## **Press Information**

The 1981 Bowling Green State University football press guide has been prepared by the BGSU Sports Information Staff for the use of members of the press, radio and TV in coverage of Bowling Green. Any member of the media may receive a copy by contacting the sports information office. Persons other than media personnel wishing a copy should send a check for \$3.00 made out to "Bowling Green State University" to the sports information office. Address all requests to:

**Credentials:** Press credentials for games at Doyt L. Perry Field must be requested at least one week in advance. Late requests will be honored if space is available, but parking space in the media lot cannot be guaranteed for requests less than a week prior to the game. Seating in the press box is limited to working press only.

Interviews: All interviews with members of the team during the season should be arranged through the sports information office. Please allow 24 hours to set up interviews with the players. Arrangements will be made for telephone and in-person interviews at a time that is mutually agreeable to the reporter/broadcaster and the athlete. The best time to call Coach Denny Stolz is between 10:30-11:00 a.m. Wednesday, just prior to his regular Wednesday press conference. Any television crews wishing to tape an interview with Coach Stolz may do so daily at 3:30 p.m. SHARP, just prior to practice.

Media Day: The annual pre-season media day will be held on Monday, August 24 from 1:00-2:30 p.m. at Doyt L. Perry Field. The players and coaching staff will be available for photographs and interviews by members of the radio, television and print media. **Parking:** A special media parking lot is located adjacent to Doyt L. Perry Field, near the southwest corner of the stadium. Access to the media lot is by Alumni Drive which connects Mercer Road (near the Alumni Center) and Wooster Street (near the Information Booth). Admission to the media lot is restricted to people holding special parking passes acquired from the sports information office.

**Photographers:** Photo passes for newspaper photographers, and under special circumstances, for free lance photographers are available from the sports information office. Photo passes entitle the photographer access to the sideline, press box, photo deck on top of the press box, and to the locker room after the game.

**Post-Game Communications:** There are three telephones in the pressbox for use after the game. After the sports information staff completes reports to the wire services and television stations, and beeper reports to the radio stations, these phones are available, free of charge, to members of the media for collect calls. One Xerox telecopier will also be available on a first-come, first-served basis.

**Post-Game Interviews:** The locker rooms are on the east side of the stadium, and can be entered through the tunnels at either the north or south end. Only people with proper credentials will be admitted. Coach Stolz will hold a media conference and the dressing room will be opened to the media after the normal cooling off period.

**Press Box Services:** Members of the media will be provided with game programs, flip cards, current statistics and last-minute pre-game notes prior to the start of the game. Statistical summaries will include play-by-play, halftime stats, complete team and individual stats, tackles, and post-game coaches' quotes. A light lunch will be given to members of the media prior to start of the game. Hot dogs, chips, and soft drinks will be available during the game. **Press Conference:** Coach Denny Stolz will hold a regular weekly press conference during the season on Wednesday's at 11:00 a.m. in his office on the east side of the stadium. All members of the media are welcome, to attend.

**Press Gate:** The press gate at Doyt L. Perry Field is at the southwest corner of the stadium, a short walk from the media parking lot.

**Radio:** There are five radio booths in the press box at Doyt L. Perry Field. Three of them are reserved for local radio and a fourth for the official station of the visitors. Requests for permission to broadcast must be made in writing at least THREE weeks prior to the game. A rights fee of \$75 will be charged to broadcast. The fee will be waived for the official station of the visitors. There is space in each booth for

four persons, but no spouses or children are allowed. Phone lines can be ordered through General Telephone Company in Bowling Green (352-3511).

**Television:** There are no regularly reserved booths for television, so anyone wishing to televise a game from Doyt L. Perry Field should contact the sports information office at least ONE MONTH prior to the game, and preferably, before the start of the season.

## **Bowling Green State University**

In the fall of 1970, Dr. Hollis A. Moore, the newly-selected president, unveiled his plans for a ''decade of distinction'' at Bowling Green State University. He talked about a decade of physical and academic growth. He foresaw a decade of faculty dedication to teaching and research. And he began making plans to build upon the strengths of the University and to offer programs and services which would be international in scope.

Now 11 years later, Dr. Moore has passed away, but many of his visions have become reality.

A building program resulted in the renovation of numerous older structures and the construction of several new ones. Among the most impressive of the University's more than 100 buildings are the Student Recreation Center, which was completed in 1979, and the Moore Musical Arts Center, also built in 1979 and named after Dr. Moore and his wife this past spring.


The academic programs at the University were also renovated and expanded. Three

new colleges were developed during the 1970s. The College of Health and Community Services was started in 1973 to help meet the health care needs of a growing northwest Ohio. The School of Music was expanded into the College of Musical Arts, and the Graduate School became the Graduate College.

These new colleges joined the colleges of Education, Business Administration, Arts and Sciences, and the Firelands College to offer the University's more than 16,000 undergraduate and graduate students nearly 250 degree programs.

And the students are as diverse as the coursework. They come from 85 of Ohio's 88 counties, all fifty states and more than 45 foreign countries. They bring to the University diverse backgrounds and ideas, and they help create an exciting atmosphere for intellectual and cultural exchange.

