standouts as Fred Bruney, Johnny Borton, Dave Leggett, Bobby Watkins and Howard "Hopalong" Cassady.

the Columbus job.

When Perry handed his resignation to the Ohio State coach in March, Hayes told newsmen, "Doyt is the finest friend and best coach I have ever worked with. His pass defense record of no deep completions in 10 games in 1954 is one that will stand for a long time. As our offensive statistical brain, his contribution to our attack has been enormous. We are losing a great coach. Bowling Green is getting a fine coach."

Perry launched his coaching and teaching career at the Lorain school in 1933 as head basketball and track coach. In 1937 he instituted football and in six years his Clearview teams won 32, lost nine and tied four, including four league championships. Several of his standouts, Frank Uzak, Albert Schlinder, and Peter Popovich, earned gridiron recognition at Bowling Green under Whittaker.

In basketball and track at Clearview, his record was even better.

The court teams won 161 games while losing only 35. His track teams won seven county championships and three league titles.

In 1943 the diminutive Falcon star took over at Upper Arlington as head football and basketball coach. He also was coordinator of the health and physical education and recreation activities. His first football team at the Columbus surburb won seven of nine and the basketball team was undefeated until the semi-finals of the district tournament.

After a 3-year hitch in the U.S. Navy, Perry returned to the Columbus school in 1946 but limited his coaching duties to football. His first post-war team was undefeated in nine games. In six seasons the Arlington eleven won or shared the Central Buckeye League title four times. His 1950 offensive-minded machine also was undefeated and scored more points than any other Ohio high school.

Perfectionist Perry can look proudly at an over-all football record of 73 victories, 20 losses and six ties for a fine .767 average.

While an undergraduate at Bowling Green, Perry gained wide recognition for his 3-sport ability. He was quarterback on 1929-30-31 teams that went 18 games without a defeat. In fact the new BG coach only played in three losing games during his college career. He was noted for his fine running and passing. He won all-Northwestern Ohio Conference league honors as a junior and senior, and also received all-Ohio mention in his final year. He was a regular forward for three seasons in basketball, and completed his 9-letter career with three baseball awards as shortstop for Coach Warren E. Steller.

Perry received his secondary education at Hartford high in Croton, Ohio, where he was a 3-sport participant and captain of all the teams as a senior.

He received his degree in education from Bowling Green in 1932, majoring in social science. His master's degree in physical education was granted by Ohio State in 1938.

Mrs. Perry is the former Loretta Zeroll of Elyria. They have three children, Judy, 14; David 8, and Doyt Lee, 4.

BRUCE BELLARD -- Starting his eighth year at Bowling Green as a football coach ... Will work with the ends under Perry after four years as interior line coach...Joined the BG staff as graduate assistant after graduation in Jan. 1948...Worked with varsity line in 1948...Replaced Fred Marsh as freshman coach in 1949...Was elevated to varsity again in 1951 when Forrest Creason took over freshmen...Was a 3-sport man at Bellevue high school, gaining honors in football, swimming and track ... His high school coach was Sam Cooper, chairman of health and physical education department at BG... Entered BG in 1941, winning numerals in football, wrestling and track...Won his first gridiron monogram as a regular in 1942...Joined Navy early in 1943 ... Spent sometime in air flight training but finished service duty as aircraft mechanic with overseas duty in Guam, .. Was outstanding wrestler at several Navy bases ... Returned to BG in 1946 to take over regular guard job ... Also a standout on 1947 team...Mentioned in all-Ohio selections...Named to the powerful William and Mary all-opponent team. . . Received master's degree from BG in 1953...Now working on doctor's degree at Indiana U...Also serves as head wrestling coach where his team finished second in Mid-Am last winter ... A top-notch teacher in health and physical education program... Heads up driver education program ... Married.

ROBERT DUDLEY -- Named in June as the backfield coach on Perry's five-man varsity staff...Had been head football at Grandview high school in Columbus for two years...Also head basketball coach for six years...Before taking over head gridiron duties had worked as assistant...His 1953 and 1954 teams had 9-8-1 record...Before joining the Grandview system in 1949, spent one year at Lancaster as coach and teacher in junior high school... His Grandview cage teams won two Central Buckeye championships and had overall 65-47 mark ... An outstanding athlete at Linden-McKinley before enrolling at Capital University in 1941... Earned one varsity football letter and freshman numerals in baseball and basketball at the Luthern institution... Entered the U.S. Navy in 1942 where he spent three years in the hospital corps as a x-ray technician...Returned to civilian life to enter Ohio State in 1946...Was a letterwinner on the 1947 and 1948 baseball teams... Earned his bachelor's degree with major in physical education in 1948...Started working on master's at BG this summer ... Married to former Columbus school teacher, Anna Mae Gingery ... Has two sons, Robert Scott, 2, and David Lamar, 4 months.

