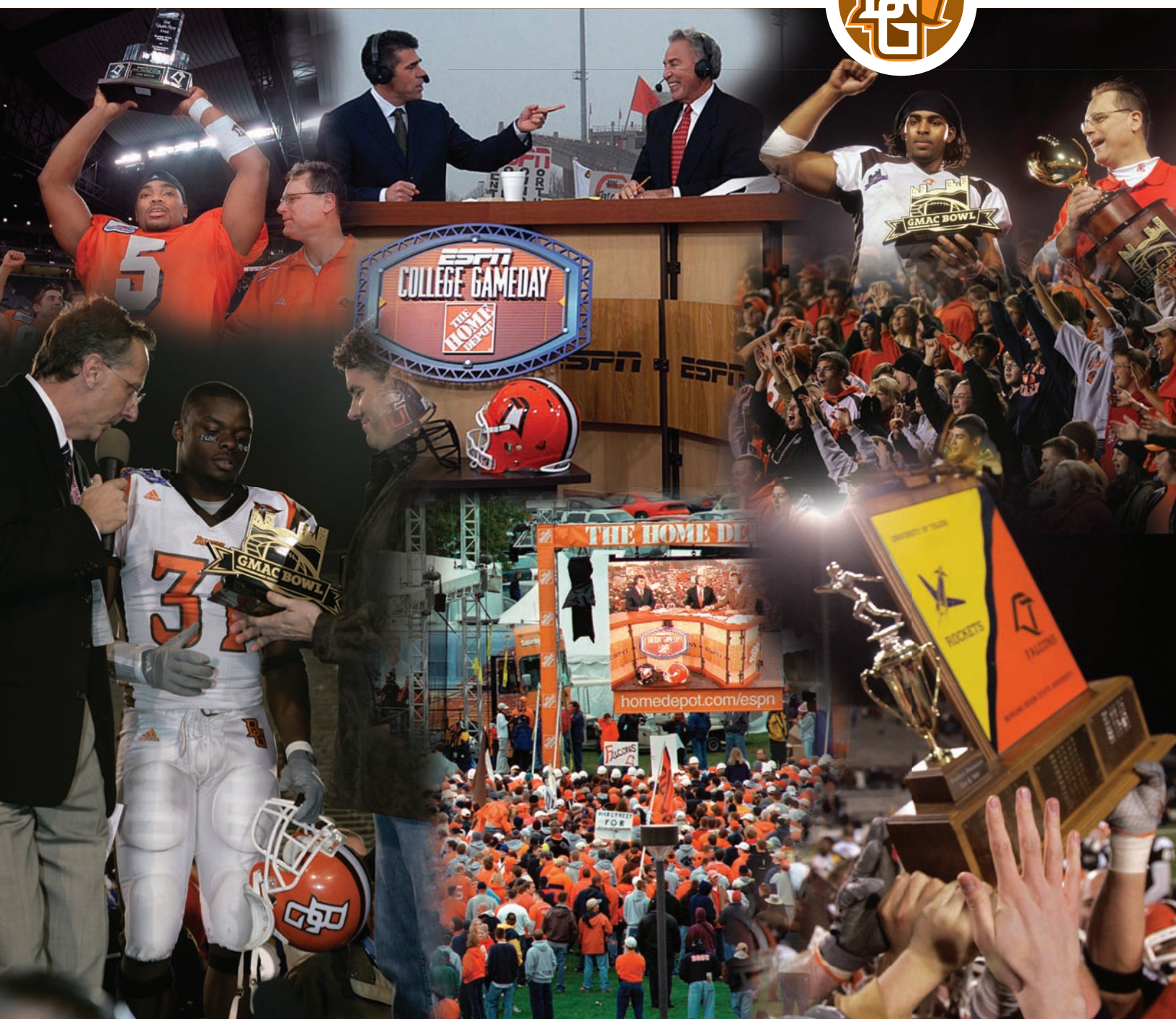

CREDENTIALS

Requests for working press credentials should be made to the BGSU Athletic Communications Office, addressed to the attention of Dave Meyer. Requests should be made at least one week in advance. Late requests will be honored if space is available, but parking cannot be guaranteed for requests less than one week in advance. Scouts and non-working media will be seated if space is available.

WEEKLY INFORMATION

Media members can access BGSU information via the internet at BGSUFalcons.com. Weekly game notes and statistics will be updated regularly. A PDF version of releases and statistics can be e-mailed to those outlets which would prefer to receive this information on a regular basis. Please notify Dave Meyer if you would like to be put on our primary media e-mail list.

MAC TELECONFERENCE

Coach Brandon will be available each Monday during the regular season on the weekly MAC Teleconference (10:48-10:56 a.m., Eastern). To join this MAC Teleconference please contact the MAC at 216-466-5622 and ask for Gary Richter.

WEEKLY PRESSER

Coach Gregg Brandon will hold a weekly media press conference each Monday at noon in the Team Meeting Room on the second floor of the Sebo Athletic Center. All members of the media are welcome to attend. Out-of-town media should contact Dave Meyer to schedule a phone interview with Coach Brandon or players at least one day in advance.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS

All interviews with members of the team should be conducted at Coach Brandon's Monday media press conference. Players will be made available at Noon to those in attendance. Please allow at least 24 hours to set up interviews with players. Arrangements will be made for telephone and in-person interviews at a time that is mutually agreeable to the reporter/broadcaster and the athlete, should there be a schedule conflict.

PARKING

A special media parking lot is located adjacent to Perry Stadium, near the southwest corner of the stadium. Access to the media lot is by Alumni Drive which connects Mercer Road (near the Alumni Center) and Wooster Street (near the Information Booth). Admission to the media lot is restricted to people holding the correct credential acquired from the athletic communications office. All media members are asked to enter the stadium through the press gate (Gate 2) at the southwest corner of the stadium.

POST-GAME INTERVIEWS

At Home: Coach Brandon and BGSU players will be available for post-game interviews in the Sentinel-Tribune Room located between the two locker rooms, following the normal cooling-off period. BGSU observes a closed locker room policy. The Sentinel-Tribune Room is on the east side of the stadium (opposite the press box), and can be entered through the tunnels at either the north or south end. **On the road:** Coach Brandon and requested players will be made available in a designated media room or just outside the locker room following the normal cooling-off period.

PRESS GATE

The press gate (Gate 2) at Doyt L. Perry Stadium is at the southwest corner of the stadium, a short walk from the media parking lot.

MEDIA FIELD POLICY

A general media pass will allow you access to the field during pre-game warmups and during the final five minutes of the fourth quarter only. Field access will be limited to working photographers and television reporters. No interviews may be conducted on the field and any attempt to do so may lead to the loss of your media pass.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Photo passes for newspaper photographers, television videographers and, under special circumstances, for free-lance photographers, are available from the athletic communications office. Photo passes entitle the photographer access to the sideline, the post-game press conference room and the press box. Photographers must pick up an arm band in the press box prior to the game.

PRESS BOX SERVICES

Members of the media will be provided with game programs, flip cards, current statistics and last-minute pregame notes prior to the start of the game. Statistical summaries will include play-by-play, quarter stats, halftime stats, complete team and individual stats and tackles. The BGSU Press Box does have a wireless internet connection for all members of the media.

RADIO & TELEVISION

Requests for permission to broadcast must be made in writing. Space will be made available for the official visiting radio station and student radio station on request. There is space in each booth for four persons. Phone lines can be ordered through Dave Meyer. Anyone wishing to televise a game from Doyt L. Perry Stadium should contact the athletic communications office at least ONE MONTH prior to the game, and preferably before the start of the season.

WPFX, 107.7 FM, begins its sixth season as the flagship station of the Falcon Sports Radio Network's coverage of BGSU football and men's basketball.

Todd Walker, Sports Director of WIMA in Lima, returns for his sixth season behind the microphone as "The Voice of the Falcons". Walker, a graduate of Ohio Northern University, has been with WIMA for fifteen years and has called over 1,000 high school football and basketball games around NW Ohio. In 2008 Walker served as the play-by-play voice of the Columbus Destroyers of the Arena Football League. He also was recognized this past year by the Associated Press, earning first place for "Best Sportscaster" in the small market category.

Former Falcon Captain Cal Bowers, is on board for his third season as color analyst. Bowers earned four letters playing for Coach Gary Blackney and was a member of BGSU's 1992 MAC and Las Vegas Bowl Championship team.