This exchange is encouraged and directed by the more than 750 full-time faculty members. These men and women are experts in their fields of study, and many are on the cutting edge of scientific research

and discovery. During the past few years, faculty members have annually received more than \$1 million from outside agencies and foundations to conduct research. This research is exploring many of the pressing political, economic and environmental concerns of our times. For example, faculty are now studying insect chromosomes in the hopes of finding a cure for cancer in humans, the effects of air pollution and acid rain on crops, the changing texture of the American family, and the growing rate of juvenile delinquency.

The hub for this intellectual activity is the University's nine-story Library. The Library houses a collection of more than 650,000 volumes, 335,000 government documents, more than a million microfilms, and 5,000 periodicals. The Library is also the home of an impressive music collection of more than 175,000 recordings and audiotapes.


Non-traditional students have also been of concern to the University. Regional and campus centers for students returning to school, or for persons holding a full-time job while pursuing a degree, were established and supported.

The University has also become a center for entertainment and cultural programming.

Internationally-known performers regularly visit the campus, and the University's music, theater, art and other programs offer an almost continuous schedule of programs.

Now, as Bowling Green begins planning for its 75th anniversary celebration in 1985, the University is facing several serious problems — inflation, potential decreases in state and federal support, and the possibility of declining enrollments. But the University will face these problems from a position of strength, having developed vital and exciting programs which are administered by people who have a dedication to learning and excellence.

Many of Dr. Moore's visions have been realized, and many more are nearing completion. His untimely death last April has only helped to strengthen the resolve of those who worked with him to continue his dream of transforming a ''decade of distinction'' into a tradition of unparalled excellence.

## **Interim President Michael Ferrari**



Dr. Michael Ferrari was named as the interim president of Bowling Green State University last May, following the passing of Hollis Moore. Dr. Ferrari served as BGSU's Provost and Executive Vice President from 1978 until his appointment by the University's Board of Trustees.

Dr. Ferrari has held key roles in the University's financial and academic operations since coming to Bowling Green in 1971 as coordinator of planning, budgeting and institutional studies.

His deft management skills have earned him the reputation of an administrator with a high respect for scholarship, commitment to planning, a clear-cut philosophy of education, and the demonstrated ability to work with students, faculty and staff.

A professor of management and sociology, Dr. Ferrari was vice president of resource planning at Bowling Green before being named Provost in May, 1978. Prior to his appointment at Bowling Green, Dr. Ferrari was acting chair of the department of administrative sciences at Kent State. Previous to that, he held administrative and teaching positions at Michigan State and the University of Cincinnati.

Dr. Ferrari is a 1962 graduate of Michigan State University. He also earned his Masters Degree and Ph.D. from Michigan State.

He and his wife, Janice, are parents of a daughter and a son.



## Athletic Director Jim Lessig

Jim Lessig is in his fourth year as the Director of Athletics at Bowling Green. A 1957 BGSU graduate, he joined the athletic department in August, 1978, after seven years in BG's alumni and development office.

A native of Canton, Lessig, 46, earned a Bachelor's Degree from Bowling Green, majoring in English with a minor in physical education. After graduation, he served in the Air Force for three years, and was a high school teacher and coach in the Canton area for four years.

Lessig returned to Bowling Green in 1964 as the assistant director of development. In 1966 he took on the additional responsibilities as assistant athletic director for athletic promotions and freshman basketball coach. He received his Master's Degree in school

administration and speech from BG in 1967.

In 1969 he joined former Bowling Green Coach Bill Fitch at the University of Minnesota, serving as Fitch's assistant. When Fitch was hired by the Cleveland Cavaliers in 1970, Lessig went with him as assistant coach, head scout, and director of special promotions.

Deciding that he wanted to spend more time with his young family, Lessig left coaching in 1971 to become the director of alumni affairs at BGSU. In 1975 he was named Executive Director of Alumni and Development, a post he held until 1978.

While serving in the alumni office, Lessig was a color commentator on the Cavaliers Basketball Television Network and a part-time announcer on WWWE Radio in Cleveland, doing play-by-play with the Cleveland Indians.

Lessig is a member of the NCAA Ice Hockey Committee, which selects the teams for the NCAA Championship.

Jim and his wife, Margarita, have two children, Tom, 21, and Andrea, 18.

## **Doyt L. Perry Field**



When Western Michigan comes to Bowling Green on October 3, it will mark the beginning of the sixteenth season of football at Doyt L. Perry Field. Built in 1966 for approximately \$3 million to replace the old University Stadium which had been used since 1923, Perry Field has seats for 23,272 spectators.

It is named in honor of the man who led Bowling Green to a 77-11-5 record in his 10 years as the head coach of the Falcons. After stepping down as head coach in 1964, Perry remained as the BGSU Athletic Director for six and a half years. Still a nine-month resident of Bowling Green, Perry remains one of BGSU's staunchest supporters.

The east side of the stadium includes dressing rooms, the equipment room and training room, plus the Athletic Department offices. On the west side are the maintenance area, storage rooms, handball courts, the track offices, the Falcon Club offices, and the Falcon Clubhouse.

Sitting atop the pressbox on the west side of the stadium is the newest addition to the facility, the plush Stadium Club. Now in its second year of operation, the Stadium Club's 106 theatre-type seats were nearly a complete sellout in the first year, providing loyal BGSU fans with one of the finest places to view a game in all of the midwest.

