

MEDIA INFORMATION

CREDENTIALS

Requests for working press credentials should be made to the **BGSU** Athletic Communications Office, addressed to the attention of the football SID. Requests should be made at least one week in advance. Late requests will be honored if space is available but parking cannot be guaranteed for requests less than one week in advance. Scouts and non-working media will be seated if space is available. Requests are screened with care to insure a working press box. In accordance with the working code of the Football Writers Association of America, children, spouses and pets are not allowed in the working press box.

INTERVIEWS

All interviews with members of the team and the coaching staff should be conducted on Tuesday before the beginning of practice. That will be the only time during the week when the players will be available for interviews. Those interviews should be arranged through the athletic communications office. Please allow at least 24 hours to set up interviews with players. Arrangements will be made for telephone and in-person interviews at a time that is mutually agreeable to the reporter/ broadcaster and the athlete.

POST-GAME INTERVIEWS

The lockerrooms are on the east side of the stadium (opposite the press box), and can be entered through the tunnels at either the north or south end. Only people with proper credentials will be admitted. Coach Blackney and BGSU players, as well as the opposition coach and players, will be available for post-game interviews in a conference room located between the two lockerrooms, following the normal cooling-off period. BGSU observes a closed lockerroom policy.

WEEKLY PRESS CONFERENCE

Coach Gary Blackney will hold a regular weekly press conference during the season on Monday at 11:00 a.m. in his office on the east side of the stadium. All members of the media are welcome to attend.

MEDIA DAY

The annual preseason media day will be held the morning of Friday, August 11 at Doyt L. Perry Stadium. The players and coaching staff will be available for photographs and interviews by members of the radio, television and print media.

PARKING

A special media parking lot is located adjacent to Doyt L. Perry Stadium, near the southwest corner of the stadium. Access to the media lot is by Alumni Drive which connects Mercer Road (near the Alumni Center) and Wooster Street (near the Information Booth). Admission to the media lot is restricted to people holding the correct credential acquired from the athletic communications office. All media members are asked to enter the stadium through the press gate (Gate 2) at the southwest corner of the stadium.

DIRECTIONS TO DOYT PERRY STADIUM

Perry Stadium is located just off of I-75, the quickest and most convenient way to get to the stadium. Take exit 181 off of I-75 and go west on Wooster Street. The stadium will be visible from I-75. At the first traffic light on Wooster (Alumni Drive), turn right where an attendant will direct you to the media lot. I-75 is easily accessible from all directions.



southwest corner of the stadium, a short walk from the media parking lot.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Photo passes for newspaper photographers, and, under special circumstances, for free-lance photographers, are available from the athletic communications office. Photo passes entitle the photographer access to the sideline, the lockerroom after the game and the press box.

PRESS BOX SERVICES

Members of the media will be provided with game programs, flip cards, current statistics and lastminute pregame notes prior to the start of the game. Statistical summaries will include play-byplay, quarter stats, halftime stats, complete team and individual stats and tackles. There are two telephones in the press box for use after the game. Once the athletic communications staff has completed reports to the wire services and television stations, these phones will be available, free of charge, to members of the media for collect or credit-card calls. One Sharp UX-510 fax machine will also be available on a first-come, first serve basis.

RADIO & TELEVISION

There are a limited number of radio booths in the press box at Doyt L. Perry Stadium. Requests

for permission to broadcast must be made in writing at least THREE WEEKS prior to the game. A rights fee of \$100 will be charged to broadcast. The fee will be waived for the official station of the visitors. There is space is each booth for four persons. Phone lines can be ordered through General Telephone Company (800/483-4600). There are no regularly reserved booths for television, so anyone wishing to televise a game from Doyt L. Perry Stadium should contact the athletic communications office at least ONE MONTH prior to the game, and preferably before the start of the season.

Media members can access Falcon football information via MediaTeamlink and also through InfoConnection. Releases, standings, statistics and other Bowling Green sports information are available by accessing www.mediateamlink.com. You can have documents delivered directly to your e-mail and/or fax the moment they are updated. You can also view documents online. MediaTeamlink is free to all accredited media. Log on to www.mediateamlink.com if you do not already have an account, click the "Sign Up Here" button and complete the short form. Documents requested via fax will incur a \$0.15 per page fee. This site is for ACCREDITED MEDIA only. Pivotal Communications will conduct an audit to eliminate non-accredited media. Documents are still available via InfoConnection. The press box at Perry Stadium is named in honor of long-time sports information director Don Cunningham. In Oct., 1992, the University honored Cunningham for 33 years of service to the athletic department in various capacities, the most lengthy as SID (1945-65). Cunningham also attended and graduated from BGSU ('43) and following his retirement in 1979 served as the curator of the BGSU Athletic Archives. Cunningham was inducted into the College Sports Information Directors of America Hall of Fame in 1981. He passed away in June of 2000.

RADIO

The flagship station of Bowling Green State University football is WBVI-FM (96.7) in Findlay. Select Falcon games will also be carried by WFOB-AM (1430) in Fostoria. Dave Horger returns again this season as the play-by-play voice for the Falcons. Horger has been doing BGSU football games in one capacity or another since the 1980 season. Former BGSU quarterback Mark Miller will again join Horger this season as the analyst. Miller is beginning his 11th season in that capacity.





Our 723 full-time faculty place teaching as a high priority, yet remain involved in research and other activities that enable them to bring the latest knowledge to their classrooms. Students can easily find their teachers before and after class, and faculty are eager to work in partnership with undergraduate students.

"SMALL COLLEGE" CLASSES

At BGSU senior faculty (assistant professors and above) are committed to teaching introductory-level courses and class sizes are reasonable. The largest class a student might encounter as a freshman would have 294 students and there are only a handful of these. Large lecture classes traditionally break down for small-group discussions and/



or laboratories at least once a week. All in all, students find the quality academics characteristic of a major university combined with the personal attention traditionally available at a small college—an ideal mix for success.

THE BIG DIFFERENCE

- 20 to 1 student to faculty ratio
- Ninety percent of the full-time faculty have the highest degree in their field.
- In fall 2000, about 79 percent of 100- and 200-level classes were taught by full- or part-time faculty; 21 percent were taught by graduate assistants.
- In fall semester 2000, 89 percent of all freshmanlevel classes had fewer than 50 students and 55 percent had fewer than 25 students.
- Only 13 BGSU courses are taught in lecture sessions with 100 or more students.





THE RESIDENTIAL ADVANTAGE

Living on campus is a big part of a BGSU education—so big that freshmen and sophomores are required to live in University housing unless they commute from home.

The residence halls are small communities, just minutes away from classes, dining centers, the library, Student Recreation Center and downtown. They're places where students learn to appreciate the diversity of the campus and have opportunities to become involved in programs that will develop their leadership abilities. Research shows that students who live in the residence hall their first year as a college student are more likely to earn higher grades and graduate! And, those who live on campus at BGSU meet people who become their friends for life.

CHOICES, CHOICES, CHOICES

BGSU offers a variety of living choices, from newly renovated halls that feature food-court dining to air-conditioned suites that are popular with upperclass students. Some halls have "theme floors" for students who share common interests (music, health sciences, honors, cultural diversity). All provide a smoke-free environment. No rooms house more than two students.

WE DO THE DISHES!

Everyone loves BGSU's awardwinning dining services. Traditional dining centers, snack bars, delicatessens, food courts and convenience stores offer a variety of foods. Each semester students purchase a meal plan that will provide the amount of food to fit their individual lifestyle.

THE COMMUTER CONNECTION

Approximately 11,000 of BGSU's 18,000 main campus students choose to commute to the University. Nearly 7,000 travel from their residences in dozens of northwest Ohio communities and another 4,000 from apartments and homes throughout the city of Bowling Green.

Commuter students enjoy several distinct advantages, including a centrally located student center, convenient highway access to the campus and a free, reliable shuttle service.

SAFETY IS OUR PRIORITY

BGSU is located in a classic college town, away from large urban areas. The Department of Public Safety provides roundthe-clock police protection and sponsors many crime prevention programs. A Campus Escort Service, University shuttle, sophisticated outdoor lighting system, 911 telephone system and outdoor emergency telephones combine to provide an environment that feels safe and secure. All residence halls have electronic door access security systems and are staffed during latenight hours.

Two of three BGSU students say campus involvement contributes to their success at BGSU. Involvement gives students the opportunity to develop leadership skills, meet new people, help others through community service and develop values that extend throughout their lifetime. Most BGSU students are active



in an average of four organizations by their junior year. Firstyear students are encouraged to get involved in at least one organization while they establish themselves academically.

SAVOR THE CULTURE

Music. Theater. Art. Dance. BGSU has it all. The University offers more than 400 cultural events each year, ranging from star-studded concert series to student productions. The Moore Musical Arts Center, with its two major performance halls, and the Fine Arts Center, with two exhibition galleries and spacious, well-equipped studios, are among the finest facilities for the fine and performing arts in the country.

LEAP INTO ACTION

Action-packed. That's the way students describe BGSU's recreational sports program. The Student Recreation Center and Perry Field House offer indoor running tracks and swimming pools, basketball courts, weight rooms and a 70-yard football field covered with artificial turf. Bowling Green also has an ice arena, tennis courts and an 18hole golf course. Those who enjoy the challenge of outdoor sports can participate in offcampus adventures ranging from rock-climbing and kayaking to backpacking, whitewater rafting and downhill skiing.

Students also flock to Falcon athletic events where they experience thrilling competition with 22 NCAA Division 1 intercollegiate athletic teams for men and women.


ATHLETIC ACADEMIC AFFAIRS

The Office of Athletic Academic Affairs is one that all studentathletes become quite familiar with upon their arrival on campus. While all student-athletes have faculty advisors, the athletic academic staff assists with the special needs of student-athletes given the constraints placed on their time due to travel and practice schedules.