Pre-game programming begins one hour prior to kickoff and the post-game show features comments from Coach Brandon. Also, each Monday night during the season a one-hour coaches show airs live from Fricker's in Bowling Green. In addition, a daily visit with the coach airs on WPFX and WCWA. 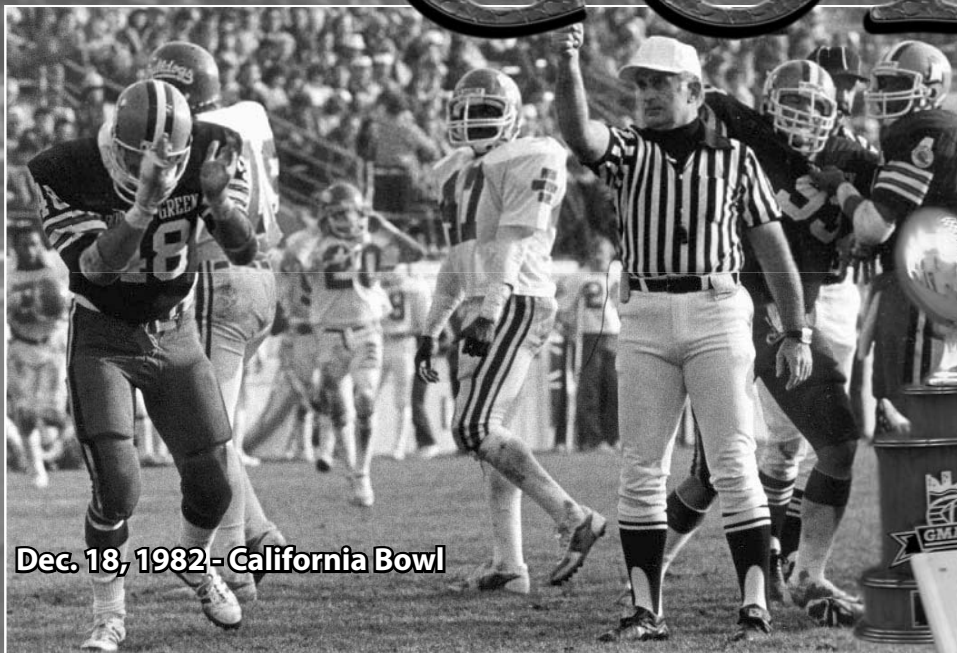

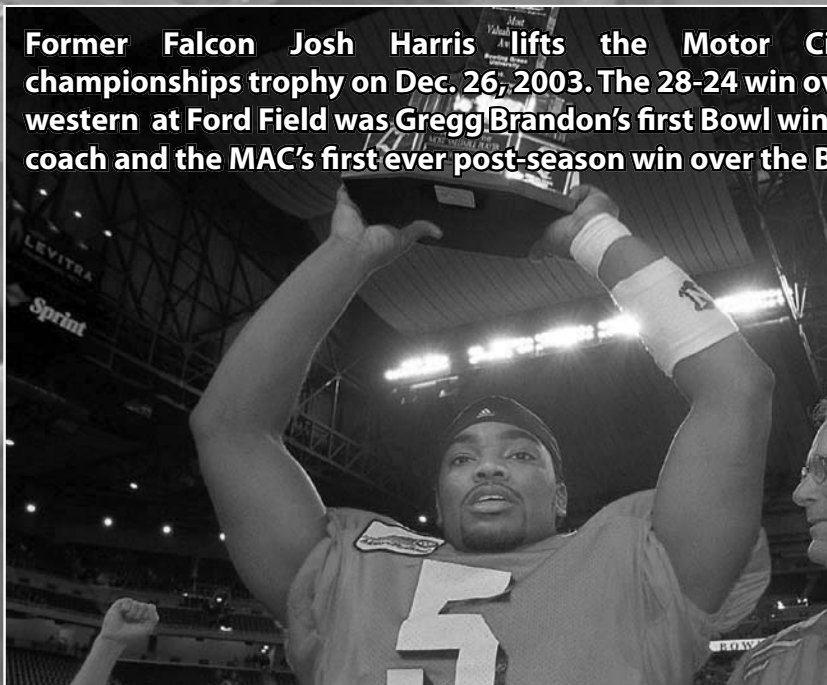

Q & A WITH GREGG BRANDON

With everything that was accomplished last season, tying for the MAC East crown, advancing to a bowl game, winning eight games, do you feel that this season you have to take it a step further?

"We are always striving to win the league championship. We have come close a few times by winning the West, tying for the MAC East several times and going to bowl games, but we have fallen short of one of our team goals, and that is to win it outright. That has always been a program goal and we are going to strive to do that."

What will be the offensive philosophy this year?

"Philosophically we won't change what we are doing. The objective is to get the ball in the endzone any way you can and if we have to throw it 50-60 times against someone to do it we will, just like if we have to run it 50-60 times we will do that. The term 'balance' is a misnomer from where I sit in college football. In my opinion balance means you have to be able to do both effectively to win in today's game."

As good as Tyler Sheehan was last season, how much better can he still become?

"He can get better and he has to get better. He is not the type of kid that will rest on his accomplishments. He knows that last year he struggled midseason with the shoulder injury that set him back a bit. He came back strong at the end and helped us win out. He knows for us to win games he has to throw completions. That is the bottom line. The main things I stress with our quarterbacks in accuracy. I think with a little more experience and opportunities he will be even more accurate."

Do you feel the depth at the wide receiver position is one of the strengths of the offense?

"With all the skill guys that are back that were effective for us last year, it has to be a strength. Those kids have to continue to get better as well. It's not just about Tyler. They have to get bigger, faster and stronger in the off-season and continue to work hard at running routes and catching balls."

How exciting is it to return four running backs that were major contributors last season?

"We have some flexibility there. Willie Geter had a great freshman year and we are excited about his future. Chris Bullock is a guy that had a good spring. We need him to continue to step up his game. Anthony Turner is a guy that showed up the last half of the season really well for us. He is a slash type player that will be big in the of-

fense. Eric Ransom is a kid that showed a lot of promise early before he tore his knee up. So we have four guys there that are in the mix and they can all do a lot of the things we ask of them. They can line up in the slot and run routes. They can all block and they can all carry the ball."

The offensive line lost three starters from 2007. How is the battle going to replace those three guys?

"We had some guys step up in the spring. Ben Bojicic is a really talented freshman that can play any position. He came up as our center in the spring, but he has a long way to go in terms on technique and learning the position, but he has all the athletic ability and skill to play the position. If Ben gets it done at center that allows us to leave Brandon Curtis at guard and Shane Steffy will be back from the injury to play the other guard position. At the tackle positions, Jeff Fink is a veteran that has played numerous spots. Aaron Kent is a fifth-year guy that has never started, but has been a solid backup. Now is his time to get it done at left tackle. D.J. Young is a guy we moved over from defense. He is a real athletic kid that can move and he is also working his way into that left tackle spot. Tyler Donahue is on the other side behind Fink, while Brady Minturn is a guy that is working into the mix at guard. We have some guys that are good football players. They just don't have a lot of game experience. I think they are hungry and I am excited to see them emerge."

How do you feel about the defensive line?

"There are a lot of veteran players in that mix. [Diyral] Briggs has got to continue to come on and be that guy that offenses have to account for. He is that type of player with his pass rushing abilities. [Angelo] Magnone is an explosive young player with a high motor. Mike Ream is a guy that had an impressive spring. He has had an up and down career, but I think he is stabilized now. He is a guy that we will need 50 snaps out of this year. We also have a number of young players like Nick Torressio and Kevin Alvarado who we are very excited about. Nick Davis is a kid that seems has been around forever. If he can get healthy he is a guy that will fit into that mix. Joe Schaefer is another guy that has battled injuries. He is another guy that can help at the defensive end spot."

How do you see the linebacker position breaking down?

"That is a position where at starter we are solid with [Errique] Dozier, [John] Haneline and [Jerret] Sanderson, who we moved from the safety position. Cody Basler is a solid inside guy and Aaron Davis can play the SAM position and does a nice job there. Calvin Marshall is a guy we moved from safety that will play behind Sanderson. It's a position that we don't have a lot of depth but the first guys are good players for us."

How is the transition for Sanderson working out?

"When you make a move like that you hope that it works out the way it has. He has really taken the bit there and done a nice job of learning the position. He is more of a dropped down safety that will play out on the inside receivers. He has done a nice job on that."

Feel the secondary is the strength of the defense?

"You would think so, because those guys have all played together for a couple of years now. Antonio Smith is a three-year starter. Kenny Lewis is a two-year starter. [P.J.] Mahone and Jahmal Brown are both two-year starters. All four of those kids played as true freshmen so they have a lot of experience playing together."