Bowling Green won the first game ever played in Perry Field, defeating Dayton, 13-0 on October 1, 1966. In 1971, 26,860 jammed into the stadium for the annual BG-Toledo game, establishing a single game record attendance. The season record was set that same year as 90,552 saw the Falcons' five home games.

## **Head Coach Denny Stolz**



Former Big 10 Coach of the Year Denny Stolz enters his fifth season at Bowling Green, hoping to turn last year's narrow losses into victories and the Falcons' bid for the Mid-American Conference Championship into an MAC title and the berth in California Bowl I that goes with it.

Stolz hopes the Falcons can reverse last year's "extremely frustrating losses," this fall. Six of BG's seven losses last year were by four points or less, and the other was not decided until the fourth quarter when Central Michigan pulled away from a three point lead with three late touchdowns.

Stolz comes into the 1981 season with a 13-year collegiate coaching record of 70-57-1. He is 17-28 in his first four years at Bowling Green. He rejuvenated the football programs at Alma College and Michigan State by producing unbeaten seasons at Alma in 1967 and 1968, and the best record in eight years at Michigan State in 1974 when he led the Spartans to a 7-3-1 record in his second year there.

A native of Lansing, MI, Stolz grew up in Mason, MI, and like his three brothers, worked his way through Alma College to earn a bachelor's degree in 1955. He played quarterback for the Scots, and upon graduation became head football coach at Haslett (MI) High School, where he was 40-13-3 in nine years for a winning percentage of .732. Stolz then spent one year as defensive coordinator at Lansing Eastern High School before being named head coach at Alma prior to the 1965 season.

Taking over a program that had produced only three wins in four years, Stolz soon led his alma mater to 8-0 records for two consecutive years, and was named Michigan Coach of the Year in 1967. By the time he left Alma in 1971, Stolz had compiled a 34-16 record and led the school to two outright Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association championships, and one co-championship.

His next stop was Michigan State, where Stolz served for two years as defensive coordinator for Duffy Daugherty before being named the Spartans' head coach in 1973. Again, Stolz turned around a foundering program. Within two years, Michigan State had climbed to 7-3-1 overall and 6-1-1 in the Big 10 for its best finish since the 1966 team went unbeaten. The Spartans finished twelfth in the Associated Press poll and eighteenth in the United Press International rankings, and Stolz was named Big 10 Coach of the Year. The highlight of the season was a 16-13 upset of number one ranked Ohio State.

Michigan State finished 7-4 the next year, beating Notre Dame 10-3 at South Bend. Stolz resigned from Michigan State in March, 1976, with a 19-13-1 record, the only winning record in the Big 10 outside of Ohio State or Michigan during the preceding three years.

"The two most memorable games of my career have to be, first and foremost, the win over Ohio State," Stolz says. "ABC still considers it one of the top 10 games ever telecast. The second one would be the win over Notre Dame, especially since the game was played at Notre Dame." Stolz is the district chairman of the American Football Coaches Association All-America Selection Committee. He heads the District 5 committee that also includes Earle Bruce of Ohio State and Hayden Fry of Iowa. Stolz is also a member of the United Press International Board of Coaches that ranks the Top 20 in the nation during the season.

While at Michigan State, Stolz coached the North to a victory in the All-American Bowl at Tampa, FL. He has lectured across the nation at football clinics, and on December 15, 1976, became the 12th head coach in the 62-year history of Bowling Green State University football.

Stolz will celebrate his 47th birthday in Waco, Texas, as the Falcons open their season against Baylor on September 12. Denny and his wife, Cena, have a son, Doak, 21, and two daughters, Dawn, 20, and Denise, 14.

## **Assistant Head Coach Jim Heacock**



Jim Heacock (pronounced HAY-cock) was promoted to the position of assistant head coach last spring by Coach Stolz. He will retain his duties as the defensive coordinator and continue to work with the defensive line.

"Jim earned the position of assistant head coach over the last three years with his hard work and dedication," Coach Stolz says. "In terms of on-the-field coaching, recruiting, player and staff relations, and administration, he is the most outstanding assistant coach I have ever worked with."

A 1970 graduate of Muskingum College, he joined the Bowling Green staff in 1978. This is his fourth season as the defensive line coach, and his third as the defensive coordinator.

A three-time All-Ohio selection as a defensive back at Muskingum College, Heacock played with the Green Bay Packers and Cincinnati Bengals in 1970 and 1971. After

assisting at Marlington High School for a year, he came to Bowling Green as a graduate assistant, working with the junior varsity and the varsity backfield in 1972. He then served as the head track coach and an assistant football coach at Muskingum for five years before returning to BGSU in a full-time capacity.

A native of Alliance and a graduate of West Branch High School, Heacock was born June 23, 1948. He is married to the former Sherry Brown, and as this guide went to press, they were expecting their first child.

He recruits the Cleveland area.



## **Defensive Backfield Coach Kit Cartwright**



Kit Cartwright is the lone Bowling Green graduate on the current Falcon football staff. Now in his third year as the defensive secondary coach, he graduated from Bowling Green in 1976 with a degree in biology.

Cartwright returned to his alma mater in 1979 after serving as a part-time assistant at Penn State for a year. While an undergraduate at Bowling Green, he served as an assistant football coach at Toledo Rogers High School for two years. He was a graduate assistant at the University of Toledo in 1976, the defensive coordinator at Ohio Wesleyan University in 1977, and worked with the secondary and the kicking game under Joe Paterno at Penn State in 1978.