This office continually monitors the eligibility of student-athletes by assessing and evaluating each individual record to ensure that the student-athlete meets all NCAA, MAC, and University rules and regulations as they relate to the academic satisfactory progress of the student-athlete. Athletic Academic Affairs is in constant communication with faculty and faculty advisers via written progress reports, individual meetings, and by telephone to make certain that student-athletes are progressing toward a timely graduation.

Led by Dr. Jack Taylor, Athletic Academic Affairs also assists student-athletes in the classscheduling process and coordinates study sessions for studentathletes. These study sessions may involve tutors, math labs, writing labs, mentor groups or team-required study tables.

In addition, Athletic Academic Affairs works closely with the Student Financial Aid staff to assist student-athletes who need support through personal, state, and federal loans and coordinates the Falcon Quest program.

FALCON QUEST


BGSU is dedicated to the education of its student-athletes not only in the classroom or on the field of play, but in the "real world" as well. For this reason, a special program was developed in the Athletic Department called Falcon Quest.

As part of Falcon Quest, each of the 22 varsity sports teams is required to undertake at least one community service project every year. These projects range from volunteering at the Special Olympics events held on the BGSU campus to visiting residents at the local nursing homes and participating in the Big Brothers and Big Sisters Bowl-A-Thon.

The Falcon Quest program also gives individual studentathletes an opportunity to become more involved in the community through public speaking engagements, mentoring of younger student-athletes and children, and other community service events.

This past year, BGSU quarterback Andy Sahm took the Falcon Quest program to El Salvador, Central America, over spring break. While in El Salvador, Andy worked with other volunteers to help harvest crops and build homes. Andy described his experience as very rewarding, and he has urged his fellow teammates and student-athletes to become more involved in similar volunteer programs.

DR. JACK TAYLOR INTERIM ASSISTANT ATHLETICS DIRECTOR FOR ACADEMIC AFFAIRS

Dr. Jack Taylor received his doctorate in education administration and supervision from Bowling Green State University in 1985 and has been working at the University since 1978. Before assuming the role of Interim Assistant Athletics Director, Dr. Taylor served as Coordinator of Undergraduate Advising Initiatives, where he was responsible for coordinating University-wide activities and programs to improve the quality of undergraduate advising and increase student retention. He has also served as the Assistant Vice President for Student Affairs, where he was responsible for the administration of the Office of Multicultural Affairs, the Student Health Center, the Counseling Center, Career Services and Student Employment, among other duties.

A 1971 graduate of the California University of Pennsylvania, Dr. Taylor is very active in the area of multicultural affairs and diversity training. He has presented numerous papers and workshops on race and ethnic relations and has served as adjunct assistant in the Department of Ethnic Studies. He is a member of the American College Personnel Association, the Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, the Mid-America Association of Educational Opportunity Program Personnel, the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators, the Ohio Association of Student Personnel Administrators and the Ohio Consortium of Blacks in Higher Education.

An active member of the community, Dr. Taylor is very involved with youth basketball. He coaches an elementary school traveling team, and he is the commissioner for the Toledo Area Metropolitan Basketball League. That's the motto across the BGSU campus, and it's also the motto in the athletic training rooms.


With state of the art equipment and a qualified and helpful staff, the Falcons' training room is a place where studentathletes can feel comfortable and safe.

The Falcon training staff focuses not only on student-athlete injuries, but also on nutrition. Athletics, especially a sport like football, require tremendous energy. Our trainers work with the student-athletes to help them understand the importance of a well-balanced diet to supply the energy they will need during an intense workout. The team physicians are an important part of the every day operation of the training room. Considered members of the BGSU Athletic Department staff, the "docs" are regular visitors to campus, and they are always on call in case of emergency.

BGSU also has a staff of professional consultants with specialties ranging from dentistry to podiatry. The Student Health Center staff is also available for studentathlete appointments.

BGSU houses seven athletic training rooms, with the football training room located underneath Doyt Perry Stadium. The football training room is fully equipped to handle most athletic injuries.







BILL JONES DIRECTOR OF SPORTS MEDICINE

Bill Jones is in his 27th year in charge of the intercollegiate sports medicine personnel at BGSU. The South Amherst, Ohio, native handles a crew of more than 20 men and women trainers. He joined the staff in 1974, following a three-year stint as head athletic trainer and golf coach at Ashland College.

Jones is a 1966 graduate of BGSU and the holder of a master's degree from the University. He is a certified member of the National Athletic Trainers Association and a well-known clinician. Jones has served as the regional site coordinator for the NATA certification exam.

In 1997, he was appointed to the NATA College-University Athletics Trainer Committee as well as being inducted into the Ohio Athletic Trainers Hall of Fame. He was also the first trainer ever named to the NCAA Ice Hockey Rules Committee.

CHARLES E. PERRY FIELD HOUSE

This \$8.7 million and 125,000-square foot facility opened its doors in January of 1993. It has two wings, a turf area and a track area. The Jack Gregory Turf Room, named after the former BGSU Athletic Director, is a regulation width football field that measures 90 yards in length. The ceiling is 50 feet high at its peak. These dimensions allow for a full practice during inclement weather. The track area includes a 200-m track and the appropriate high jump, long jump, and pole vault areas. The facility is used for classes, intramurals, and team practices.



DOYT PERRY STADIUM PRACTICE FIELDS

With plenty of land surrounding Doyt Perry Stadium, BGSU has three full outdoor practice fields. These practice fields are maintained almost as meticulously as the impeccable game field, allowing for game like conditions and greater ease breaking down into offensive, defensive and special teams drills.

BGSU FITNESS CENTER

A \$300,000 and 5,800 square-foot facility, the BGSU Fitness Center is conveniently located on the ground level of the west side of Doyt Perry Stadium. Since its opening in 1988, it has been "fitted" with both free weights and Nautilus equipment.

COACHING STAFF

GARY BLACKNEY

A man who believes in discipline. A man who will do whatever it takes to get the most out of his players. A man who is respected by his peers, players, and community. This man is BGSU head football coach Gary Blackney.

Now in his tenth season at the helm, Blackney looks to take his 2000 squad back to the top of the Mid-American Conference standings, where the Falcons finished in his first two years at Bowling Green.

Currently the 26th-winningest active Div. I-A coach in the country, Blackney took over as head coach in 1991, inheriting a team that had suffered through five losing seasons in a row.

He resurrected a once-proud football program in just his first season, guiding the Falcons to an 11-1 record, which earned the team a Mid-American Conference championship and a trip to the California Raisin Bowl. Another MAC title would follow in 1992, and the Falcons finished finished second and third, respectively, in his next two years as head coach.

The 1994 team came within one game of making it three titles in four years playing for the conference title in the final game of the regular season.

To get an idea of how dominant Falcon teams were in MAC play during Blackney's first four seasons, consider the fact BG had a perfect record for 26 of the 32 weeks of league play during the period. In addition, Bowling Green did not have a loss on its slate for 29 of those 32 weeks. All in all, Blackney led his teams to an eye-popping 28-2-2 (.906) record in MAC play during those four seasons.

In eight seasons, Blackney has accomplished what some have not in a lifetime. He is the first, and only, BGSU coach to win a bowl game. He is the first BGSU coach to lead his team to back-to-back seasons of at least 10 wins. He tied the NCAA record for "rookie"

head coaches, winning 11 games in 1991. And, he led the program to a MAC-record 19 consecutive conference wins and a 22-game unbeaten streak to begin his tenure.

Blackney would like nothing better than to get the Falcons back among the elite teams in the MAC this season after his squads have struggled the last five seasons. With six new assistant coaches on staff, there is a renewed drive and fresh outlook among the staff and players to get the program back to the top of the MAC ladder.

But, overcoming obstacles is something Blackney, as a coach and person, has grown accustomed to.

All Blackney did, in not only his first season at BGSU but his first season as a collegiate head coach, was take a 3-5-2 team and turn them into a 11-1 squad, which won their last 10 games. The Falcons clinched the MAC title with two weeks of the league schedule remaining. The final standings showed BG with a perfect 8-0 mark while the second-place team finished at 3-1-4.

The top first-year coach in the country, Blackney was just the fifth coach in MAC history to lead his team to an outright conference title in his first season. He also remains the winningest first-year head coach in BGSU history, equalling the NCAA record for most wins by a coach in his first season in the top spot. The 11 wins by the 1991 team tied the school record.

For an encore, with the Falcons no longer an unknown as they were in 1991, the 1992 favorites gladly accepted that role and again won the league title with a perfect record of 7-0. The Falcons earned the right to represent the MAC in the first Las Vegas Bowl and backed up the program's first bowl victory in 1991 over Fresno State in the California Bowl with a thrilling 35-34 win over Nevada in Las Vegas.

With his continued success, he also ranks among the best in NCAA history in victories to start a career. He ranks among the top five with 11 wins in his first season (third on the list), 21 in two seasons (tied for fifth on the list), and ninth all-time with 36 wins in his first four seasons.

Needless to say, the success that Blackney has brought to the program has also meant some prestigious honors along the way.

He became only the second coach in league history to earn Coach of the Year honors in backto-back seasons earning the award in 1991 and 1992. He was also named the Coach of the Year in region 3 by his peers, the American Football Coaches Association, the same two seasons. The region included all I-A schools in the states of Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, Illinois and Big Ten member schools Wisconsin, Minnesota and Iowa. The BGSU mentor was also the 1992 Ohio Collegiate Coach of the Year.

In February, 1996 he was named to the prestigious 16-member Board of Trustees for the American Football Coaches Association. The board formulates policy and provides direction for its more than 7,500 members.

A little less than ten years ago, Blackney realized his dream of becoming a collegiate head coach. He certainly paid his dues after serving as an assistant the previous 21 years at such programs as Wisconsin, UCLA, Syracuse and, most recently, Ohio State. The names of mentors he had the opportunity to work with as an assistant ring familiar in the ears of college football enthusiasts...Dick MacPherson, Terry Donahue, Earle Bruce, Rick Forzano and John Cooper.