"Another kid that has stepped up and competed there was Roger Williams. When talking about the return game he can be a real factor for us there, but he has stepped up and done a nice job helping in the secondary."

Special Teams seems as solid as it has been in several years?

"Sinisa [Vrivilo] is a steady guy that has a lot of experience. He is a guy that you know will get points for you. [Nick] Iovenelli, our punter, is a consistent guy. He can get the ball down the field. Something I have stressed with him is that we need a little more distance in those kicks. They are both kids that once you tell them what they need to work on, they do it."

Who are a few guys that people may not know about right now, but they will once the season gets rolling?

"Bojicic on the offensive line is a young player in the [Scott] Mruczkowski, [Kory] Lichtensteiger mold. Those guys started as redshirt freshmen and then played 50 games. Ben has that ability and that excites me to see how he does."

"Our junior college quarterback, Andrew Beam, just showed up this summer and I am real anxious to see how he does. We need a guy that could come in and be the backup or even compete for the starting role."

How do you feel your schedule breaks down?

"It is a very challenging non league schedule. With just one home game among the four and back-to-back road games half way across the country, will make it very challenging. At the same time I think our kids look forward to going into those venues and environments and seeing how we match up."

FALCONS IN SEARCH OF BACK-TO-BACK MAC EAST CHAMPIONSHIPS

Return 18 Starters From Last Season's 8-5 Overall and 6-2 MAC Record

It was an impressive 2007 season for the Bowling Green State University football program. Despite coming off a 4-8 record in 2006, and being picked to finish fifth in the MAC East preseason poll, the Orange and Brown finished 8-5 overall, and 6-2 in the MAC, finishing with a MAC East co-Championship. The eight wins were matched by only Central Michigan, for league honors, while the Falcons also advanced to the GMAC Bowl, their third bowl appearance in the last five seasons.

Head coach Gregg Brandon, who received a contract extension through the 2011 season, will return 18 starters from last season's 8-5 team. BGSU returns eight of those players on the offensive side of the ball. The offense finished in the top five of several MAC categories: scoring (30.2, 5th), pass offense (278.8, 2nd), total offense (402.5, 4th), pass efficiency (134.9, 3rd), first downs (299, 2nd) and third down conversions (41.1, 4th).

Defensively, eight starters will be returning, including three All-MAC performers in Diyral Briggs, P.J. Mahone and Antonio Smith. They will also return eight of their top nine tacklers, led by Erique Dozier (112, 1st), John Haneline (96, 2nd) and Mahone (90, 3rd). The Falcons will also return all four starters in the secondary that finished third in the MAC in pass defense (216.6) in 2007.

Lastly, the Falcons will return three key parts of the BGSU special teams. Senior-to-be Sinisa Vrvilo will be back for his second season with the Orange and Brown. Last season he connected on 15 of 19 field goals, while converting all 47 of his extra point attempts, earning third-team All-MAC honors. Redshirt junior Nick Iovinelli (38.4 avg.) will return as the Falcons' punter. Roger Williams will once again handle the kickoff duties. In 2007 he set school records in kick returns (39) and return yards (954). He also had a 78 yard return for a touchdown versus Tulsa in the GMAC Bowl.

Quarterbacks

Starters Returning: 1, Starters Lost: 0

Under center the Falcons will return third-team All-MAC performer Tyler Sheehan. Sheehan, who opened the 2007 season with no starting experience, began his sophomore campaign with a bang, upsetting Minnesota 32-31, throwing for 388 yards and two scores inside the Metrodome. On the season the Cincinnati, Ohio, native threw 23 touchdowns, to go along with 3,264 yards, three rushing touchdowns, and two receiving scores.

Sheehan had two 300-yard games, 10 200-yard games and eight multiple touchdown contests. He earned MAC East Offensive Player of the Week three times, most in the conference, and was also the only QB in the country to record two receiving touchdowns in 2007.

Junior college transfer Andrew Beam, along with red-shirt freshman Nate Brown, will give the Falcons a trio of quarterbacks that could step in and continue to keep the offense up and running.

Running Backs

The running back position is loaded with talent, returning their top three rushers from 2007 in Anthony Turner, Willie Geter and Chris Bullock. All-in-all, the Falcons ran for 1,607 yards in 2007 and return 1,435 of those yards (89.3%). Turner, who began the 2007 season as the Falcons' backup quarterback, emerged as a rushing threat in the final five contests last year. On the season the senior-to-be had 519 yards on the ground (4.9 avg) to go along with nine scores. Geter, who finished 2007 with 457 yards (6.1 avg) had 203 of those yards in a 31-20 win over Kent State. Geter also chipped in with 37 catches, third-best on the team. Bullock, who only saw 64 carries in 2007, made the most of his opportunities, rushing for 281 yards. In two seasons, Bullock has 1,050 yards on the ground. Eric Ransom, who had seven catches for 96 yards and a touchdown versus Minnesota before ending his season a week later with a knee injury versus Michigan State, opened the 2007 season as the Falcons' starting tailback, and could add even more firepower to an already explosive position.

Starters Returning: 4, Starters Lost: 0

Much like the running back position, the Falcons will return nearly the entire wide receiver and tight end foundation. BGSU will return 300 of 332 (90.4%) receptions, 3,330 of 3,625 (91.9%) receiving yards and 28 of 29 (96.6 %) touchdowns from the 2007 season. Leading that group is Freddie Barnes. Barnes, who had 20 receptions his first year with the Orange and Brown, exploded onto the scene in 2007, recording 82 receptions for 962 yards and nine scores, earning third-team All-MAC honors. His 82 receptions were third-best in BGSU history, while his 962 receiving yards were sixth all-time.

Joining Barnes will be senior-to-be Corey Partridge. Partridge, who missed five games due to injury, still finished second on the team in receptions (46) and yards (453).

Other Falcons that will play a major role in the BGSU receiving group will include Marques Parks (28 rec., 360 yds, 5 TD), Chris Wright (26 rec. 370 yds, 3 TD), Tyrone Pronty (19 rec., 165 yds., 2 TD) and Jeremiah Kelley (12 rec., 219 yds., 3 TDs).

Tops on that list will be senior Diyral Briggs who finished with 54 tackles and five sacks in 2007, earning first-team All-MAC honors. Michael Ream (14 tackles, 1.5 sacks) came on strong at the end of the 2007 season to provide constant pressure on opposing QBs up the middle, while Angelo Magnone (30 tackles, 3.5 sacks), Adrian Baker (24 tackles, 2.0 sacks), Joe Schaefer (19 tackles, 1 sack) and Nick Torresso (16 tackles) were also invaluable up front, anchoring the Falcon defense. Nick Davis, who was having a tremendous start to the 2007 season, was lost early to a knee injury versus Western Kentucky.

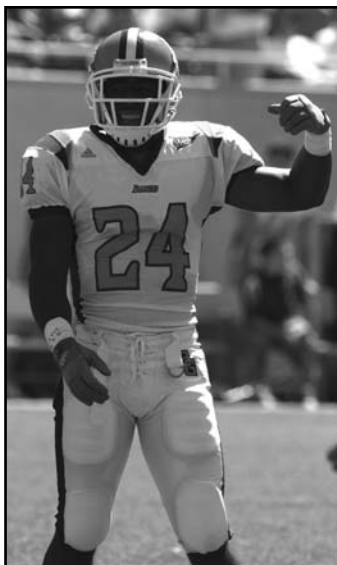

The Falcons will return all four starters from the 2007 to a secondary that finished third in the MAC in pass defense. Jahmal Brown, Kenny Lewis, P.J. Mahone, and Antonio Smith all made several starts defending the pass. Brown was fifth on the team with 83 tackles, starting all 13 games. Lewis, who also started all 13 contests, had 61 tackles, five forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries and one interception. Smith was the third member of the secondary that started in every game, finishing with 80 tackles and two interceptions, earning third-team All-MAC honors. Sanderson, who started the first seven games before suffering a leg injury, had 34 tackles from the safety position. Mahone, who earned second-

FALCON TID-BITS

Falcons Host First Big Ten Team Inside Doyt Perry Stadium

The Bowling Green State University football team will host Minnesota on Sept. 6, 2008 in the Falcons' home opener, with the Golden Gophers becoming the first Big Ten team to participate inside "The Doyt" in the 89 years of Falcon Football. The contest will be carried live on ESPNU.

Gregg Brandon Receives Contract Extension

BGSU Athletic Director Greg Christopher announced on Feb. 8, 2008 that head coach Gregg Brandon's contract was extended through the 2011 season. In five seasons at the helm of the Falcon football program Brandon has compiled a 38-24 (.613) overall and 27-13 (.675) MAC record. He also has three bowl appearances and two bowl wins, both tops in the conference.