Born January 4, 1954 in Toledo, he is married to the former Dawn Shepp. Kit recruits the Northwest Ohio and southern Michigan area.

## **Guards and Centers Coach Steve Devine**

Steve Devine is in his second year coaching the Falcons' offensive guards and centers. He is a 1972 graduate of Heidelberg College where he received a degree in education and was a three-year letterman in football and co-captain as a senior.

After graduating from Heidelberg, Devine coached at Marion Harding and Marysville High Schools. He is a 1968 graduate of Marysville. In 1977 he was a part-time assistant at the University of Washington, and went to the Rose Bowl that year with the Huskies.



Then in 1979, he returned to Ohio as a part-time assistant under Earle Bruce at Ohio State, and again went to Pasadena as the

Buckeyes went to the Rose Bowl. Devine joined the Bowling Green staff in January 1979. He was born July 27, 1950 in Tiffin, and is single. He recruits the Columbus area.

## **Receivers Coach Tim McConnell**

One of the two first-year members of Coach Denny Stolz' staff, Tim McConnell will coach the Falcons' receivers this fall. He came to Bowling Green last January.

For the last two years, McConnell has served on the football staff at Northern Arizona University, one of the top Division I-AA teams in the country. He was the defensive backfield coach in 1979, and the offensive backfield coach in 1980.

A native of Darlington, Wisconsin, McConnell won three varsity letters at the University of Wisconsin as a defensive back. As a senior he was selected Academic All-Big 10. After graduating with a degree in physical education in 1977, he joined the Wisconsin coaching staff for a year and a half as a graduate assistant and

part-time assistant before going to Northern Arizona. Born July 20, 1955, he is married to the former Sandi Johnson. McConnell recruits the surburban Detroit and Flint areas of Michigan.

## **Offensive Backfield Coach Wayne Moses**

Wayne Moses is the newest member of the Bowling Green football staff, joining the Falcons last April, just prior to spring practice. He replaced Charlie Baggett, who took a position at the University of Minnesota, as the offensive backfield coach.

Moses is a 1973 graduate of San Dimas High School in California, and was a four-year letterman as a defensive back at the University of Washington. He started for the Huskies in 1975, 1976 and 1977. The Huskies capped his senior season with a Rose Bowl victory over Michigan.

After graduating from Washington in 1977 with a degree in political science, Moses served as the secondary coach at Cal State Fullerton in 1978, and as coach of the running backs at Chaffey



Junior College in Alta Loma, California, in 1979. Last year he was a part-time assistant at North Carolina State University.

Born in New Gulf, Texas on January 11, 1955, Moses is married to the former Rosalind Burbanks. He will recruit the Detroit area.

## **Tackles and Tight Ends Coach Scott Seeliger**

Scott Seeliger is in his third season with the Falcon football staff. and his second as the coach of the offensive tackles and tight ends. In his first season at Bowling Green, he coached the defensive ends.

Seeliger has experience in both the Big Eight and the Big Ten. He played tight end at Iowa State on the 1971 Cyclone team that went to the Sun Bowl, and coached at the University of Wisconsin. After graduating from Iowa State in 1972 with a degree in mathematics, he was the head coach at Sauk Prairie High School in Wisconsin for four years. His teams compiled a record of 28-8.

In 1977. Seeliger went to the University of Wisconsin where he worked with the offensive tackles and tight ends, and was the head varsity reserve coach. In 1978, he coached the receivers and was in charge of all varsity scouting.



Born January 6, 1950 in Madison, Wisconsin, he is married to the former Karen Perschon, and the father of two daughters. He recruits the Cincinnati and Dayton area.

## Linebacker Coach Gerry Solomon



Gerry Solomon is in his third season of coaching the Falcon linebackers. He came to Bowling Green in 1979 from Carnegie-Mellon University.

Solomon was a two-year starter and a co-captain as a senior at Bucknell University in Lewisburg, PA. After graduating from Bucknell in 1973 with an education degree, he served as the defensive line coach at Muskingum College for a year. In 1976, he served as the assistant head coach and defensive coordinator at Central Catholic High School in Pittsburgh.

Solomon, who has a Master's Degree in Educational Administration, spent the 1978 season in charge of the defensive line at Carnegie-Mellon in Pittsburgh.

Born March 21, 1951 in Arnold, Pa., he is married to the former Adele DeBartolo, and the father of a son and a daughter. Solomon recruits the Akron-Canton-Youngstown area.

## Staff Assistant Greg Polnasek


Greg Polnasek will be working with the Falcon football staff this fall as a part-time assistant, primarily handling the scout team.

## Young Defense Holds Key To BG's Chances

As many as six freshmen or sophomores may start on the Bowling Green defense, but it will be the young defensive unit that holds the key to success for the 1981 Falcons. A strong defensive performance will keep the Falcons in their critical earlyseason Mid-American Conference games, while the untested offensive line matures and gains game experience.

The entire offensive backfield returns intact, but four of the six starters in the offensive line have graduated. Defensively, just three starters were lost to graduation. If replacements can be found in the secondary, the Falcon defense may be the best at Bowling Green in several years.

The schedule that Bowling Green faces will not help. Opening the season at Baylor, the 1980 Southwest Conference Champions and one of the top teams in the country, will be a most severe test. After playing Baylor, the Falcons remain on the road for games with Ohio University and Michigan State in the second and third weeks in the season.