The Plainview, New York native began his coaching career at his alma mater, the University of Connecticut, in 1968, where he spent two seasons as a graduate assistant on a staff that included, in addition to Forzano, former Notre

Dame head coach Lou Holtz, former Cleveland Browns head coach Sam Rutigliano, and Dave Adolph and Dan Sekanovich, both NFL assistant coaches.


His stay at UCONN was followed by stops at Brown and Rhode Island, in addition to the aforementioned schools, with all but two of those seasons spent on the defensive side of the ball.

His success story is certainly one that makes all people feel thankful.

Taking over the duties of running the household alone, Blackney still kept up with the demands of being a head coach and a father of four children.

Tim Beckman, 34, joined the program in March, 1998, as the coach of the secondary, but he took over last year as the defensive coordinator while also remaining the recruiting coordinator.

Prior to his appointment at BGSU, the Berea, Ohio native spent two seasons at Elon College in North Carolina as the defensive coordinator and defensive backs coach.

The previous six years he was the secondary coach and recruiting coordinator at Western Carolina. While at Western Carolina, he helped in the development of Willie Williams, who was a sixth-round pick of the Pittsburgh Steelers and led the AFC in interceptions in 1995.

The Catamounts finished second in the Southern Conference in both 1992 and 1993.

Before taking over the reins at Ohio, Lichtenberg served one season (1989) as the head football coach at the University of Maine, where he was Yankee Conference Coach of the Year, and one season as the assistant head coach at Northern Iowa (1988).

Lichtenberg has also coached on the same sideline with Blackney before, when both were assistants at Ohio State under Earl Bruce. Lichtenberg was the quarterbacks and receivers coach for the 1986 and 1987 seasons, having the opportunity to develop the talent of former Buckeye great Cris Carter.

Before a three-year administrative stint at Iowa State as an Assistant Athletics Director, he spent two seasons at Notre Dame as the offensive coordinator, running backs coach, and quarterbacks coach.

Banks started his coaching career at Bowling Green in 1996 as a graduate assistant coach for the defensive staff.



Now an offensive line and tight ends coach at BG, Bridge held a similar position at The Citadel for the past four years. He had additional responsibilities as the recruiting coordinator. In his tenure there, he coached a total of seven all-league players, including a two-time all-conference center and an All-America and all-conference right guard.

Prior to his position at The Citadel and following his first appointment at BGSU, Bridge received a second master's degree, this time in Sport Psychology, from the University of Virginia. As a graduate assistant on the Cavalier staff, he served as an offensive assistant and was responsible for the defensive and special teams scout teams. In each of his two seasons with UVa, the Cavaliers were bowl bound, winning the Independence Bowl in 1994 and the Peach Bowl in 1995. A 1988 graduate of the University of Cincinnati, Jenkins was a four-year letterwinner there and earned the Iron Cat Award, given to the strongest student-athlete in power per pound. He was also ranked in the top 10 nationally in kick-off and punt returns for three of his four years as a Bearcat. Jenkins also earned a pair of letters in track while at UC.

Jenkins, a native of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., found a way to mesh his knowledge of football with his motivational techniques in the weight room at Western Kentucky University. While there, he served as the passing game coordinator, wide receivers coach, and strength and conditioning coach. He also had his first introduction to BGSU, coaching on Jack Harbaugh's Hilltopper staff. Harbaugh, a 1961 graduate of BGSU, was an all-conference defensive back.


Miller was a double major at UWL, majoring in both marketing – sales/promotions and business administration. He is working toward a master's degree in marketing education at BGSU.

Last year, Wood also served as an assistant boys' track and field coach at South Milwaukee High School, coaching the hurdle and sprint events.


Wood will be working toward a master's degree in sports administration at BGSU. He received his BS in sports management from Valparaiso.

SEASON OUTLOOK

Optimism is high in the Bowling Green State University football camp as the team prepares for the 2000 season. Head coach **Gary Blackney** enters his 10th season at the Falcon helm, recharged by a strong finish to the 1999 season, a solid showing in spring ball, and a number of new assistants on his staff. Blackney and the Falcons feel that the ingredients are in place for a return to the upper echelon of the Mid-American Conference.

The Falcons are coming off a 5-6 campaign in 1999, but BGSU won the last three games of the season. Success is nothing new to the Falcons, as BGSU was perhaps the premier MAC team in the early 90's, recording a 28-2-2 mark within the league. With 14 starters returning, this could be the season for BGSU to find itself heading back toward the top of the division standings.

Blackney feels that the success will start on the defensive side of the ball, where the Falcons have a whopping nine starters back. BG also has five offensive starters returning, including many of the top skilled-position players. Two key starters return to anchor the offensive line, and that group could be a key to the Falcons' overall success in the year 2000.

OFFENSE

Blackney is excited about the experience of his football team on both sides of the ball. On offense, the skilled-position players have gone through the rigors of MAC football before, and know what it takes to succeed against tough conference opponents week-in and week-out.

"You look at skilled-position players like Kurt Gerling, Aaron Alexander, Joe Alls and Godfrey Lewis," said Blackney. "Those guys have been playing a lot of football for us, and yet they're only juniors. And, Joe Alls is a sophomore.

"A couple of years ago we played a lot of young players. We

experienced some of the pains of playing with young players, and now, these guys are veteran players. They've been in the program, learned the system and experienced success. Now, the key for those players is to continue to grow, to try to maximize their abilities and potential and not remain stagnant. If that happens, then we just need the offensive line to develop. That will be the key on the offensive side of the ball.


"I feel like we have the athletes to have a good offensive line. But, we lost three starters who, between them, had played for three or four years (each). So, the coordination and the maturation of the offensive line is something that has to happen."

The Falcons appear to be in good shape at quarterback, where a pair of players have starting experience. Sophomore **Andy Sahm** started the last seven games of 1999, and heads into the fall as the number-one signal-caller. In his first career start, Sahm ripped arch-rival Toledo for 302 yards in the air as BG posted a 34-23 win. For the year, Sahm completed 77 of 152 passes for 1,088 yards, tossed seven touchdowns and was only picked off three times. He scrambled for three scores as well.

"Andy had some excellent games last year," said Blackney. "He just needs to be a little bit more consistent. He is a young player, but he has the size and all the physical tools. Andy also has the intelligence and the competitiveness that, if he continues to grow as a quarterback, will give him a chance to be an all-star caliber player."

Senior **Ricky Schneider** also returns, and Schneider is not your typical backup. He has started several games in each of the last three years, and made four starts a year ago. Schneider completed 22 passes for 271 yards and a careerhigh four touchdowns in the Kent game last September, and totalled 11 TD throws on the season. Schneider gives Blackney several options behind the center.

"That's a big plus for us, to have both Ricky and Andy at the quarterback position," Blackney said. "It's nice to have a senior quarterback behind the scenes that can really come in with a lot of poise, a lot of knowledge and an understanding of both our offense and of opponents' defenses. Ricky can really help us out if and when that

situation arises. So, that's a nice position for us to be in."

When the Falcon quarterback – be it Sahm or Schneider – takes the snap and turns to make the handoff, there will be no shortage of capable backs waiting to carry the ball. Sophomore **Joe Alls** and juniors **Godfrey Lewis** and **John Gibson** all possess talent and experience.

Alls led the team with 592 yards rushing and an average of 5.1 yards per carry in his initial season. He came into his own late in the year, rushing for 467 yards over the last four games, including a season-high 155 vs. Ball State. Lewis, who was BG's top rusher as a freshman in 1998, gained an even 500 yards and scored a teamhigh six rushing touchdowns last year.

Alls and Lewis are ranked nationally among the top returning rushing tandems for the 2000 season. The duo combined for 1,092 yards last year, the 10th-most of any returning rushing duo in the country.

Gibson proved to be a reliable back when he got his chances last season, totalling 109 yards. He had three rushing scores as a freshman in 1998.

"That is a good combination of backs, and we're very fortunate to have some versatility with all of those kids," said the head coach. "Finding a way to get them in the lineup and utilize their talents is going to be a challenge for our coaches, but they're all talented players."

The Falcons also return a pair of talented receivers, led by junior wideout **Kurt Gerling**. Coming off a 1998 campaign in which he was named the MAC's Freshman of the Year, Gerling put to rest any notions of a sophomore slump. Gerling led the team with 53 catches and 775 yards, and scored five touchdowns. Gerling has caught at least one pass in all 22 of his games as a Falcon, the ninthlongest current streak in the nation.

Robert Redd (39 grabs, 552 yards, six TDs) is gone, but **Aaron**

Alexander is ready to take over at split end after a solid 1999 season. Alexander caught 35 balls for nearly 500 yards a year ago, and combined with Gerling for 288 yards receiving in the Akron game. That duo became only the fifth BG receiving combo to have at least 100 yards each in the same game.

Reserves **Cleon Ghant**, Joe **Fisher** and **Andre Pinchem** should provide additional speed and depth at the receiver spots.

The Falcons lost two key members of the offensive corps in fullback Brent Martin and tight end Kevin Steinke. The fullback and tight end spots are traditionally important on Blackney-coached teams, and the duo will be difficult to replace.

Juniors Eric Clark and Doug Kingsbury will battle for time at fullback, while Ross Durham and Jason Van Dam will compete for the starting tight-end job. Clark saw limited action in each of the last two seasons, while Kingsbury is a junior-college transfer. Durham saw time on special teams last fall, while Van Dam sat out as a redshirt. At 6-foot-6, both tight ends give Sahm (or Schneider) a huge target, and will provide big bodies to utilize in blocking situations.

"In our offensive scheme the fullback and tight end are each very valuable, not only in the running game, but also the passing," said Blackney. "Replacing Martin and Steinke will be very difficult because they were senior players, and we will now be playing with younger players at both positions.