Falcons Make Coaching Changes

While the majority of the Falcon coaching staff will remain intact from 2007, the Falcons did make a few changes to the coaching staff prior to the 2008 campaign. Assistant head coach Troy Rothenbuhler, who coaches the inside wide receivers and tight ends has also been named the passing game coordinator. Matt Campbell, who coaches the offensive line, has been named the running game coordinator. Jim Hofher, who was the head coach at Buffalo from 2001-05, was added in the off-season to coach the quarterbacks and Doug Phillips (DE coach) has become the new recruiting coordinator, a job held by Rothenbuhler the last five seasons.

Falcons Return Eight Starters on Offense

While the Falcons did lose three starters on the offensive line, the 2008 offense that ranked near the top of every offensive MAC category remains intact. Returning will be junior quarterback Tyler Sheehan (303 of 476, 3,264 yards and 23 TDs), running back Anthony Turner (106-519 and nine TDs), wide receivers Freddie Barnes (82-962 and nine TDs), Corey Partridge (46-453 and two TDs) and Chris Wright (26-370 and three TDs), along with offensive lineman Shane Steffy (12 starts) and Brandon Curtis (13 starts).

Eight on Defense Also Return

Returning for the 2008 season on the defensive side of the ball will be a heavy load of upper-classmen. On the defensive line the Falcons will return first-team member Diyral Briggs (54 tackles, five sacks) and Michael Ream (14 tackles, 1.5 sacks), who came on strong at the end of 2007. At linebacker the Falcons return their top two tacklers in Erique Dozier (112 tackles, 9.0 TFL) and John Haneline (96 tackles, 5.0 TFL). The defensive backfield returns all four starters to a secondary that finished third in the conference in pass defense. Returning are Antonio Smith (80 tackles, two Int.), P.J. Mahone (90 tackles, seven Int.), Jahmal Brown (83 tackles) and Kenny Lewis (61 tackles, 10 PBU's).

Gregg Brandon became the 16th head coach in the history of the Falcon football program on Dec. 19, 2002, and guided the Falcons to back-to-back bowl wins for just the second time in school history in 2003 and 2004 after the Falcons defeated Northwestern, 28-24, at the Motor City Bowl and Memphis, 52-35 in the GMAC Bowl.

The owner of a 38-24 overall record and a 27-13 mark against conference opposition, 22 national television appearances, three bowl appearances in five seasons, two bowl wins and a 70% graduation rate among his players begins his sixth season at the helm of the BGSU football program.

Under Brandon's guidance the Falcons have produced 31 All-MAC performers, one MAC Player of the Year, two Heisman Trophy candidates and are currently the lone team in the MAC to have a non-conference record above .500 since 2003 (11-10).

In 2007, despite being picked to finish fifth in the MAC East preseason polls, coach Brandon helped lead the Falcons to an 8-5 overall and 6-2 MAC record, as well as advance to their third bowl contest in the last five years. Despite Tyler Sheehan making his first career start at quarterback the Falcons secured a 32-31 overtime win over Big Ten opponent Minnesota, while also throwing for over 400 yards in the contest.

In 2006, BGSU finished first in the MAC in rushing averaging 176.6 yards per game on the ground, while playing 13 true freshman, setting the stage for the 2007 bowl appearance and beyond.

In 2005, BGSU shared the MAC East title and went unbeaten on the road in league play (4-0), including a 42-14 nationally televised win over arch-rival Miami. The Falcons were the top program in the MAC in punt returns (12.97) and finished second in passing (388.8), scoring (35.8) and net punting (35.1) and third in total offense (447.8), pass efficiency (142.4) and turnover margin (.73). The Falcons were ranked 16th in the country in punt returns, 17th in passing, 18th in scoring, 20th in turnover margin, and 21st in pass efficiency.

In 2004, he guided the Falcons to a national ranking in each major poll for the second straight year as they finished 9-3. The Falcons also boasted the most potent offense in MAC history finishing second in the country at 506.3 yards per game and fourth nationally in scoring offense at 44.3 points per game. Both established new league records. In addition, the Falcons finished third in the country in passing (338.3) and turnover margin (+1.25) and fourth in pass efficiency (165.5).

In addition, he saw sophomore quarterback Omar Jacobs earn All-American honors and blossom into the national leader in TD passes with 41 and set an NCAA record for touchdown to interception ratio with just four picks all season. For his efforts he was named MAC Offensive Player of the Year.

In 2003, he guided BGSU to a #23 national ranking in the final AP and Coaches Poll (23rd) and a #24 position in the final BCS standings. Last year, he had the top record of any first-time, first-year head coach that season with an 11-3 mark after guiding the Falcons to a MAC West title (7-1) and a win over Northwestern in the Motor City Bowl. In addition, he saw BGSU ranked for a school record eight weeks and make five national television appearances. Also, BGSU finished third in the country in total offense (496.7), ninth in passing offense (300.4), 14th in passing efficiency (147.29), and 20th in scoring (33.6). Defensively, the Falcons were the third highest rated team in the MAC. Senior

quarterback Josh Harris and senior cornerback Janssen Patton also earned All-American honors for their stellar individual performances.

Brandon was hired after more than 22 years of coaching experience at the Division I level, including two years at BGSU where he has served as assistant head coach and directed the Falcons' record-setting offensive attack. In 2002, the Falcons finished third in the nation in scoring (40.8), eighth in total offense (448.9) and 15th in rushing (219.1). In addition, the Falcons toppled 17 school records and seven MAC records and Josh Harris set a then-league mark with 41 TDs responsible for. Brandon saw wide receiver Robert Redd earn first-team All-MAC honors for two straight seasons. In addition, BGSU had the top red zone efficiency in the nation (96.8) converting on 61 of 63 opportunities inside the opponents' 20-yard line.

In his first season at BGSU, the Falcon offense showed tremendous improvement, accumulating 124.46 more yards per game and 14.48 more points per game than the 2000 squad. Among MAC schools, the Falcons improved from 13th to fourth in total offense and from 11th to third in scoring offense under his leadership. BGSU set five school records on offense that year. Brandon joined the Falcons after spending two seasons at Colorado under Gary Barnett, where he coached the receivers and kickoff return units both years and was the team's passing-game coordinator in 2000 and recruiting coordinator in 1999. Brandon, 50, played football for Barnett at Air Academy High School in Colorado Springs, and stayed in close touch with him throughout the years. When Barnett was hired as head coach at Northwestern in 1992, Brandon joined the Wildcat staff as receivers coach. He was also Northwestern's recruiting coordinator for his last two seasons there (1997-98). In his seven seasons at Northwestern, Brandon assembled an extremely talented group of receivers, including D'Wayne Bates, the second all-time leading receiver in Big Ten history. Bates was a semifinalist for the Biletnikoff Award and an All-America candidate.

Brandon played collegiately as both a defensive back and wide receiver at Mesa State (1974) and Northern Colorado (1975-77). He graduated from UNC in 1978 with a bachelors degree in education, and began his coaching career that fall as head football coach at Ellicott (Colo.) High School. He spent three seasons there (1978-80) before joining the college ranks at Weber State (under former Washington State coach Mike Price), where he would coach the next six seasons (1981-86). He coached the tight ends and special teams in his first four seasons, the linebackers in his fifth year and the receivers and tight ends during his final year in Ogden. He was then named receivers coach at Wyoming, where he would work the next four years (1987-90). During his tenure with head coach Paul Roach, the Cowboys posted a 35-15 record, including a 16-0 run in Western Athletic Conference play in 1987 and 1988, and played in three bowls ('87 and '88 Holiday and '90 Copper). In 1991, he returned to Utah where he coached the linebackers for one season (1991) at Utah State. Brandon, born Feb. 29, 1956, in Tucson, Ariz., and his wife, Robyn, are

Mike Ward is in his second season as defensive coordinator at BGSU and his 17th season overall with the Falcons.

In his first season at the helm of the Falcon defense he helped produce three All-MAC players in Diyral Briggs, P.J. Mahone and Antonio Smith.

Prior to his time as the defensive coordinator he spent seven seasons working with the Falcon defensive linemen and previously was the program's strength coach from 1992-99.

Since the 2000 season, Ward has coached one All-American, one Academic All-American and eight All-MAC performers.