The OU game will be highly important in BGSU's bid for the Mid-American Conference Championship and the berth in the first annual California Bowl that goes with it. If the Falcons can defeat OU, they will be 1-0 in the MAC, regardless of how they fare against Baylor and Michigan State, going into October when they have four of their five games at home.

Getting a good start is obviously important to the coaching staff. Last year, when the Falcons set an NCAA record by losing five games by three points or less, after losing their first four games, they bounced back to win four of their next five before losing the last two games of the season to wind up 4-7 overall and 4-4 in the MAC.

A position-by-position analysis of the 1981 Falcons follows.

### Offense

Quarterback: Junior Greg Taylor returns as the incumbent quarterback. Taylor

made steady progress last year, and wound up with the second best passing efficiency rating in the Mid-American Conference. He completed 56 percent (43-77) of his passes for 562 yards and three touchdowns, and rushed 179 times for a net gain of 365 yards and six touchdowns. Backing him up will be sophomore Dayne Palsgrove, who was redshirted last year and had an excellent spring, and junior Steve Swan, a transfer from Anderson (IN) College who has a strong passing arm.

**Coach Stolz View:** "We have excellent depth at quarterback with Greg returning in addition to Dayne and Steve in back-up roles."

**Running Back:** The return of fullback Tom Glendening, the three mini-backs, and versatile Kevin Browning make this one of the strongest positions on the team. Glendening is expected to emerge as one of the top fullbacks in the MAC this year after an excellent sophomore season. Bryant Jones, Chip Otten and Kevin Folkes who average 5'7'' — have gained better than 2,000 yards from the tailback position

in the last two years and are all back. Jones led BG last year with 806 yards rushing; Otten is the most versatile and the best receiver of the three; and Folkes was BG's leading rusher in 1979 before missing most of last season with a broken wrist.

Browning could play either fullback or halfback this year. He has been a spot starter and top reserve at fullback for the past two years, but has the speed (4.65) and size to play tailback. If Browning moves to tailback, then sophomore Dan Hays, a 1980 redshirt, moves up to second fullback behind Glendening.

**Coach Stolz' View:** "Five of our top six running backs return this season, making this one of the most seasoned areas on our team. Tri-captain Tom Glendening heads the contingent of fine running backs."

Wide Receivers: Dan Shetler, the fourth leading receiver in Bowling Green history, has graduated, but the Falcons should still be strong at wide receiver. Junior Shawn Potts, second on the team in receiving last year with 18 receptions for 303 yards and two touchdowns, will shift from flanker to split end. Sophomore Jeff McCormick, a halfback in 1979 who missed all of last year with a knee injury, and sophomore Tony Graham are the top candidates to take Potts' flanker post. Curt Lewis and Mark Fierek are also back, having lettered as back-ups last year.

**Coach Stolz' View:** "Shawn, Tony and Jeff came out of spring ball as our top three wide outs. They have great speed and skill for our league, and should form a solid receiving corps."

**Offensive Line:** ???? This area will determine how strong the Falcon offense is this year. Three year starters Mark Prchlik, Dean Hull, Mike Rullo and John Park have all graduated, leaving gaping holes to fill. The coaching staff experimented with several position changes during spring practice, and there could be more switches before the season opens.

Heading into fall camp, the starting five has senior Jim Schumann at center, senior Cornell Jones and sophomore Greg King at guard, and senior Rick Deutsch and sophomore Dean Hall at tackle. King and Schumann have both played tackle in the past, and could move back, pending other changes. Others who figure in the offensive line picture are senior guard Frank Bartoszek, junior Joe Kastl who can play either guard or tackle, sophomore guard Eric Barnard who transferred from Ohio State, senior tackle Dave Hagaman, and sophomore centers Ray Rockwell, Jeff Powers and Mike Blaner.

Senior John Meek is expected to start at tight end. He started for most of the 1979 season, but saw limited action last year. Sophomore David Miller will back him up.

**Coach Stolz' View:** "Our offensive line is the most uncertain area on our team. We have a number of fine candidates, but getting the right combination on the field will be the challenge for our coaching staff."

### Defense

**Defensive Line:** The defensive line is sprinkled with both experience and a talented group of sophomores. Sophomores Larry Stratton and Broderick Knight are the top two candidates at the strongside end position, while sophomore Mark Emans and senior Pat Kennedy give BG a pair of top players at the weakside end slot.

The coaching staff did a lot of experimenting in the interior portion of the line during spring ball. The most likely starters are sophomore Stu Tolle at strongside tackle, tri-captain Craig Valentine at nose tackle, and senior Rick Iverson at weakside tackle. Others who could see action in the heart of the defense are seniors Andre Young and John Hlay, and sophomores Andy Stark and Joe Prchlik.

**Coach Stolz' View:** "Our defensive line appears young, but is very talented. Players like Craig Valentine, Mark Emans and Rick Iverson head a group of players that will make this area of our defense very solid." **Linebackers:** Four players who all started at some point last year will share the vast majority of the playing time at the two inside linebacker positions. Tri-captain Doug Carr, a starter as a sophomore and junior, is the top candidate at strongside linebacker, backed up by sophomore Don Gregoire. Sophomore Mark White and junior Terry Gyetvai are battling for the weakside linebacker spot.