"That's going to be a situation where a young player like Eric Clark will need to step up. He came off of back surgery this past winter, and really had a good spring. We recruited Doug Kingsbury, a junior-college player, to come in and help us out in that area.

"At tight end, I think Ross Durham has a lot of potential, and I really like Jason Van Dam. He had a very good spring. The only problem is that does not have any game experience, but he's got size, speed and athleticism, and he catches the ball very well. Again, he just needs to get a little experience and to understand the system."

Another question mark to Falcon followers is the offensive line, but Blackney feels that the ingredients for success are there. A pair of experienced players return to anchor the line in senior co-captains **Rob Fehrman** and **Eric Curl**. Fehrman, an All-MAC candidate, has started 33 consecutive games heading into the 2000 season, and will return to his familiar left-tackle spot.

Curl, after starting 22 consecutive games at right guard, will move to center this season to replace the graduated Doug Dorley, who was invited to training camp by the NFL's Cincinnati Bengals. Curl actually started the first two games of his freshman season before breaking his foot.

A number of younger players have been awaiting a chance to step into the starting lineup, and that chance is now.

"Offensive line is an area where we've recruited well over the last several years," said Blackney. "And, we do have two real focal points in Rob Fehrman and Eric Curl.

"I really feel that Rob can be as good an offensive lineman as there is in the league. Eric is a tough player and he had a very good spring. They both will do an excellent job of leading because of the kind of character and intelligence they both possess.

"We will be building the offensive line around those anchor points, and we do have some young players that have a chance to be very good."

Among those players are juniors **Mike Bodnar** and **Malcolm Robinson** and sophomores **Jon Mazur**, **Dennis Wendel**, **Greg Kupke** and **Ryan Yeager**. Mazur appears to have the inside track for the left-guard position, with Bodnar giving him a run for his money. Kupke and Yeager enter the fall listed one-two at right guard. Robinson, a defensive starter last year, could start at right tackle, but will be pushed by fifthSEASON OUTLOOK

year senior **Eric Gilbo**. Wendel should see time at the tackle spots as well.

"Mike Bodnar has been in the program for four years, and could really step up and make a contribution," said Blackney. "Jon Mazur and Greg Kupke are two of the more athletic players that we've had around here. Both of those players will compete for starting positions.

"At right tackle, because of injuries, we were without two players. Eric Gilbo is coming off knee surgery. We would all like to see Eric have an opportunity to step up and have some success. He's been in the program now for five years, he's had to battle the injury bug, and hopefully this will be his year.

"Behind him we have a young player, Dennis Wendel, who is very athletic. He even played some tight end for us last year in our two-tight-end schemes. And then, on top of that, realizing that we've had some problems, injury-wise, we moved Malcolm Robinson to tackle.

"The talent and ability is there; it's just a matter of getting the kinks out and creating a well-coordinated component of our offense. But, certainly, there's a lot of reason for optimism. I think, with the leadership of Curl and Fehrman, we have some guys that are just waiting to blossom."

DEFENSE

When talking about the Falcon defense, it is difficult for Blackney to contain his excitement. A total of nine starters from last season are back. The head coach, who has seen a plethora of young faces line up at starting spots over the past several years, is looking forward to reaping the rewards of the experience gained during that time.

"We have nine defensive starters returning, and I really think we're as athletic and skilled in our defensive front as we have been in a long time. As I look at our defense overall, and especially our

front seven, the biggest thing we have going for us is the fact that we have a lot of people that have played a lot of football. They understand the system and they have a better feel for the techniques within the schemes. Again, I think that relates to their experience."

Blackney is particularly encouraged by his front seven. The Falcons lost just one starter from that group in middle linebacker Joe O'Neill. After a stellar career in the Brown and Orange, O'Neill joins his brother, Kevin, in the Detroit Lions training camp. The bulk of the other defensive standouts from 1999 are back, led by senior end **D.J. Durkin**. Blackney calls Durkin the "heart and soul of the defense.

"D.J. is the key guy on our defense," said the coach. "He will be a second-year captain, he's coming off an ankle problem that hopefully has been resolved, and there's not a player on our football team that has more of a passion for the game or plays with more energy and effort. He really sets the standard for our defense and raises the bar. D.J. has the ability to elevate the level of play of everyone around him."

Junior **Ryan Wingrove** will return at the other end, while senior nose guard **Brandon Hicks** also is back. Wingrove is a very athletic player, while Hicks shared team Defensive MVP honors with O'Neill in 1999.

"Ryan has excellent speed for a defensive lineman," said Blackney. "He will be even a better player at that position, now that he has a year of starting experience under his belt.

"Brandon sat out spring ball due to mononucleosis, but he's a very productive guy, very athletic. He is a player that could achieve allstar type status this year."

Yet another returnee, but the lone new starter, on the line is **D.J. Owchar**. A sophomore, he saw action in eight games behind Malcolm Robinson last year. With Robinson's move to the offensive side of the ball, and Hicks suffering from mono, Owchar got a ton of playing time in the spring.

"D.J., in my opinion, was one of the most improved players on

the defense, if not the whole team, this spring," said Blackney. "He really has put himself in position to be a solid starter on the line."

Also battling for time on the line will be Rodney Dawson and the Glantzis brothers, Alex and Chris. Dawson, a junior-college transfer, saw time on the line in '99, and made his first BGSU start in the win over Toledo. Alex Glantzis, a sophomore, played in five games in his initial collegiate campaign. His brother, a junior, sat out the 1999 season after transferring from Youngstown State. Chris Glantzis helped the Penguins to an NCAA Division I-AA championship in 1997 and totalled 42 tackles in nine games the following year. According to Blackney, both players are capable of playing inside or outside on the line. Blackney feels that it all adds up to a promising future for the D-line.

"The move of Malcolm Robinson to the other side of the ball shows the depth and the quality that we think we have in the defensive line. We have excellent talent, and we're probably as deep at those positions as we are anywhere, in terms of both talent and experience."

At linebacker, a pair of juniors will man the outside spots. Both **Khary Campbell** and **Garry Fisher** will be in their third year as starters, and should benefit from the experience gained.

"I mentioned how encouraging it is that we have so much depth in our defensive line," said Blackney.

"I feel the same way about our linebackers. Kids like Khary Campbell and Garry Fisher started as redshirt freshmen.

"We have gone through some growing pains in some positions on the defensive side of the ball, and now those players have accumulated a lot of playing time and have gotten a lot of experience. Again, we're very athletic in those positions, and we have some depth."

Senior **Chris Della Vella** looks to be the replacement for O'Neill, and could play a key role for the Falcons. Sophomores **Geno Burden** and **Chris Haneline** and freshman **Mitch Hewitt** all should see their share of time in the lineup as well.

"The guy who had a phenomenal spring, in my opinion, was Chris Della Vella," said Blackney. "He really came out of nowhere to take over the middle linebacker position. Chris has seen some playing time over the years, and it just seems like he's going to take advantage of this – his last opportunity – to really play a significant role on our defense.

"Mitch Hewitt, only a redshirt freshman, looked really good in spring ball. We will need to try to find a way to get him on the field, because he might have been the most productive LB in the spring. He just seems to always be around the ball, and he makes plays.

"I guess you can see my reason for feeling good about the defense, just from some of the guys I've mentioned."


A pair of juniors will look to anchor the secondary. **Chad Long** and **Karl Rose** have combined to start 36 games over the last two years, with Long starting all 22 contests during that time. Long, who looks to be the starter at strong safety, led the team with 111 tackles a year ago. He is considered one of the nation's most underrated players, according to CBS Sportsline. Long actually made two starts in 1997 before breaking his thumb and earning a medical hardship season.

"The secondary is another area where we have some experience," said Blackney. "Look at Karl Rose and Chad Long, in particular. Here are two more guys who will be in their third year playing a lot of football for us. They should be pretty good football players at this point."

Rose is pencilled in at one starting cornerback spot, with senior **Ken Dobbs** at the other corner. Junior **Sergio Lund** is the leader in the competition at free safety, with junior **Jerry Wagner** as his backup. Dobbs started the final two games a year ago, and has made nine career starts, while Lund started the final four games of '99. Wagner was one of BG's top special-teams players a year ago.

"Kenny Dobbs is going to be a senior, and he is yet another guy that has played a lot of football," said Blackney. "It is really time for him to step up and play a significant role, and there are some young players that need to do the same thing.

"It's no secret that we have had trouble covering people. That has been an Achilles heel for us for a long time. It is a tough position to play, and those guys are hard to find.

"That may be the key for our defense: to find a couple of corners to complement the other members of the secondary, and then to tie them into the front seven."

Blackney feels good about his defense as a whole, and says that group will need to lead the team in the early going of the 2000 campaign.

"We will have to hang our hat on the defense early in the season. They will need to hold us in games until our offense can develop and mature a little bit more. But, in my experience, both at Bowling Green and looking at the rest of the conference, it's very difficult to position yourself to win the division or win the championship without playing good defense."

SPECIAL TEAMS

One of BGSU's key losses came in the special teams department, where Jason Strasser has exhausted his eligibility. Strasser hit 24-of-28 field-goal attempts over the past two seasons, and capped a four-year reign as starter with an appearance in the East-West Shrine Bowl.

The primary candidate for the placekicking job will be freshman **Shaun Suisham**. Suisham, an Ontario native, was enrolled in school last spring, but was injured on the first day of spring practice. Junior walk-on **Mike Knapp** and freshman **Kyle Turano** will be in the hunt for the job.

"I guess the biggest question mark that I have, and maybe the biggest question mark on our football team, is who's going to be our kicker," Blackney said. "Shaun came in for the spring semester, and was with us in winter conditioning. But, on the first day of spring practice he pulled a quadricep muscle, and couldn't kick. So, there's an unknown there.

"Michael Knapp came on and did a very nice job as a walk-on. Also, we went out and – probably for the first time since I've been here – we recruited another kicker.

Kyle Turano was a highly-regarded kicker from the Worthington area. We had to get some people in here with some talent, and the challenge is being able to zero in on who our kicker will be when we open up on September 2."