In 2006, he saw senior defensive end Devon Parks earn first team-All-MAC honors after recording 13.5 TFL's and nine sacks. In addition, senior tackle Brad Williams had four sacks and sophomore defensive end also ranked among MAC leaders with seven sacks. In 2005, as the coach of the defensive tackles, he saw Mike Thaler lead the team with 5.5 sacks and earn Academic All-American honors, while fellow senior Monte Cooley also had five TFLs.

In 2004, his front line of defense was integral in the Falcon squad finishing third in the MAC in scoring defense, fifth in rushing defense, and sixth in overall defense. Ward's interior unit also accounted for 16 of BGSU's 23 sacks and 36 tackles-for-a-loss. In 2003, he oversaw the development of some of the best young talent on the defensive interior in the MAC. In addition, his group helped the Falcons finish second the the league against the rush and garner 32 sacks. The Falcons' young defensive line held its own in 2002, ranking third in the MAC against the rush and fourth overall in total defense. In addition,

the Falcons led the league in turnover margin for the second straight year.

In 2002, he coached Alex Glantzis who earned second-team All-MAC honors. In 2001, he saw nose tackle Brandon Hicks earn All-American honors and first-team All-MAC accolades as the Falcons finished seventh in the nation against the rush. In addition, three players-Hicks, Chris Glantzis and Ryan Wingrove ranked among the top 10 players in the MAC in sacks. In his first season in 2000, he saw Hicks earn first-team All-MAC honors after he finished among the MAC leaders in sacks.



Ward, a native of Mansfield, Ohio, was an assistant football coach at the University of Findlay for six years prior to coming to BGSU. He served as the defensive line coach and the strength and conditioning coordinator for the Oilers before leaving in 1992. Prior to that, he was an assistant football coach and strength coach at his alma mater, Georgetown College, for two years. Ward earned a degree in health and physical education from Georgetown College in 1984. He also earned a graduate degree in secondary education from Georgetown.

The Lexington High School graduate received second-team NAIA Division I All-America football honors as an offensive guard in 1983. Ward is certified by the National Strength and Conditioning Association as a Strength and Conditioning Specialist. He was twice named as the NSCA Professional of the Year by his colleagues in the Mid-American Conference. Ward and his wife, Jody, have two children, Michaela and Addison.

Troy Rothenbuhler is in his sixth season at BGSU, his second as the assistant head coach and first as the passing game coordinator. He also served as the team's recruiting coordinator from 2003-07.

In 2007, he helped coach the wide receivers, including Freddie Barnes and his 82 catches and nine touchdowns.

In 2005 and 2006 he helped coach Sean O'Drobinak and Ruben Ruiz, two main factors to the Falcon tight ends.

In 2004, he saw Mitchell Crossley earn second-team All-MAC honors and saw Devon Parks emerge as one of the top young defensive linemen in the MAC. His group also helped the Falcons lead the league in turnovers forced with 25 and finish third in the nation in turnover margin.

In 2003, he saw tight end Craig Jarrett become the first Falcon in more than a decade to earn Academic All-American honors.

As recruiting coordinator, BGSU has forged a strong footprint in recruiting some of the top players in the state of Ohio and throughout the Midwest and southeastern United States. He came to Bowling Green in 2003 after spending 2002 as offensive coordinator at Heidelberg College. He had previously spent five years as an assistant coach at Arkansas State. During his tenure with the Indians, he coached both tight ends and receivers.

A 1995 graduate of Ohio State, Rothenbuhler was a graduate assistant for the Buckeyes in 1995 and 1996 where he worked with



the quarterbacks and tight ends. From 1992-94, he was a student assistant who assisted with the team's wide receivers. During his time with the Buckeyes, he worked with teams that appeared in one Rose Bowl, three Citrus Bowls and one Holiday Bowl. He is a 1989 graduate of Oregon Clay High School. Born April 10, 1971, in Oregon, Ohio, he and his wife, Amy, a Campbell native, are the parents of one daughter, Madison and a son, Jake.

In his first season with the Falcons he saw six members of the wide receiving group record career-bests. Freddie Barnes (82), Marques Parks (28), Chris Wright (26), Tyrone Pronty (19), Jermiah Kelley (12) and Derk Brighton (10) all recorded career-best in receptions under Bird.

Bird also coached the Falcon special teams that saw Sinisa Vrvilo earn third team all-MAC honors, making 15 of 19 field goal attempts.

He joined the Falcons in 2007 after spending two seasons at his alma mater, Eastern Kentucky. A former All-American for the Colonels, he coached wide receivers in 2006 and tight ends in 2005. In 2005, he saw tight end Patrick Bugg earn All-American honors after leading the OVC in TDs.

From 2001 to 2004, he served as passing game coordinator and wide receivers coach at West Virginia University. He coordinated the passing game for an offense that produced 20,000 yards of offense and 133 TDs from 2002 to 2004. In 2003, he saw one of his players earn Big East Rookie of the Year and during his tenure, his top pupil also averaged 900 yards and scored 22 times in his career. In addition, the team went to three straight bowl games (2002 Continental Tire Bowl and 2004 and 2005 Gator Bowl).

A native of Corbin, Ky., Bird helped ECU win national championships as a player in 1979 and 1982. His collegiate career culminated in 1982, when he was named a Kodak All-American, as well as the Ohio Valley Conference Player of the Year and Male Athlete of the Year. After graduating from Eastern in 1983, Bird was selected by the St. Louis Cardinals in the NFL Draft. He enjoyed a four-year stint in the NFL, playing with the Cardinals and San Diego Chargers. Bird returned to ECU in 1987 as a wide receivers coach. He went on to work as a graduate assistant coach at Kentucky (1990-91) and Tennessee (1992), before joining Pittsburgh as a wide receivers coach (1993-95). His road to West Virginia included stops at Kent State, Tulane and Middle Tennessee State. At three of his coaching stops, Bird worked



with the school's all-time leading receiver - Pitt, Middle Tennessee and Kent State. Bird's father, Jerry, starred for the Kentucky Wildcats and led UK basketball to a 25-0 record in 1954. Bird received both his bachelor's and master's degrees from ECU. He and his wife, Lisa, have two children, Ryan and Madison.

Adam Gonzaga

Adam Gonzaga is in his second year as defensive backs coach for the Falcons.

In his first season his defensive backs had 10 of the Falcons' 14 interceptions, while P.J. Mahone (second

team) and Antonio Smith (third team) both earned All-MAC honors.

Gonzaga came to BGSU after spending the five seasons at Northwood (Michigan) University where he was the defensive coordinator. Gonzaga saw four of his defensive players earn All-American honors during his tenure as the Timberwolves were one of just two teams in the country to advance to the NCAA Division II playoffs each of the last three years.

In 2006, his defense forced 29

turnovers and allowed 279 yards per game and saw eight opponents score 20 points or less. They were sixth in the country in turnover margin. The 2005 Northwood defense remained strong under Gonzaga. Northwood ranked 23rd nationally in scoring defense (18.3 ppg) while placing three players on the All-GLIAC first-team (Kyle Clement, Charleston Hughes, Jon Horn). NU also led the conference with 21 interceptions and a total of 30 forced turnovers on defense. The Timberwolves held their opponents under 20 points seven times in 12 games. In 2004, Northwood scored a total of six defensive touchdowns and won a GLIAC championship. In 2003, Northwood finished finished No. 1 against the pass in the conference, allowing teams to gain just 140.5 yards per game through the air.

Gonzaga came to Northwood from the United States Naval Academy, where he coached the linebackers during the 2001 season. He also had a successful two-year stint at Greenville College in Greenville, Illinois from 1999-2000. While at Greenville, Gonzaga served as the defensive coordinator and the squad posted back-to-back winning seasons for the first time in nine years. He coached two All-Americans and the 1999 squad was co-SLIAC conference champions. In 1998, Gonzaga coached the defensive ends and outside linebackers at the University of Connecticut. UConn went 10-3 and advanced to the NCAA Division I-AA Semifinals during his one season on the staff.

Gonzaga has also had stints at Division I-AA Lafayette (1997), where he coached the defensive line; Montana State (1996), where he coached the secondary; the University of the Pacific (1993-95), where he coached the special teams, linebackers and secondary; and was the football recruiting assistant at Stanford (1992). Gonzaga is a 1992 graduate of Asuza Pacific University with a bachelor's degree in education. He and his wife, Heidi, have two daughters - Alexis and Addison.

Deion Melvin is in his second season as the linebackers coach at Bowling Green. Melvin comes to BGSU after spending one season as the running backs and defensive coordinator at Georgia Southern University.

In his first year with the Falcons the linebacking core of Erique Dozier (112), John Haneline (96) and Loren Hargrove (87) finished first, second and fourth on the team in tackles.