**Coach Stolz' View:** *''Linebacker depth developed during spring ball. We are very happy to have quality people like Doug, Mark, Terry and Don manning these most important positions.''* 

**Secondary:** The biggest question marks on defense are in the secondary. Superb sophomore Martin Bayless returns at safety and two year starter Lee Williams is back at one of the cornerback spots, but the graduation of Jim Baarman and Joe Merritt leaves two holes to fill. Jac Tomasello, a two-year starter who missed all of last season with a knee injury, is likely to take one of the starting jobs. The other will probably go to either senior Carl Rosser or junior Joe Moton. Also competing for berths are junior Clarence Abernathy and sophomores Bryan Meek and Jim Cordiak. **Coach Stolz' View:** *''Lee Williams and* Martin Bayless return as regulars, and Jac Tomasello will be in action again after sitting out last season with the knee injury. Finding a fourth regular and adequate depth are the top priorities in this area as we enter fall ball.''

### **Kicking Game**

Record-setting placekicker John Spengler has graduated, and Jeff Higgins, BG's punter for the last two seasons, has left school, leaving two vacancies to fill. Incoming freshmen will probably take both spots. Soccer-style kicker Gehad Youssef, a native of Egypt, and left-footed straighton kicker Harold Moore are the top candidates to take over the placekicking duties. The punting chores will probably be handled by either Mark Rader or Jim Phelps. Senior Carl Rosser heads a large group of experienced specialty team members.

**Coach Stolz' View:** *"Our punter and field goal kicker will most likely come from the freshman class. However, good depth and experience returns in all other areas of the kicking game."*

## **Tri-Captain Doug Carr**

Doug will anchor the Bowling Green defense from his inside linebacker position. He has started for the Falcons since midway through his sophomore year, and is entering his second year as the strongside linebacker

Carr combines the size, speed, and savvy necessary to play the position. He received the Most Physical Award from the coaching staff at the end of spring practice last May.

Carr came to Bowling Green as a tight end and defensive end from Southeastern High School. He was a three-year starter there, and served as team captain in his senior year when he caught 30 passes for 537 yards and eight touchdowns. His performance led Southeastern to a perfect 10-0 record in 1977. At the conclusion of the season, he was named the Southwest District Lineman of the Year, and first team all-state by both AP and UPI.

As a freshman at Bowling Green, he was a reserve tight end, but did not see

any game action. The coaching staff moved him to linebacker that spring, and he became a starter early in his sophomore season. He ranked fourth on the team in tackles in 1979, making 30 solo tackles and assisting on 36 others.

Last season Carr was third on the team with 82 tackles, 43 of them solos, despite missing all of one game and most of another with a knee injury. His top performances came against Richmond, Kentucky, Ball State and Ohio University. He had seven solos and six assists against Richmond; made eight solos, two assists and knocked down two passes to earn BGSU's Defensive Player of the Week award against Kentucky; made five solo tackles and assisted on seven others against Ball State; and was in on eight tackles and intercepted two passes against OU.

Carr intercepted a total of four passes last year to rank third in the Mid-American Conference in that category.

**Coach Stolz on Doug Carr:** "Doug will be the heart of what we expect to be a fine defensive team. He will serve as defensive quarterback, which in itself will attest to his leadership abilities."

## **Tri-Captain Tom Glendening**

Tom could well be the best fullback in the Mid-American Conference in all-around ability as a runner, blocker and pass catcher. Elected as one of the team captains as a rising junior, he received the Falcon Award at the end of spring practice last May. The Falcon Award is presented each spring by the coaching staff to the player who best exemplifies the attitude, effort and leadership necessary to become a winner.

Glendening came to Bowling Green after starring as a fullback and linebacker at Loy Norrix High School. As a senior he rushed for 677 yards and an average of 5.4 yards per carry, and made 130 tackles. In one game against St. Joseph's, he rushed 20 times for 155 yards and took part in 17 tackles.

An all-state pick as a senior, twice the team's MVP, and twice all-conference and all-city, Glendening rushed for more than 1,100 yards in his two years as a starter at Loy Norrix.

At the beginning of the 1979 season,



Glendening was listed fourth on the BGSU depth chart. However, he made steady progress and saw considerable action in the second half of his freshman season, particularly when the Falcons used their Power-I offense.

Last season Glendening ranked fourth on the team on rushing, receiving, and scoring despite missing the Kent State and Miami games with a knee injury. He rushed 72 times for 256 yards and one touchdown, and caught nine passes for 86 yards and two touchdowns.

His touchdowns came on a one yard plunge against Richmond, a nine yard pass against Kentucky that brought the Falcons to within a point of the Wildcats with 37 seconds left in the game, and a 31-yard pass against Ohio University.

Glendening gained 38 yards rushing against Western Michigan in a triumphant return to his hometown of Kalamazoo as the Falcons broke their frustrating losing streak. His most productive performance of the year rushing came against Toledo the next week when he gained 57 yards on 13 carries.

**Coach Stolz on Tom Glendening:** "Tom represents everything a team and a coaching staff would want in a captain. He is a fierce competitor and is totally dedicated to his football team on and off the field. He is a natural captain and a very obvious selection though only a junior."