At the punter spot, **Pat Fleming** returns for his sophomore season. Fleming was solid a year ago, averaging 40.3 yards per boot and placed 10 kicks inside the opponents' 20-yard line during his initial year.

"Pat Fleming did a nice job for us last year," said Blackney. "He was one of the top punters in the league, he has a very strong leg, and I think he is going to be a lot more comfortable handling the punting chores this coming year."

Another returnee in the specialteams area is long snapper **Ryan Diepenbrock**, a senior.

Blackney feels that BG's large contingent of returning players at the skilled positions is a harbinger of good things for the Falcons' special teams unit.

"I feel like the coverage and the protection part of our special teams can be outstanding, because those positions are usually manned by skilled-position players. Because of the quality of those players, I think that our special teams in those areas have a chance to be very good."

SEASON OUTLOOK

THE SCHEDULE

The 2000 schedule is a daunting one, even for a school that has always tried to schedule the strongest teams possible in non-conference action. The Falcons open the season with a trip north, facing Michigan in Ann Arbor on Sept. 2. The following weekend, the Brown and Orange will host a bigname opponent at Doyt L. Perry Stadium, taking on Pittsburgh in a 4:00 p.m. start. The Falcons will conclude non-league play with another Big East Conference foe, heading to Philadelphia to face Temple on Sept. 16. The Mid-American Conference opener is set for the following Saturday (Sept. 23) at Buffalo. Blackney is excited about the 2000 schedule.

"Obviously, Michigan is one of the most nationally-recognized programs, and one of the most successful programs, on a national scale. I think Michigan may be the best team we've played, and that's a powerful statement when you consider that we have played teams like Ohio State, Penn State, Alabama, Virginia Tech, Missouri and Kansas State. It is going to be exciting, and it's going to be a tremendous challenge for our team to go and play in front of more than 100,000 people.

"Also, the opportunity to play against Pittsburgh at home is really significant for our program. I can't remember when we've had a team with so much tradition and history coming in to play at Perry Stadium. And then, we play another team (Temple) out of the Big East Conference that is improving and emerging. The toughness of those games helps you prepare for the conference schedule. And, the most important thing for us is to be the very best football team that we're capable of being when we head to Buffalo for our first conference game.'

After that game at UB (Sept. 23), the Falcons conclude a three-game road swing with a contest at Kent. The first weekend in October sees the Brown and Orange hosting Akron in a homecoming matchup. After a trip to Miami, BGSU will play three consecutive home contests, facing Eastern Michigan, Marshall and Ohio. The EMU game will be a 7:00 p.m. start, marking the sixth night game in Perry Stadium history.

The Falcons end the regular season with a game at Toledo on Wednesday, Nov. 22. The game between the arch-rivals is scheduled to be televised nationally.

"The approach I'm going to take with our team is that we have two seasons," Blackney said. "We have a three-game non-league schedule, and then we've got the real season.

"Let's face it; we would love to win any of those games on the front end of our schedule, but we can't judge ourselves by the outcome of the Michigan game. What is most important is how fast we come out of the blocks in our first three MAC games. We play Buffalo, Kent and Akron, and two of those are on the road. Those games are what will define our season."

THE MAC

As always, the Mid-American Conference race shapes up to be as competitive as ever. Blackney sees Marshall as the frontrunner again in 2000.

"Marshall has got to be the team to beat. They've won the MAC the past three years, and they've brought a lot of recognition and prestige to the conference.

"I look at our division, though, and I see a lot of balance. Ohio really improved as the season went on last year. Miami has one of the most talented returning quarterbacks, and an excellent receiver. They have had a lot of tradition and history, and are always a very good team.

"Akron seems like it broke out last year, and the Zips will be a team to contend with. And, Dean Pees has done a better job of positioning Kent to have some success. I don't know a whole lot about Buffalo because we didn't play them last year. But, as you look around our division, I think Marshall has got to be the team to beat – even with their personnel losses to the NFL – because they have raised the bar and set the standard.

"I look at our conference, and really – with the exception of Marshall the last few years – you can put 'em in a hat and shake 'em up, and there is not a whole lot of difference from team to team in the conference."

NEW FACES

Blackney welcomes a number of new coaches to the Falcon fold for his 10th season. Former Ohio University head coach Tom Lichtenberg comes on board as the offensive coordinator. He will also be in charge of the quarterbacks. Al Seamonson will serve as the special teams coordinator while also overseeing the linebackers. Other new additions include Jim Bridge (tight ends/offensive line), Brian Jenkins (running backs). Ron Hudson (offensive line) and former BGSU strength and conditioning coach Mike Ward (defensive line). The returnees include Tim Beckman, who will serve as defensive coordinator and recruiting coordinator, as well as **Dino Dawson** (passing game coordinator/wide receivers) and Tim Banks (defensive backs)

"(The new coaches) bring an excitement to the program," said Blackney. "For the players, it is a chance to wipe the slate clean and get a fresh start. The coaches are simply excited to be here. There is an enthusiasm, an electricity, and I feel it myself. They are here because they want to be here, and there is no replacement for that."

INJURY REPORT

With very few exceptions, Blackney sees the 2000 squad as pain-free heading into fall practice. Not surprisingly, it is vital for the Falcons to keep injuries to a mini-

mum in order to experience success this, or any, season.

"We are probably as healthy as we have ever been, at least heading into preseason," said Blackney. "(Eric) Gilbo had the knee injury, but we have had no surgical injuries other than Dennis Wendel (hand) and D.J. Durkin getting his ankle cleaned up.

"In order for us to have success and position ourselves to compete in the division, we have to stay healthy. That is a key, not only for us, but for a lot of teams (in the MAC). Most of us don't have the kind of depth that we would like to have. But I will say this: in certain positions, we have more depth right now than we've had in a long time around here."

FINAL THOUGHTS

Blackney lists several other factors as instrumental to his 2000 team's success. "One of the things that we did, offensively, in my early years was protect the football. We hurt ourselves a lot last year by not taking care of the ball.

"We also hurt ourselves on defense by not tackling very well. These are fundamental things that are correctable. On defense, we must tackle better, and on offense, we must hang on to the ball. When we made tackles and didn't turn the ball over, we were able to play with a good deal of success and respectability.


"Additionally, when we've been good, we've always been a very physical football team, both offensively and defensively. I would like our team to become more physical so that, when we come out of a game, no matter the score, the other team will say, 'those guys come to play, and they play hard,' and they will know they were in a physical football game.

"We don't want to lose that sense of electricity that surrounds our program right now. We've got to convey to our kids what is important, and what's important is winning our division and getting to that MAC Championship game."

THE MID-AMERICAN CONFERENCE

Since 1946, the Mid-American Conference has grown and developed into one of the most aggressive and progressive conferences in the country. As it enters a new millennium, the Mid-American Conference will continue to lead by example to provide its student-athletes and the member institutions with the best possible opportunities.

In its 54th year of existence, the MAC has not only stood the test of time, but has flourished into forming a league that its founders could not have imagined or dreamed of.

Based in Cleveland since July 1999 following a 15 year stay in Toledo, Ohio, the MAC has been in the forefront of national legislation that has enhanced the academic integrity of intercollegiate athletics. The MAC strengthened admittance standards, established an academic progress rule and set increased grade-point-average requirements long before the NCAA adopted or discussed implementing such academic standards.

Under the direction of Rick Chryst, the seventh commissioner in the history of the MAC, the Mid-American Conference played host to its second NCAA Championship event this past winter in the last four years, hosting the 2000 NCAA Men's Basketball Midwest Regional at The Palace of Auburn Hills in Auburn Hills, Mich.

For the first time in league history, both the men's and women's basketball tournaments were held in Cleveland with each event drawing eight institutions to Gund Arena and Public Hall. The men's tournament, which featured four quarterfinal games decided by a total of six points, set new single session and overall attendance marks.

On the heels of its successful football and men's basketball campaigns, the MAC in conjunction with ESPN announced on June 9, 2000 a new

three-year television agreement. The new deal will feature over 30 football and men's basketball appearances over the terms of the deal, which ends in 2003. Highlighting the programming agreement are exclusive national rights to both the MAC Football Championship Game and the MAC Men's Basketball Championship Game, as well as a minimum of five regular-season football games and nine regularseason basketball appearances over the next three years.

As part of the agreement, the MAC also announced that the 2000 MAC Football Championship Game will be televised live nationally on ABC Sports. The game will be scheduled for Saturday, December 2 at Marshall Stadium in Huntington, W.Va., and will be the first contest of ABC's college football

MOTOR CITY BOWL

After three highly successful years, the Motor City Bowl will again feature the Mid-American Conference champion and an atlarge team.

The fourth edition of the bowl game will be played Dec. 27, 2000, at 4:00 p.m. in the Pontiac Silverdome. The contest will be broadcast live on ESPN.

Under the direction of former Michigan State University head football coach George Perles, the Motor City Bowl has teamed with the MAC since the Bowl's inception in 1997 to feature some of the nation's top players in a highly competitive postseason environment.

The MCB's first three encounters have pitted league champion Marshall against Ole Miss of the Southeastern Conference, Louisville from Conference USA and Brigham Young from the newly-formed Mountain West Conference.

Stars and spectacular performances have emerged from the Motor City Bowl's December competition, including John Avery of Ole Miss; Randy Moss, Chad Pennington and Doug Chapman of Marshall; and Chris Redman of Louisville.

Perles, the bowl's Chief Executive Officer, and Ken Hoffman, Executive Director, have secured sponsorship from the Big Three Automakers – Ford, Daimler Chrysler and General Motors.

The MAC and the Motor City Bowl have a perpetual contract assuring the conference and the Bowl of an affiliation for as long as the bowl and the conference both exist.

Played at the Pontiac Silverdome, also home of the National Football League's Detroit Lions, the Motor City Bowl is easily accessible to MAC fans and alumni.