While at GSU he coached a pair of running backs that recorded over 800 yards apiece that ran for a combined 15 touchdowns in his first season as the running backs coach. The Eagles finished 22nd in the country in rushing.

Prior to his time at GSU he spent seven seasons with Missouri State where he held the title of assistant head coach and defensive coordinator. He also coached the linebackers in all seven of those seasons. He was also the recruiting coordinator starting in 1999.

He began his coaching career at Western Illinois (1993-98) where he coached the linebacker position and was the recruiting coordinator and assistant strength coach. In his final year with Western Illinois the defense led the nation in scoring defense, rushing defense and total defense. James Milton, a linebacker under Melvin, earned the Buck Buchanan Award, given to the best I-AA Defensive Player of the Year.

Jim Hofher

Quarterbacks, First Season
Cornell, 1979



Jim Hofher begins his first season coaching quarterbacks at Bowling Green. Prior to his time with the Falcons he was the head coach for the University at Buffalo from 2001-05.

Prior to his time at Buffalo, he spent the 2000 season coaching quarterbacks at Syracuse and the 1998 and 1999 season coaching that same position at North Carolina. This past season he worked as a color analysis for ESPN Regional Television, broadcasting two BGSU games in 2007.

Hofher, who spent eight seasons as the head coach at Cornell (1990-97) and is the winningest coach in the Big Red's Ivy League history, has also been an assistant coach at Wake Forest (1983-86), Miami (OH) (1981-82), Tennessee (1989) and Syracuse (1987-88).

While coaching the Big Red he compiled a career record of 45-35, including a 33-23 record in Ivy League games. The 33 league victories are the most of any Cornell head coach in their long and storied history. His Ivy League win percentage is also the best in Cornell history.

During his tenure as head coach, the Big Red played for two league titles, winning one, and set 170 team or individual records for game, season and career standards at Cornell. In addition, he had two players selected in the NFL Draft and two players sign NFL free agent contracts.

Hofher was the quarterbacks coach at Tennessee in 1989 when the Volunteers won the Cotton Bowl and were SEC tri-champions. He mentored former NFL quarterback Andy Kelly while at Tennessee.

Prior to his stint at UT, he served three seasons as running backs coach

at Wake Forest from 1983-86 prior to his first appointment at Syracuse. Hofher's first full-time collegiate coaching experience was at Miami, a member of the Mid-American Conference, where he served as the quarterbacks and wide receivers coach from 1981-82.

During his collegiate coaching career, Hofher has coached in five bowl games (Cotton, Sugar, Hall of Fame, Las Vegas and Tangerine).

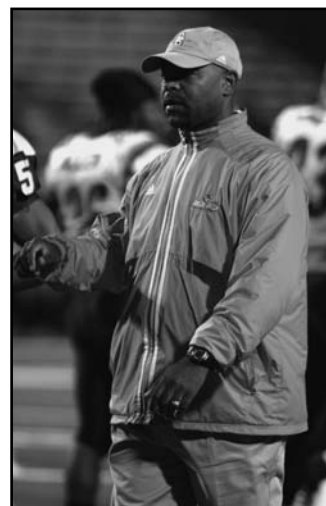

In 2007 Hunter's running backs recorded 1,607 yards on the ground, led by former quarterback Anthony Turner (519). True freshman Willie Getter chipped in with 432 yards and Chris Bullock had 281.

In 2006 he saw the Falcons lead the MAC averaging 176.6 yards per game and oversaw the development of Freshman All-American Chris Bullock.

From 2000 to 2006, Hunter served as the head football and boy's track and field coach at Pershing. On the gridiron, his teams were 40-28 and made four state playoff appearances in the last six years after the school had made just one state playoff appearances in its history prior to his arrival. He led Pershing to two district titles, two regional championship games and one Detroit P.S.L. playoff nod.

Hunter, who graduated from the institution in 1988, was a four-year starter at linebacker and twice was named first-team All-MAC (1986 and 1987). For his career, he had 336 tackles, including 44 for a loss and was a member of a 1985 MAC Championship team. Following his senior year, he signed a free agent contract with the San Francisco 49ers. Prior to his stint at Pershing High School, Hunter was an assistant coach at St. Martin DePorres in 1989 and from 1994-99. He was the defensive backs coach for a team which won the state championship in 1989 and was defensive coordinator from 1994-99, also winning state titles in 1995 and 1996. As a player, he also played on state title teams at DePorres in 1981 and 1982.

A native of Detroit, he and his wife, Amara, have a son, John (9) and a daughter, Justiss (6).

Doug Phillips is in his second season with the Falcons coaching the defensive ends, and his first as BGSU's recruiting coordinator.

Last season he coach first team All-MAC performer Diyral Briggs, who had 54 tackles and five sacks in his first year under Phillips.

Doug Phillips joined the Falcon staff after spending the 2006 season as the defensive quality control coach at Ohio State. He was part of a staff which won the Big Ten championship and played in the BCS title game. Last year, the Buckeyes were fifth in the country in scoring defense. On the field, he assisted with the Buckeye linebackers which included All-American and Bronko Nagurski Trophy winner James Laurinaitis.



He enters his 20th year in the coaching profession. He worked for 15 years at the high school level, including nine as a head coach. In addition, he spent two years at Youngstown State with Jim Tressel, while earning his masters degree. He coached tight ends, defensive backs and running backs/kickers during his stay. Under Tressel, Phillips has coached in three national championship games including this past season at OSU and in 1992 and 1991 at YSU. The Penguins won the Division IAA title in 1991.

A native of New Middletown, Ohio, and a 1991 graduate of Toledo, Phillips led his high school alma mater, Springfield Local, to

back-to-back state playoff appearances. His 1999 team won the first of consecutive league championships and made the first of those two playoff appearances, while his 2000 squad went undefeated in the regular season and returned to the postseason, where it to the state quarterfinals. After four years at Springfield Local (1997-2000) Phillips moved onto Salem High School, where he spent five seasons (2001-05) and guided his teams to better records every season, culminating with a league runner-up finish in 2005. In addition, he guided the school to consecutive winning records in 2004 and 2005, a feat that was accomplished for the first time in 30 years at the school.

While an undergraduate student at Toledo, Phillips got his coaching career started at Toledo St. Francis DeSales and Sylvania Northview. After earning a bachelors degree in education from UT in 1991, he received a master's degree in educational administration from Youngstown State in 1995.

MID-AMERICAN CONFERENCE

Providing leadership in education and in diversity, the Mid-American Conference moves into its 62nd year of service to the student-athlete.

Since its inception in 1946, the Mid-American Conference has progressively grown and developed into one of the most aggressive Division I conferences in the country. Under the guidance of Commissioner Rick Chryst, the seventh commissioner in the history of the league, the MAC has responded to the ever changing landscape of membership issues and member standards in the fast-paced environment of collegiate athletics.

The league has grown its commitment to championships by expanding to six its number of neutral site post season events – football (Detroit's Ford Field), volleyball (Toledo's SeaGate Centre), men's and women's basketball (Cleveland's Quicken Loans Arena), softball (Akron's Firestone Stadium) and most recently baseball (Chillicothe's VA Memorial Stadium).

MAC football produced three bowl teams in 2007, the giving the MAC 14 bowl berths in the past four years with 10 different league institutions represented during that time. The 2007 season also welcomed the addition of Temple University to the East Division and the Owls responded with a league-leading defense and a 4-4 conference mark in their inaugural

MAC season. A total of nine MAC football players were selected in the 2008 NFL draft, making it the second most selectees for the league since the NFL went to seven rounds in 1994.

In its partnership with ESPN, the worldwide leader in sports, an unprecedented 25 football games involving MAC schools will be televised in 2008. That number includes regular season and post season events on ESPN, ESPN2, ESPNU, ESPN Classic and ESPN360. In addition, an eight-game MAC Game of the Week will be syndicated on ESPN Plus and available on over-the-air network affiliates to more than 22 millions homes in the Midwest.

Four Mid-American Conference men's basketball programs went on to postseason play this season as Kent State (NCAA Tournament), Akron (National Invitation Tournament), Miami (College Basketball Invitational) and Ohio (College Basketball Invitational) all made an appearance in postseason tournaments. There were a total of two women's basketball programs that reached the postseason as Miami (NCAA Tournament) and Bowling Green (Women's NIT) represented the MAC in postseason play.