Craig Valentine, was by his own admission, no saint early in his teens. At 6'0'', 208 pounds he is too small to play in the middle of the defensive line in college football. He tore up one knee that caused him to miss all of the 1978 season, and had a series of injuries to his ''good'' knee that kept him on crutches from Sunday through Thursday several times last fall. He is a good student in BGSU's College of Business, and has completed four years at Bowling Green.

Any one of those reasons would be a good one for Craig to have hung up his spikes last November, but he is back for another season of football with the Falcons. The reason, in a word, is desire.

Valentine has overcome the wild streak he had in his early teens to become the type of leader who was elected as one of the team captains two years in a row. He uses quickness and intelligence to overcome his lack of size and be an effective nose tackle in the middle of the Falcons' defense.

An honorable mention Academic All-MAC selection in 1979, he will get his degree in December.

Valentine was a back-up defensive tackle as a freshman, and then suffered the serious knee injury the next spring which required surgery, kept him out of the entire 1978 season, and almost ended his playing days.

He returned in 1979 as a spot starter at defensive end, figuring in 51 tackles. Moved to nose tackle in the spring of 1980, he responded with an excellent season last fall despite being hobbled by the bad knees. He made 69 tackles last year, 42 of them solo, and ranked second on the team and eleventh in the MAC with 11 tackles totaling 40 yards in losses.

**Coach Stolz on Craig Valentine:** "To be re-elected captain of the squad and serve two years in that capacity is a fantastic accomplishment for Craig. This certainly indicates the tremendous respect our squad has for Craig's leadership ability."

Martin is expected to emerge as one of the top defensive backs in the MAC this year after an outstanding freshman season. He came to BG without a scholarship, but earned a position in the starting line-up at free safety early in pre-season drills, and performed superbly all season. He won second team All-MAC honors, the only freshman to earn any recognition on the MAC all-star team. He tied for the MAC lead with five interceptions last season, picking off two passes against both Toledo and Miami, and one against Eastern Michigan.

**KEVIN BROWNING** RB Sr 6'0'' 208 Detroit, Michigan (Kettering)

Kevin may be used at either fullback or tailback this season after playing strictly fullback in his first three seasons at BGSU. He would add excellent size to the tailback position, something the rest of the Falcon tailbacks lack. He has the speed (4.65) to play tailback, too. As a part-time starter and top reserve at fullback in 1979, he rushed 84 times for 320 yards. With the emergence of Tom Glendening as one of the premier fullbacks in the MAC, Browning's playing time was limited last year. He rushed for 76 yards on 21 carries.



## RICK DEUTSCH OT Sr 6'2'' 244 Valley City, Ohio (North Ridgeville)

A defensive tackle during his first three years at BGSU, Deutsch enters pre-season practice as the first team offensive left tackle. Ahead of him on the depth chart is Bryant Jones, BGSU's leading ground gainer a year ago. Folkes has rushed for 823 yards in three years, including 696 yards as a junior when he ranked seventh in the MAC. He led the team in rushing that year and finished third on the squad in pass receptions. Folkes has 4.5 speed in the 40.

A week later, he made 10 tackles against Miami. Gregoire played high school football at state power Massillon Perry, where he was the Most Valuable Player.

**TERRY GYETVAI** LB Jr 6'3'' 216 Delphos, Ohio (Elida)



Gyetvai finished second on the team in tackles last season, but still has to compete with sophomore Mark White for the starting job at weakside linebacker. Terry was Mid-American Conference Defensive Player of the Week last year following BGSU's 17-6 victory over Toledo, in which he made 15 tackles and recovered a fumble. He had 16 tackles against Ball State, 14 against Kentucky and 13 in games against Kent State and Miami. He also intercepted a pass against Western Michigan. A good student of the game, Gyetvai was All-League at Elida High School.



DAVE HAGAMAN OT Jr 6'3'' 229 Lima, Ohio (Elida)

Dave is hoping to receive more playing time this fall after steadily moving up the depth chart in his first two years at BGSU. He goes into pre-season practice listed on the second unit at offensive tackle. A high school teammate of Terry Gyetvai, Hagaman has good strength and quickness. He is an outstanding student, with an A minus average in Pre-Medicine. Hagaman was Vice-President of the senior class at Elida, where he was All-District and a member of the South all-star team.

DAN HAYS FB So 5'11'' 175 Marysville, Ohio (Marysville)



Dan is battling for a spot on the travel squad at fullback. An excellent all-around athlete, he has been tried at both tailback and defensive back during spring drills, but has returned to the fullback slot. After serving as a reserve as a freshman in 1979, he was red-shirted last fall. Dan is also a sprinter on the Bowling Green track team during the off-season. As a senior at Marysville High School, he rushed for 1,149 yards, and was selected as the Central Ohio Class AA Back of the Year.



### JOHN HLAY DT Jr 6'5'' 213 Columbus, Ohio (Upper Arlington)

After backing up Honorable Mention All-American Todd Gates last season, Hlay is now competing for the starting position left open by Gates' graduation. John played defensive tackle in four games last season, earning his first varsity letter. At 213 pounds, he is one of Bowling Green's lightest linemen, but compensates with quickness and alertness. CORNELL JONES OG Sr 6'2'' 237 Clover, Virginia (Halifax)

His football career began at Ferrum Junior College in Virginia, and after two years there, Jones stepped into the Falcons' starting line-up immediately last fall. ## MAC Champion Goes To California Bowl

The champions of the Mid-American Conference and the Pacific Coast Athletic Association (PCAA) will meet in the first annual California Bowl in Fresno, California, on December 19. The California Bowl, which is one of just two bowl games pitting conference champions against each other — the Rose Bowl is the other, has been in the planning stages for several years.