The inaugural Bowl was played Dec. 26, 1997, and was one of the most exciting games of that bowl season. The University of Mississippi posted a 34-31 win over Marshall before a crowd of 43,340 at the Silverdome.

The game saw two touchdowns scored in the first 41 seconds, including an 80-yard scoring strike from Pennington to Moss. The contest also featured four lead changes in the fourth quarter with Ole Miss winning the game on a Deuce McAllister touchdown run with 31 seconds left.

In the 1998 MCB, Marshall scored 24 unanswered points to start the second half on their way to a 48-29 win over Louisville in front of 52,106 fans. The game featured 1,015 yards of total offense as the Thundering Herd amassed 613 yards, 411 in the air.

Last year, 10th-ranked Marshall faced BYU, which shared the inaugural Mountain West title with Utah and Colorado State. Led by Chapman's MCB-record 87-yard touchdown run, the Herd stifled the Cougars, 21-3.


"Every year the Bowl gets stronger and stronger," said Perles. "The more success you have, the more credibility you have. The more credibility you get, the more respect you earn."

The Bowl will continue to enjoy national television exposure on ESPN, as the game is in the fourth year of a five-year contract with the cable network. Plans are being made by the Bowl to add a basketball doubleheader involving Bowling Green at the Palace of Auburn Hills. As part of that hardwood twinbill, the Falcons are tentatively scheduled to face defending national champion Michigan State University.

The Bowl has the option to extend its at-large bid to any bowleligible school in NCAA Division I-A as the MAC champion's opponent.

The Motor City Bowl has had a positive impact on both the Mid-American Conference and the Detroit area. According to a study done by the Detroit Metro Convention and Visitors Bureau, the bowl had a \$27 million impact on the Metro Detroit area during that first year and \$29.6 million in 1998. Only the North American International Auto Show makes a bigger financial stamp on the Detroit community.

FOOTBALL HISTORY

BOWLING GREEN

BGSU FOOTBALL HISTORY

Since Frederick G. Beyerman, an instructor in the physical education department and first athletic director, announced in July, 1919 that Bowling Green State Normal College would field an intercollegiate football team, a rich tradition has developed.

From that very first team, to the first squad to go unbeaten in 1928, to the first perfect record of the 1959 national college division champions, to, most recently, a run of four bowl appearances in 11 years.

From former head coach Warren Steller, to Max Minnich, the first BGSU player to be drafted by a professional team, to Fred Durig, the first All-America selection, to legendary head coach Doyt Perry, to Paul Miles, the only football player ever to have his jersey retired, to Dave Preston, the career rushing leader, to record-setting quarterback Brian McClure, to current head coach Gary Blackney.

The Bowling Green State University football program has a history as rich as any in the Mid-American Conference, and many programs nationally.

Since 19 of the 30 males enrolled at Normal College banded together to form that first team, many different people, players, and games have combined to mold the history of football at Bowling Green State University.

The following paragraphs will touch on many of the people and games which carved the Falcon football history.

The program got off to a rocky start losing the first seven games played in school history. This still stands as the longest losing streak in history.

Franklin Skibbie scored the first touchdown with BG's only points in the 10-6 loss to Findlay in the 1920 season opener. That team would post a 7-0 win over Kent State Normal College (Kent State) in the season finale to record the first win.

The 1921 squad was the first to win a conference title capturing the Northwest Conference championship with wins over Defiance, Findlay, and Toledo. BG posted a shutout of Findlay, scoring a school-record 151 points in one of the most talked-about games in school history. In the season opener against Kent State, played behind what is now Ridge Street School, the Falcons played possibly the quietest game in school history when all fans were prohibited from making noise because of an illness in the neighborhood.

The following season, BG held its first homecoming game on Nov. 4, 1922, which was played at the Fairgrounds. Bowling Green and Toledo battled to a 6-6 deadlock.

A band made its first appearance at a BGSU football game in 1923



under the direction of E.C. Powell. After having a different coach in each of its first five seasons, Warren Steller was selected to coach the 1924 squad, the beginning of a very successful 11year tenure, the second-longest in school history. Steller was the first BGSU head coach to have an assistant when Paul Landis was hired in 1925.

Led by Chet Chapman, the first

BG player to earn first team All-Ohio honors, the 1928 team posted the first unbeaten record while allowing just 18 points in seven games.

In 1936, the federal government offered to help Bowling Green financially in the construction of a new football stadium and the Trustees accepted the offer. University Stadium was dedicated on October 23, 1937 and served as the home of Falcon football until 1966 when Doyt L. Perry Stadium was built. University Stadium was located in what is now the center of campus directly west of Jerome Library.

After playing mostly "local"

teams previously in its history, the 1940 team made the longest trip in school history to that time to play Eastern Kentucky, a trip of approximately 400 miles.

In 1941, Robert Whittaker was named the head coach at Bowling Green after compiling an 11-year record of 89-19-2 at Sandusky High School. Whittaker's first of his 14 teams (the longest tenure in school history) tied Case Western Reserve for the Ohio Conference title and was thought to be one of the best teams ever, scoring 173 while allowing just 40.

After back-to-back losing seasons in 1953 and 1954, Doyt Perry began his legendary career

Head coach Don Nehlen and the Falcor as the Falcon head coach in 1955 and made an immediate impact. BG posted a 7-1-1 record, scoring 224 points while allowing only 53. This came on the heels of a 2-7 record the previous season.

Perry, whose teams never lost more than two games in any of his 10 seasons, led his 1959 squad to the first perfect record in school history at 9-0-0. In the process, the Falcons were named the mythical small college national champions by the Washington, D.C. Touchdown Club. BG's closest game that season was a Mid-American Conference victory at Ohio University by a 13-9 count to wrap up the perfect season and national honor.

The following season, BG came within one game of repeating as national champions losing only a 14-7 decision to Ohio University at home as the Bobcats claimed top national honors.

In 1961, Bowling Green played in its first bowl game, the Mercy Bowl at the Los Angeles Coliseum. The game against Fresno State was played to raise money to help defray the expenses of the families of 16 members of the Cal Poly San Luis Obispo football team who perished in a plane crash shortly after takeoff from Toledo Express Airport after a 1960 game against BG. The game netted \$170,000 for the memorial fund.

The arrival of a skinny, muchheralded quarterback from Ravenna, Ohio in 1982 signaled the beginning of an 11-year period in which the Falcons would make four bowl appearances.

The quarterback was Brian McClure and all he would do in the next four seasons was lead the Falcons to a 34-12 record, a 19-1 record at home, two bowl games, and become only the second quarterback in NCAA history to pass for over 10,000 yards.

He became the starter in the third game of his freshman season, and despite missing the last two games of the regular season, he became the first freshman to be named the first team all-league quarterback.

He would rewrite the BG and MAC record books before his career was over, setting five NCAA records as well. McClure still holds numerous school and MAC records.

Most recently, in 1991, Gary Blackney was tabbed as the 14th head football coach, and much like

the arrival of McClure, he made an immediate impact on the program.

In his first season, he took a team which compiled a 3-5-2 mark the previous season and molded them into an 11-1 squad going undefeated in the MAC while winning the program's first bowl game.

The following season was more of the same as the Falcons were again perfect in league play and a win over Nevada in the first Las Vegas Bowl made it back-to-back bowl victories.

The 1993 squad would extend the conference winning streak to a league-record 19 games while going unbeaten in the first 22 MAC games of Blackney's tenure.

The 2000 team will look to add another chapter to the BGSU football storybook.



In a one-time game to help defray the expenses (burial and medical) of families of the 16 members of the Cal Poly San Luis Obispo football team who perished in a plane crash, Oct. 29, 1960, shortly after takeoff from Toledo Express Airport, Bowling Green and Fresno State, the undefeated champion of the California Collegiate Athletic Association, met at the historic Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum.

Playing before its largest crowd in school history, the Falcons, sixpoint favorites, were guilty, uncharacteristically, of six turnovers, which was the difference in the game.

BG's defense, which was ranked fourth in the nation, yielded 468 yards, 196 more than it had given up to any opponent during the season. Quarterbacks Beau Carter and Jon Anabo were a thorn in BG's side all

BG scored its only points early in the second stanza on the two-yard run by Ray Bell which was set up on a long pass play between Larry Smith and quarterback Jim Potts.

BG fumbled on its next two possessions with FSU turning the second miscue into a touchdown on a long pass play. Bowling Green did have a pass dropped in the end zone as the first half ended which would have given them the lead.

Fresno State then scored 1:44 apart midway through the third period to put the game away, the second score set up by a fumbled snap on an attempted punt.

The contest netted \$170,000 for the memorial fund which aided the survivors and the relatives of the victims of the plane crash. Cal Poly SLO had played at Bowling Green the afternoon before the crash.

After a full week of events leading up to the meeting with the Pacific Coast Athletic Association champion Fresno State, the Falcons entered the game against the Bulldogs a two touchdown underdog.

The Falcons also had to contend with a partisan sea of red squeezed into Bulldog Stadium, the home of Fresno State.

But, the Falcons drew first blood converting a Jac Tomasello interception on the final play of the first quarter into the first touchdown of the game, a Chip Otten four-yard run capping a 48-yard drive. The Falcons took a 14-0 lead to the locker room after driving 73 yards on their next possession. Sophomore quarterback Brian McClure connected with John Meek on the scoring play.

BG looked to be in the driver's seat after McClure connected with Shawn Potts from five yards out in the third stanza. But, Fresno State answered BG's score with their first of the contest later in the quarter.

Bowling Green came right back as Potts picked up a fumble by receiver Greg Taylor at the five-yard line and ran it in to put the Falcons back up by three touchdowns.

With Fresno State pinned back on its own 20-yard line and facing a third-and-ten, a Falcon stop might put the final nail in the Fresno State coffin. But, FSU gained 15 yards on the third down play and the comeback was on.