Kent State men's basketball program was ranked in the top 25 in the regular season for the first time in school history. The Golden

Flashes were 23rd in the Associated Press poll and 24th in the ESPN/USA Today coaches' poll, both of which were released on February 25th. The Flashes earned their 10th consecutive 20-win season in addition to picking up the 1,000th victory in the 92-year history of the program. The last time the MAC had a team appear in the top 25 during the regular season was in 2001 when Ball State was ranked for four straight weeks (Nov. 26-Dec. 17), with the Cardinals climbing as high as 15th in the AP poll on Dec. 3.

The Golden Flashes also made headlines in men's golf this past season as KSU finished alone in sixth place at the NCAA Championship to earn the highest finish in the program's storied history. MAC wrestlers also continued to shine on the national stage as Central Michigan senior 197-pounder Wynn Michalak finished runner-up at the NCAA Wrestling Championships and the Chippewas finished tied for seventh in the overall team competition.

From Super Bowl quarterback Ben Roethlisberger (Miami University), British Open winner Ben Curtis (Kent State University), World Series winning manager Bob Brenly (Ohio University) and Olympic bobsled team member Brock Kreitzburg (University of Toledo), the Mid-American Conference continues to excel in producing leaders in the world of athletics.

MAC Milestones

In March of 2006, Chryst and Cleveland Cavaliers President Len Komoroski announced that the Mid-American Conference Men's and Women's Basketball Tournaments would remain in Cleveland at Quicken Loans Arena through 2011. The MAC also announced a format change for both tourna-

ments, bringing all 12 men's and women's teams to Cleveland beginning in 2007. The MAC also co-hosted the 2007 Women's Final Four at Quicken Loans Arena, after successfully hosting a 2006 NCAA Women's Basketball Regional at Quicken Loans Arena.

In 2006, Chryst also announced a five-year partnership with ISP Sports, Inc. to oversee and coordinate the league's marketing and sponsorship rights. ISP, which currently manages more than 40 college properties nationwide, is considered the leader in the collegiate sports marketing industry. The MAC was ISP's first conference property.

ISP is responsible for managing and growing the MAC's stable of corporate partners, which currently includes FirstEnergy, Kraft, Marathon Oil, GMAC Financial Services, Gatorade, Automart.com and Sirius Satellite Radio. FirstEnergy has been the title sponsor for the men's basketball tournament since its first year in Cleveland in March 2000, Kraft has been associated with the women's basketball tournament since 2001, and Marathon Oil will be sponsoring the football championship for the fourth time in 2008.

History of the MAC

Based in Cleveland since July 1999 following a 15-year stay in Toledo, Ohio, the MAC has established historic measurements in both football and men's and women's basketball since its move to Northeast Ohio.

The Mid-American Conference was founded as a five-school league on February 24, 1946 in Columbus, Ohio with Ohio, Butler, Cincinnati, Wayne State and Western Reserve admitted as charter members. The Mid-American Conference has 12 full-time schools and a 13th, Temple, for football only. Comprising the East Division is the University of Akron (joined in 1992), Bowling Green State University (1952), University at Buffalo (1998), Kent State University (1951), Miami University (1947), Ohio University (1946) and Temple University (2007). The West Division members are Ball State University (1973), Central Michigan University (1971), Eastern Michigan University (1971), Northern Illinois University (1975-86, 1997), University of Toledo (1950) and Western Michigan University (1947).

In 1946 men's basketball was the first competitive sport in the MAC, which now sponsors a total of 23 sports. Women's sports were brought into the conference's structure in 1980.

For men, championships (11) are sponsored in football, basketball, baseball, cross country, soccer, swimming and diving, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, wrestling, golf and tennis.

For women, championships (12) are sponsored in basketball, softball, volleyball, cross country, field hockey, golf, soccer, swimming and diving, gymnastics, indoor track and field, outdoor track and tennis.

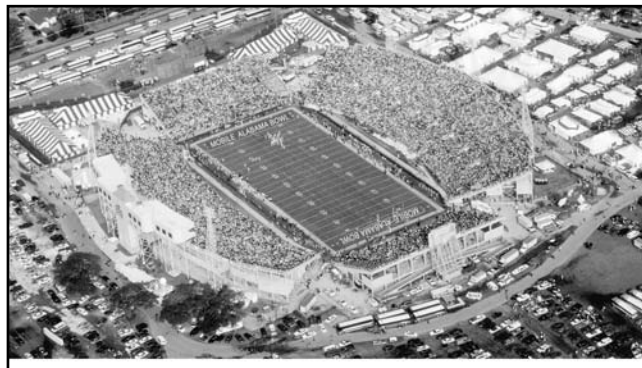

Tyler Sheehan's 2-point conversion pass to Freddie Barnes in overtime lifted Bowling Green past Minnesota 32-31 on Saturday night in the season opener.

Sheehan found a wide-open Marques Parks for a 9-yard touchdown pass to pull the Falcons within one, and coach Gregg Brandon went for two to end it. The winner was a tight throw near the sideline, caught by Barnes with three Gophers converging.

New Minnesota coach Tim Brewster saw his team rally from a 21-0 deficit midway through the third quarter. Amir Pinnix's 22-yard touchdown run gave the Gophers a 31-24 advantage on the first possession of the extra period.

Pinnix was the spark behind the comeback, rushing for 168 yards and two scores -- plus the tying touchdown catch with 8:53 left in regulation. Freshman quarterback Adam Weber had two costly first-half turnovers and an overall rough performance in his debut. He went 15-for-31 for 188 yards and two touchdowns.

Sheehan finished 34-for-51 for 388 yards and two scores, plus a TD catch of his own on a throwback pass from Corey Partridge. Eric Ransom caught seven passes for 96 yards and one touchdown.

Brian Hoyer completed 17 of 29 passes for 250 yards and two touchdowns as Michigan State held off Bowling Green, 28-17, in a nonconference game Saturday.

The Spartans' Devin Thomas had four catches for 156 yards and a fourth-quarter TD.

Bowling Green (1-1), a Mid-American Conference team shooting for its second straight upset of a Big Ten opponent, faded in the second half against the more physical Spartans (2-0). Quarterback Tyler Sheehan completed 32 of 50 passes for 295 yards with a TD and ran for another score. Like Hoyer, he threw two interceptions.

Michigan State grabbed a 21-14 lead early in the third quarter on a 5-yard TD plunge by Jehuu Caulcrick. Thomas made the key play in the drive, fighting off defender Kenny Lewis to haul in a 42-yard pass from Hoyer.

Bowling Green pulled to within 21-17 late in the third quarter on a 31-yard field goal by Sinisa Vrvilo.

But the Falcons' hopes fizzled when Roderick Jenrette intercepted a Sheehan pass early in the fourth quarter, setting up Michigan State at the Falcons 25. Hoyer connected with Thomas for a 17-yard touchdown to give the Spartans a 28-17 lead.

Hurricane Paul Smith and the nation's top-rated offense turned a little charity into a lot of history in the GMAC Bowl.

Smith had his NCAA-record 14th consecutive 300-yard passing game, and Tulsa converted four fumble recoveries into first-half touchdowns on the way to a 63-7 win over Bowling Green on Sunday night.

With all that help, the Golden Hurricane (10-4) ran up a 35-0 halftime lead and capped coach Todd Graham's first season by reaching 10 wins for the first time since 1991. Tulsa had never managed more than 31 points in 14 previous bowl games.

Smith passed for 312 yards and five touchdowns, the last 3:22 left in the blowout. He broke the record of 13 300-yard efforts in a row he shared with BYU's Ty Detmer, whose streak stretched over the 1989 and 1990 seasons.

He and Tarrion Adams joined Houston's David Klingler and Chuck Weatherspoon as the NCAA's only 5,000-yard passing and 1,000-yard rushing tandem.

Bowling Green, which had won four consecutive bowl games, lost three fumbles in its own territory in the first quarter and never recovered.

Roger Williams scored on a 78-yard kick return early in the third quarter for the Falcons' only points, the first ever kick return for a TD in the GMAC Bowl.