Approval for the game was granted by the NCAA Extra Events Committee on April 24, 1979. Two months later construction began on Fresno's \$7.2 million dollar stadium. The 30,000 seat facility was completed last fall. The natural turf playing surface is sunken 37 feet below ground level, giving the stadium an intimate feeling and ensuring a good view from every seat.


The first game was played in the stadium on November 15, 1980 with Fresno State defeating Montana State, 21-14.

Cal State Long Beach, who the Falcons played in Bowling Green last season and will meet in Long Beach in the final regular season game in 1982, won the PCAA in 1980. The other football playing members of the PCAA are Cal State Fullerton, Fresno State, San Jose State, University of the Pacific, and Utah State.

The game itself on December 19 culminates a busy week of activities planned by the Greater San Joaquin Valley Sports Association.



## Bowling Green - Toledo Rivalry

When the Rockets of Toledo journey down to Bowling Green for the Homecoming football game on October 24, it will mark the 46th renewal of the rivalry that dates back to 1919. The Falcons lead the series 25-16-4.

Toledo held the edge in the early years. A 63-0 shellacking of BG in 1935 gave UT a 6-3-3 lead in the series.

The series was revived in 1948 with the Falcons taking a 21-6 victory, but the Rockets won four of the next six meetings to stretch their advantage in the series to 10-6-3. Then came Doyt Perry.

In Perry's first year as the BG Coach, the Falcons blitzed UT, 39-0. Perry never lost to Toledo in his 10 years at Bowling Green,

and since his arrival the Falcons hold a 19-6-1 advantage in the series.

There have been exciting, dramatic moments in many of the BG-UT games, but none surpass the 1969 game. The Rockets came to Bowling Green undefeated and took a 17-0 lead. The Falcons rallied to take the lead on two different occasions in the second half, but a 37-yard field goal into the wind by Ken Crots with two seconds left gave the Rockets a 27-26 victory.

The nature of the rivalry is evident in the attendance figures for the BG-UT games. In the seven games played between the two schools at Doyt Perry Field, an average of 19,288 fans have watched.

# A Rich History of Success

The history of Bowling Green football dates back to 1919, but it was on the 40th anniversary of that initial season when the Falcons made their greatest achievement on the football field.

The 1959 team, led by All American Bernie Casey and first team All Mid-American Conference players Ron Blackledge, Bob Zimpfer and Bob Colburn, led Doyt Perry's Falcons to the NCAA Division Il national championship and the school's first unbeaten-untied season with a 9-0 record.

The next season began the winningest decade in the history of Bowling Green. From 1960 through 1969 the Falcons won 71 games, lost 22 and tied two for a winning percentage of .758. Among the nation's 118 major colleges, only Alabama, Texas, Arkansas and Mississippi produced better records than Bowling Green during the 1960s. Eleven Bowling Green players from that period went on to the National Football League, including Casey, Mike Weger, Jamie Rivers and Bob Reynolds, who spent the longest time in pro football among Bowling Green graduates, 12 years with the Cardinals and Patriots from 1963 to 1975.

Former Falcons still active in the NFL include Mark Miller of the Packers, Fred Sturt of the Saints, Dave Preston of the Broncos and all-pro Phil Villapiano of Buffalo.

Some of the nation's best head coaches have spent time at Bowling Green. Bo Schembechler of Michigan was an assistant coach with the Falcons in 1955, Bill Mallory of Northern Illinois was an assistant from 1968 to 1970 and Elliott Uzelac of Western Michigan also coached at Bowling Green from 1968 to 1970. Bowling Green graduates now coaching include Jim Young of Purdue (Class of '57), Dave McClain of Wisconsin ('60), Larry Smith of Arizona ('62), Dwight Wallace of Ball State ('66) and Don Nehlen of West Virginia, a 1958 graduate who also served as head coach from 1968 to 1976.

The Falcons' 17-14 victory at Western Michigan last year marked a milestone in BGSU football history. It was the 300th win in the 62-year history of the program. Heading into the 63rd year, Bowling Green has a record of 303-188-46 for a winning percentage of .617.


# **BGSU Hall of Fame**



# **Former Falcons in Pro Football**

At least 29 former Falcon football standouts have been drafted by or played for a National Football League team, or a team from the old American Football League. Among the most prominent Falcon alumni who played starring roles in professional football are Bernie Casey, a wide receiver with the Los Angeles Rams and San Francisco 49ers in the 1960's; Bob Reynolds, an offensive tackle with the St. Louis Cardinals for more than a decade; Jamie Rivers, a linebacker for three pro teams for nine years; Bob Schnelker, an offensive end with the New York Giants in their prime; Phil Villapiano, an all-pro linebacker with the Oakland Raiders, and now the Buffalo Bills; and Mike Weger, a standout defensive back with the Detroit Lions.

No Falcons were taken in the NFL draft last winter, but three signed free agent contracts and reported to training camp this summer — Tim Ross with the New England Patroits, Todd Gates with the Philadelphia Eagles, and John Spengler with the Detroit Lions.