Had served two years as assistant coach at Heidelberg...Also handled the
Student Princes baseball team...Was instructor in health and physical

Harry Strobel, line coach at Ohio State, was his high school coach...Played in the 1947 Ohio all-star game...Outstanding high school baseball star where he was teammate of Hal Naragon , Cleveland Indian pitcher...Also played basketball for Magics...Then went to Miami University where he played under both George Blackburn and Woody Hayes .. . Won two letters as offensive tackle...Was member of the 1950 team that went to Salad Bowl... Also starred on the Redskin diamond as a pitcher, going unbeaten in two seasons...Gained his bachelor's degree in June, 1951, with major in physical education... Enrolled in Ohio State graduate school in the fall and worked as graduate assistant and Buckeye freshman team aid . . . Awarded his master's degree in August, 1952, before entering military service... Spent two years at Camp Rucker, Ala., in the adjutant general's office...Coached regimental football team...Took over line coaching duties at Presbyterian (S.C.) College in Sept. 1954... JAMES J. RUEHL--Graduate assistant in health and physical education...
Will work with football in intercollegiate program...Graduated last June
from Ohio State with education degree...Started OSU in 1949 but Korean war
interfered and was called up by Marine Corps...Served at Camp LeJuene where
he played on 1951 gridiron team...Returned to Bucks in 1952 to earn letter
at center...Leg injury curtailed play in 1953...Last year worked as student
assistant coach with freshmen...Outstanding athlete at Cumberland, Md.,
where he won 9 letters at Allegheny high school...Married...Son, Jimmy, 4.

JACK R. TAYLOR--Also graduate assistant in health and physical education ...Graduate of Albion College last June...Played football and track at the Michigan school where he earned four letters in both sports...Gained second team all-MTAA honors at center and outstanding hurdler in league... Gained his high school experience at Newberry, Mich., where he starred in football and track...Married in June...Wife teaches elementary school.

THE 1955 PROSPECTS Doyt Perry, in taking over the Falcon football fortunes, inherits a young inexperienced squad that includes 31 sophomores and only 12 lettermen from the 1954 sound that won only two of nine tilts. Besides inexperience, the squad will suffer from lack of depth until late season when playing time will put the Falcons in better position for replacing the regulars. Perry had 20 days of spring drills to put into operation his split-T system. Spending most of this timegetting acquainted with the personnel and making necessary position changes, the new BG coach will probably be moving at a much slower pace than he would like in early season. Parts of the line will be manned by veterans. Ends Jack Hecker and Tom Kisselle should again be mainstays at the wings as last fall. Ed Janeway looks like a good reserve and should come along fast with experience. He has some kicking ability, which is certainly one of Perry's big problems with the nation's number one kicker Bill Bradshaw now booting for the Baltimore Colts. The tackles will fall to veterans Fred Koch and Kenny Russell. With a year of experience both of these boys should be improved. Reserves here are slim. Karl Koepfer, a guard during the spring, might be shifted to bolster the ranks. Dan Hurst played sparingly last year while Larry Kelly and Marv Siffer move up from the frosh squad. Big Jim Derr might develop as a good relief for the two veterans. The center of the line, undoubtedly, will be inexperienced. Dill Asher took over center in spring game and his defensive edge might hold off regular Harold Peek and letterman Carl Ford. Veteran Joe Stanziale will be trying for regular work at one guard but sophomore Tim Murnen looks like the best prospect for the other side. Jerry Cook should take care of the relief work with other sophomores Greg Mee, Al Moebus and Bill Page joining 8

last year's reserve Dick Bruck as likely reliefers. The line will have more weight than last year with the promise of more speed for downfield blocking.

Up front Perry just can't afford to have injuries because the depth is a serious problem while the backfield picture isn't much better in that respect.

Jarrin' Jack Giroux probably will be the only veteran back in the starting lineup. Three sophomores, undoubtedly, will be called to carry the load at both halfbacks and fullback.

Don Nehlen looks like the best quarterback on the split-T system. He can run and pass well and might be called upon for punting. Veteran Jim Bryan will be in reserve as will sophomore Chuck McBee.

Capable Carlos Jackson is a cinch for a halfback job but the other post could be taken over by any three men. Speedster Floyd Lennox gives Perry the maximum in speed but inexperience prevails. Stocky Vic DeOrio and Bill Spencer are possibilities.

The offensive play should be improved over last year when the Falcons stood at the bottom of the Mid-American statistical pile. The passing attack could be good with good receivers and some good patterns. Defense is a question. Linebackers could be lacking.

Aerial Attack:	Sophomore Don Nehlen, followed by Jim Bryan and Chuck McBee, will handle most of the throwing. All-Mid-Am end Jack Hecker and Tom Kisselle will be top receivers.
Kicking Game:	One of biggest problems among Perry's worries. Bryan probably the best kicker but won't be a regular. Nehlen might come with work. Reserve end Ed Janeway is a possibility.
Kickoffs and PAT:	Jay Knierim could handle both. Jack Hecker is the regular that can do both. Jim Bryan also works the points.