With future NFL receiver Stephone Paige running and catching a pass for a touchdown, FSU closed to within six points with three minutes left. BG used up just 1:05 of the clock on its next possession and FSU moved 45 yards in eight plays with Jeff Tedford finding Vince Wesson over the middle with 11 seconds left. Scott Darrow's PAT was the deciding point.

BG gained just 26 yards on nine plays in the fourth quarter while FSU gained 220 of its 453 yards in the final 15 minutes.

The tone for what was expected to be one of the most evenly-matched California Bowls, came earlier in the week when BGSU head coach Denny Stolz told the team before their Wednesday practice he would be leaving after the bowl game to accept the head coaching job at San Diego State.

An indication of what was ahead for the Falcons in the game came early in the first quarter when, trailing 7-0, they drove to the Bulldog one-yard line where they fumbled, the first of five on the day and the same number they had committed in the first 11 games of the season, the ball away in the end zone. Fresno State would score the next 37 points before BG would hit paydirt.

Not even being a double digit underdog against Fresno State could keep the Falcons from completing its storybook season under first-year head coach Gary Blackney.

And the script for this game was all Hollywood.

The first quarter would have led the fans to believe it might take 40 or 50 points to win the game as the Falcons scored touchdowns on their first two possessions and the Bulldogs would get one of those back before the quarter was over.

The scoring continued early in the second stanza as BG's Erik White and Mark Szlachcic hooked up for a second time. But, FSU came right back on their next possession with Anthony Daigle running 57 yards to cut the deficit in half going to the locker room.

The defenses took over in the third quarter, each allowing just 65 yards total offense. Late in the quarter, FSU placekicker Derek Mahoney missed a 26-yard field goal, the most significant scoring opportunity of the quarter.

BG scored early in the final stanza moving 80 yards after the missed field goal to build another 14-point lead.

FSU came right back to score driving 71 yards as quarterback Mark Barsotti completed five-of-six passes, connecting with tight end Marty Thompson from five yards out.

After three changes of possession, FSU started the final drive of the game from their one-yard line, after an interception, with 2:29 remaining.

FSU used its last time out with 24 seconds left and the Bulldogs just nine yards away from the needed touchdown. After a running play for six yards and two incomplete passes, the final play of the game would determine the outcome with three seconds left.

The BG defense rose to the occasion covering all FSU receivers and Barsotti threw incomplete with BG linebacker Kevin O'Brien pressuring. It was BG's first bowl win.

BG won its 11th game making Blackney one of only three coaches in NCAA history to win 11 games in their first season as a head coach.

In the inaugural Las Vegas Bowl, which replaced the California Bowl, the Falcons faced the high-powered offense of the University of Nevada.

In a game in which the punting game took center stage, the Falcons won the first half and Nevada the second half, but a late BG touchdown proved to be the difference.

The Falcons scored on their first four possessions to grab a 28-3 halftime lead. BG had 267 first-half yards to just 116 for the Wolfpack as they had an 18-6 edge in first downs.

In the second half, its was Nevada quarterback Chris Vargas' turn. He had engineered six Nevada comeback victories in three years coming off the bench, including an NCAA-record 35-point comeback against Weber State.

Nevada scored three touchdowns in the third quarter with punts of five and seven yards by BG setting up the first two scores. The Wolfpack's third score was set up by a high snap from center on a BG punt.

Nevada finally took the lead with 12:41 left in the game and looked to possibly put the game away with a field goal with 7:13 left, ending their run of 31 unanswered points.

Bowling Green then moved to the Nevada six-yard line before turning the ball over on downs. After holding the Wolfpack to one first down, Nevada punter Steve Lester had the center snap go through his hands setting up the Falcons at the Wolfpack 15-yard line with 1:45 remaining.

A 12-yard Erik White to Mark Szlachcic connection on first down put the Falcons on the three-yard line. After two runs and a pass did not net any yardage, White found Dave Hankins alone in the back of the end zone on fourth down with 22 seconds left. Placekicker Brian Leaver made the PAT for the winning points and BG's second consecutive bowl win.



Zeb Jackson rushed for 89 yards on 13 carries, and two touchdowns, in the first half of the 1992 Las Vegas Bowl as the Falcons built a 28-3 edge over Nevada.



DOYT L. PERRY

1988 College Football Hall of Fame Inductee

The year 1988 will be fondly remembered by many who are associated with the football program at BGSU. That year Doyt L. Perry, a former player, coach and administrator was recognized by the National Football Foundation with its top honor, induction into the College Football Hall of Fame.

Perry traveled to New York in December of 1988 for the Foundation's Hall of Fame dinner and was officially enshrined into the College Football Hall of Fame in June, 1989, in ceremonies held at Kings Island, Ohio.


Perry's association with BGSU dates back to the 1920s when he lettered nine times in three sports (football, basketball and baseball). The Croton, Ohio native received his degree in 1932. He began coaching on the high school level before becoming an assistant at Ohio State in 1951.

Perry returned to his alma mater in 1955, leading the football program to a 77-11-5 (.855) record over the next 11 years. His teams won five Mid-American Conference titles and one national college division championship in 1959. Perry's winning percentage ranks fifth on the all-time NCAA list.

Perry, who retired from coaching in 1964 to become BGSU's athletic director, developed such outstanding coaches as Bill Mallory, Don Nehlen, Larry Smith, and the late Dave McClain. Many more of Perry's former assistants and players have gone on to enjoy success in the coaching profession.

Perry passed away in February of 1992. At his memorial service former Michigan coach Bo Schembechler, an assistant on Perry's 1955 staff, said, "I don't believe I can name a coach, anywhere, anytime, anyhow, who did it better than Doyt Perry."

A documentary on Perry's career was released in May of 1998. It was produced by WBGU-TV.







SPIRIT AND TRADITION



WHY ORANGE AND BROWN

Orange and brown have been the school colors at Bowling Green State University since 1914, the first year of classes. Legend has it that Leon Winslow, an industrial arts faculty member, got the idea from watching a women's hat on a bus to nearby Toledo, Ohio. He liked the brown and orange color combination. So, too, did former Cleveland Browns' head coach Paul Brown. Following a trip to BGSU in the 1940s, Brown used the colors for his All-America Conference team.

Ay Ziggy Zoomba is Bowling Green's unofficial fight song. Gil Fox, an Air Force bombadier in World War II stationed in Italy, brought a loose translation of a Zulu war chant back with him, and since its introduction in 1946 to a campus spirit assembly, it has kept its place in BGSU history. The Falcon football team traditionally sings "Ay Ziggy Zoomba" after each victory.

SPIRIT AND TRADITION



RETIRED JERSEY

The only football jersey ever retired at Bowling Green is #29. It was worn by Paul Miles from 1971-73. Miles rushed for 3,239 yards and 25 touchdowns in his career and was a three-time first team All-MAC selection. He was just the third back in NCAA history to rush for 1,000 or more yards in three consecutive seasons.

FRIEDA & FREDDIE FALCON

Frieda and Freddie Falcon are the official mascots of the Bowling Green Falcons. Together with the BGSU cheerleaders, Frieda and Freddie boost spirit at intercollegiate athletic events. Tryouts are held each spring, and winners remain anonymous to the student body until each is "beheaded" at the last home basketball and hockey game. The Freddie Falcon tradition began in 1950 while Frieda Falcon was added for the 1979-80 athletic year.

WHY THE FALCONS?

The 2000-2001 athletic year marks the 74th anniversary of Bowling Green's nickname, Falcons. Before 1927, BG teams were called the Normals or Teachers. Ivan Lake '23 suggested the nickname after reading an article on falconry. Lake, managing editor and sports editor of the Sentinel Tribune in Bowling Green at the time, proposed the name change because it fit headline space and because falcons were "the most powerful bird for their size and often attacked birds two or three times their size."







PEACE PIPE AWARD

The Peace Pipe is a traveling award that goes to the winner of the annual gridiron battle between Bowling Green and Toledo. The Peace Pipe tradition actually began on the basketball court during the 1947-48 season. At that time, the teams exchanged a six-foot long wooden peace pipe. The original basketball Peace Pipe disappeared, so, in 1980, the Peace Pipe was reinstated for football with former UT football player Frank Kralik creating the present trophy. Today's Peace Pipe is a smaller version of the original pipe, resting atop a trophy. The Falcons captured the trophy with last season's 34-23 victory, and Bowling Green now has a 34-26-4 edge in the series.



ANNIVERSARY AWARD

The Anniversary Award is a traveling award that goes to the winner of the football game between Bowling Green and Kent. Established in 1985 by the respective alumni departments at BGSU and Kent, the Anniversary Award commemorates the founding of BGSU and Kent in the year 1910. BG dropped last year's contest, but leads the alltime series with its "sister school," 47-15-6. BGSU and Kent squareoff on Sept. 30 this season. Kent, which has been BG's opponent in more football games than any other, 67 contests, has won the award only three times (1988, 1997 and 1999) in the last 14 years. Bowling Green has won 23 of the last 26 meetings between the two schools.

Doyt L. Perry Stadium, with its 30,599 seating capacity, is celebrating its 35th year as the home of Bowling Green State University football.

Built in 1966 for approximately \$3 million as a replacement for the 43-year-old University Stadium, Perry Stadium had a capacity of 23,272 until bleacher seats were installed in both end zones in 1982.

One of the largest and most attractive athletic facilities in the Mid-American Conference, Perry Stadium set the conference record for single-game attendance.

On October 8, 1983, a huge crowd of 33,527 packed into Perry Stadium for the annual Northwest Ohio rivalry between Bowling Green and Toledo, establishing a school and MAC record for singlegame attendance. The Falcons went on to set a season record, breaking the six-digit figure for five games with a total draw of 100,021. It marked the first time in history that Bowling Green averaged more than 20,000 fans for five home football games.

That figure was topped in 1985, when Bowling Green posted a perfect record (11-0) in the regular season and clinched the MAC Championship by shutting out Toledo at Perry Stadium in November. More than 28,000 fans turned out that day, raising Bowling Green's season attendance to an alltime high 112,110, an average of 22,422.

In 1994, BG fans bettered the mark of 1985 as 114,802 fans, an average of 22,960, attended the five home games.

The Falcons begin the 2000 season looking to maintain the home dominance they have enjoyed during the tenure of head coach Gary Blackney, having compiled a record of 33-10-1.

Perry Stadium is more than just a football facility. The east side of the stadium includes locker rooms, equipment and training rooms, along with the Athletic Department offices. The west side received a face-lift 12 years ago. A physical fitness center/weight room opened its doors to all intercollegiate athletic teams in the summer of 1988.

Also situated on the west side of Perry Stadium are the Falcon Club offices and clubhouse, the men's and women's soccer and track and cross country offices, as well as maintenance and storage areas.

Sitting atop the press box on the west side of the stadium is the plush Stadium Club. Now in its 20th year of operation, the Stadium Club's 106 theatre-type seats, which are all sold, provide loyal BGSU fans with the best view of the game. The President's Box, located at the top of the east side of the stadium, provides luxury seating for President Sidney Ribeau, his guests, and other supporters of Falcon football.

The construction of elevators on both sides of the stadium, completed in early 1998, has made the stadium more accessible for all fans. Renovations to all boxes on both sides and the stadium club have taken place over the last year making for a more "fan-friendly" atmosphere.

Bowling Green won the first game ever played in Perry Stadium, defeating Dayton, 13-0, on October 1, 1966. Since that time, the Falcons have won over 67 percent of their home games, compiling a 109-52-6 record in the 167 games played at Perry Stadium. Over the last 17 seasons,

Bowling Green is 65-19-4 at home for a .761 winning percentage.

Perry Stadium is named in honor of the man who led Bowling Green to a 77-11-5 record in his 10 years as the head coach of the Falcons. Doyt L. Perry was simply one of the greatest football coaches of his day. His .855 winning percentage over 10 seasons in the 1950s and 1960s remains one of the highest in football history. In fact, Perry is fifth all-time behind Bob Reade (Augustana), Knute Rockne (Notre Dame), Frank Leahy (Notre Dame), and Larry Kehres (Mount Union) in winning percentage among coaches with at least 10 years of service on the collegiate level. Perry served as the BGSU athletic director for seven years (1965-71) after stepping down as football coach.



Since becoming Bowling Green's ninth president five years ago, Dr. Sidney A. Ribeau has worked tirelessly to mobilize faculty, staff and students in realizing a new vision for the University. That vision is to make BGSU "the premier learning community" in Ohio and one of the best in the nation.

"Everyone's participation is needed in order for us to define the nature of the community that we want to become and to contribute to the shaping of our common future. We can accomplish a great deal by creating an environment in which people trust each other and work together in a collaborative manner," Dr. Ribeau told the University community when he arrived.

This collaborative style, one that emphasizes the value everyone brings to the team, is the hallmark of his and the University's recent successes.

Using a systems approach to management, the president has mobilized people around issues vital to the lifeblood of the institution, evidenced by the creation of groups such as the Universitywide enrollment management team. The team has developed successful long-range recruitment and retention plans that feature a variety of programs designed to assist first-year students in adjusting to college life. In 1999-2000 about half of all first-year students participated in one of those programs designed to ease new students' transition into college. In all, approximately 3,500 first-year students enrolled for classes last fall and total enrollment, including BGSU Firelands in Huron, Ohio, was approximately 19,000.

With these successful enrollment initiatives have come opportunities to hire new faculty and staff and to make \$90 million in capital improvements on campus, including an ongoing \$34 million project to renovate and enlarge the Student Union. There also have been significant gains in annual giving to the University during the past five years. For the 1999-2000 fiscal year, total giving to BGSU surpassed \$7 million, including nearly \$5 million in annual giving and slightly more than \$2 million in bequests.

Academic programs have also been strengthened under Dr. Ribeau's leadership. Some, such as industrial/organizational psychology, higher education and student affairs, broadcast journalism, philosophy and chemistry, are nationally ranked.

Dr. Ribeau's ability to inspire people, set attainable goals and provide leadership extends to helping others in the University community learn these same skills. The Presidential Lecture Series, which focuses on student leadership development, and the President's Leadership Academy, a leadership development program for select students, both have been created through his efforts.

The president also leads by listening. He makes it a point to meet as many people as possible and to provide forums for various constituent groups to voice their opinions about the University. Frequently he puts in 10-12-hour days, meeting with various student and faculty groups, alumni and community leaders. He also travels regularly to Columbus and to Washington, D.C., to meet with legislators and other government officials. Dr. Ribeau is especially popular with students. "He has brought the presidency down to a student level," says Rebecca Nieto, a senior from Paulding, Ohio. Active in student governance, Nieto says, "At most universities the students don't even know the name of the president, but here everyone knows Dr. Ribeau. We can feel the conviction in his voice when he talks about his vision. He doesn't lecture us; he listens. He has given us something to believe in."

Dr. Ribeau also has had a key role in promoting diversity issues in higher education. In addition to championing diversity initiatives at BGSU, he has participated in President Clinton's nationwide dialogue on race relations. A staunch advocate for developing in students "good hearts as well as able brains," Dr. Ribeau has served on the faculty for the National Institute on College Student Values and is on the advisory board of the new electronic "Journal on College and Character."

He also has served as a guest leader at the LeaderShape Institute, the flagship program of LeaderShape Inc., a nonprofit organization committed to developing young adults who will lead with integrity. He was a contributor to Leadership Inc.'s Visions and Values 2000, which offers a series of essays focusing on values, vision and leadership.

A recognized advocate of higher education at state and national levels, Dr. Ribeau is a member of the State Funding Commission for Higher Education, the American Council on Education (ACE) Fellows Selection Committee, and the ACE Commission on Leadership and Advisory Council. He is involved in the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU) and the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges (NASULGC).

The president is an expert in intercultural communication, African-American culture, relational communication, public discourse and race relations. His recent publications include "Preparing Our Students for the New Millennium" in Diversity Exchange, a magazine of Florida International University, and a research article on the advancement of African-American senior administrators at predominantly white institutions, currently in press with Negro Education Review.

Raised in Detroit, Dr. Ribeau received his bachelor's degree from Wayne State University in 1971. In 1996 WSU honored him with a Distinguished Alumnus Award. He earned master's and doctoral degrees in interpersonal communication from the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign, in 1973 and 1979, respectively.

He began his teaching career in 1976 as a professor of communication studies at California State University, Los Angeles. Eight years later, after being honored as an outstanding teacher and student adviser, he was named chair of the university's Pan African Studies Department. He held that position until 1987, when he was named dean of undergraduate studies at California State University, San Bernardino. Three years later, he became dean of the College of Liberal Arts at Cal Poly's San Luis Obispo campus. In 1992 he was named vice president for academic affairs at Cal Poly Pomona, a position he held until coming to Bowling Green.

A firm believer in Universitycommunity involvement, Ribeau is a member of the chambers of commerce for both Bowling Green and Toledo and serves on the boards of United Way, the Greater Toledo Urban League, the Toledo Symphony Orchestra, and the Andersons Inc., a Maumee, Ohiobased grain merchandising firm.

PAUL KREBS

Paul Krebs was named the 11th athletic director at Bowling Green State University on March 15, 1999, enthusiastically tackling the problems facing the department at the turn of the century, while possessing a vision of how he would like to see his alma mater viewed on a regional and national level.

Krebs has overseen the move of intercollegiate athletics into the student affairs area which was announced in January, 1999, by President Sidney Ribeau.

Some of the other main areas that Krebs has focused on include making the department a fiscallysound entity, gender equity issues, enhancing the competitiveness of the athletic teams, and increasing attendance at all BGSU home contests.

Krebs had served as the senior associate athletic director at The Ohio State University under Director of Athletics Andy Geiger since September of 1993.

In that capacity, he managed the daily operation of the department and acted as the AD in Geiger's absence. He also coordinated and provided oversight for the departments \$58 million budget, directed its long-range financial planning and budget oversight/ reporting programs.

He was the department's main liaison when dealing with engineers, architects, and financial planning committees.

In addition to overseeing the ticket office, athletic business office, information systems, facility operations and maintenance areas, he was the point person in the planning and design of Ohio State's \$105 million Jerome Schottenstein Center, the \$150 million renovation of storied Ohio Stadium, the Jesse Owens Stadium, and the \$5 million Bill Davis Stadium for baseball.

He was also actively involved in fundraising and securing corporate sponsorship for the new facilities.

The OSU Ice Rink and the 36hole nationally-acclaimed OSU Golf Course also fell under his administrative areas of supervision. He also coordinated game management, including crowd control and game-day timing of football and men's and women's basketball.

Krebs chaired several committees within the Buckeye athletic department and played a key role in attracting some of the nation's premier entertainers to Ohio Stadium and other OSU venues.

He also served as meet director for the NCAA Div. I Golf Championships in 1987 and 1995 and the regional championships in 1993.

Krebs was active in the

Columbus community, routinely assisting such programs as Easter Seals, United Way, and the Special Wish Foundation. He was also involved in the Columbus chapter of the National Football Foundation.

He went to Ohio State in 1985 as the ticket director and quickly implemented a new computer program that streamlined the ticket office while improving efficiency. He was named assistant athletic director in 1987. In 1991, he was promoted to assistant athletic director for administration, a position he held until 1993.

He began his professional career as the assistant ticket director at Oklahoma in 1981 before being promoted to the ticket director in 1983, a position he held for two years before going to Ohio State. Paul and his wife, Marjori, have

two children, a daughter, Taylor, 11, and a son, Jacob, 7.

The Canfield, Ohio, native earned a bachelor's degree in business from BGSU in 1978 and a master's degree in athletic administration at Ohio State in 1981.