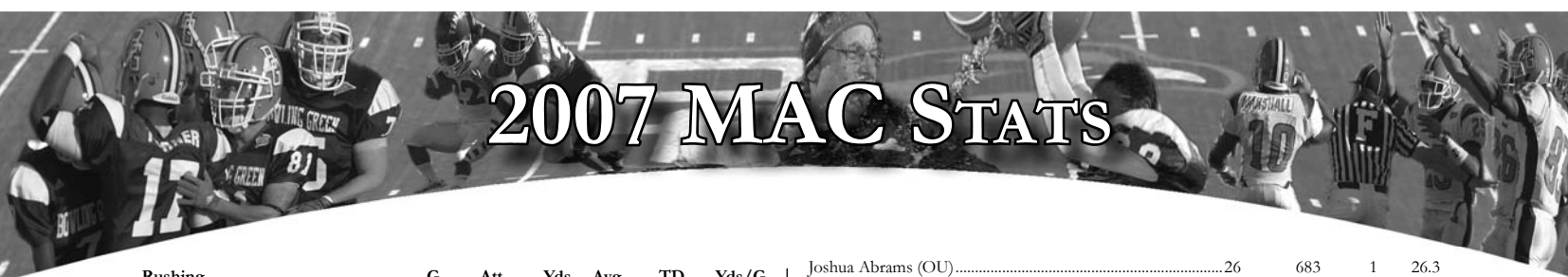

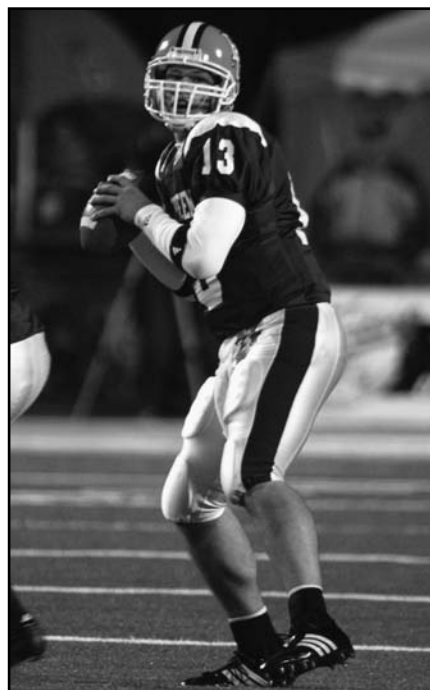

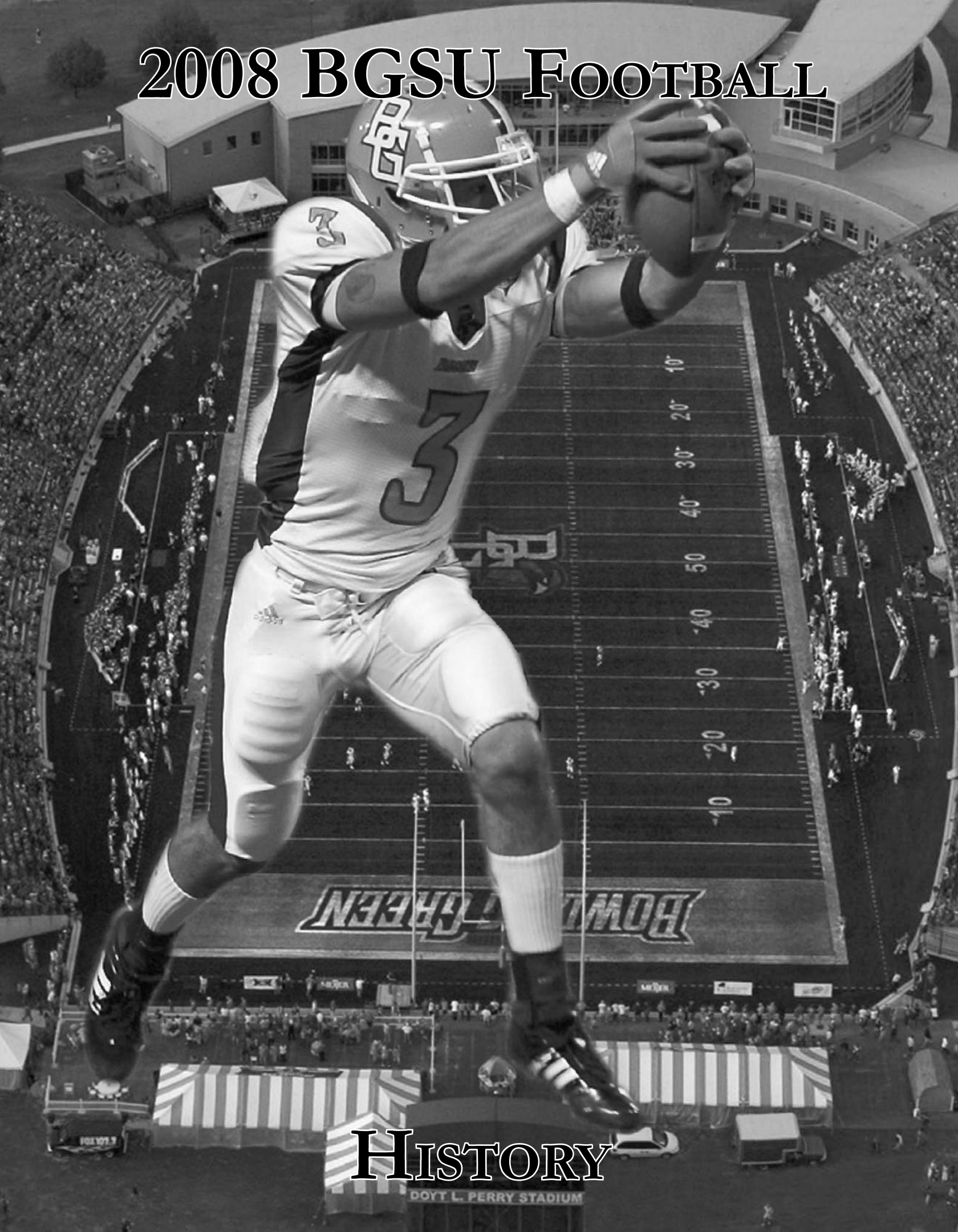

HISTORY OF BGSU FOOTBALL



Scott Mruczkowski and Mike Thaler celebrate the Falcons' 28-24 Motor City Bowl win over Northwestern in 2003. It marked the first-time in MAC history that a league school ever faced a Big Ten opponent in the post-season.

Since Frederick G. Beyerman, an instructor in the physical education department and the first athletic director, announced in July, 1919 that Bowling Green State Normal College would field an intercollegiate football team, a rich tradition has developed.

From that very first team, to the first squad to go unbeaten in 1928, to the first perfect record of the 1959 national college division champions, to, most recently, back-to-back seasons of nationally ranked division IA football.

From former head coach Warren Steller, to Max Minnich, the first BGSU player to be drafted by a professional team, to Fred Durig, the first All-America selection, to legendary head coach Doyt Perry, to Paul Miles, the only football player ever to have his jersey retired, to Dave Preston, the career rushing leader, to record-setting quarterback Brian McClure, to head coach Gregg Brandon, the Bowling Green State University football program has a tradition as rich as any in the Mid-American Conference, and many programs nationally.

Since 19 of the 30 males enrolled at Normal College banded together to form that first team, many different people, players, and games have combined to mold the lore of football at BGSU.

The following paragraphs will touch on many of the people and games which carved the Falcon football history.

The program got off to a rocky start losing its first seven games played.

Franklin Skibbie scored the first touchdown with BG's only points in the 10-6 loss to Findlay

in the 1920 season opener.

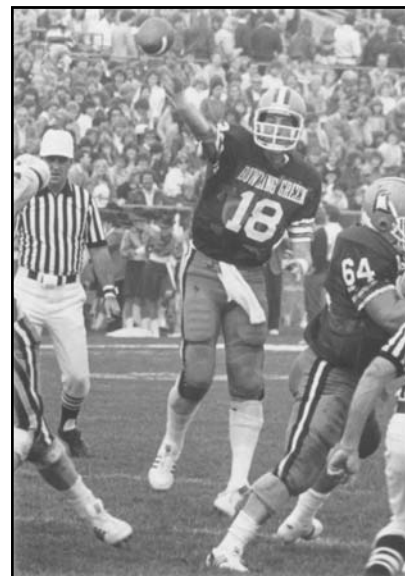
That team would post a 7-0 win over Kent State Normal College (Kent State) in the season finale to record the first win.

The 1921 squad was the first to win a conference title capturing the Northwest Conference championship with wins over Defiance, Findlay, and Toledo. BG posted a shutout of Findlay, scoring a school-record 151 points in one of the most talked-about games in school history. In the season opener against Kent State, played behind what is now Ridge Street School, the Falcons played possibly the quietest game in school history when all fans were prohibited from making noise because of an illness in the neighborhood.

The following season, BG held its first homecoming game on Nov. 4, 1922, which was played at the Fairgrounds. Bowling Green and Toledo battled to a 6-6 deadlock.

After having a different coach in each of its first five seasons, Warren Steller was selected to coach the 1924 squad, the beginning of a very successful 11-year tenure, the second-longest in school history. Steller was the first BGSU head coach to have an assistant when Paul Landis was hired in 1925.

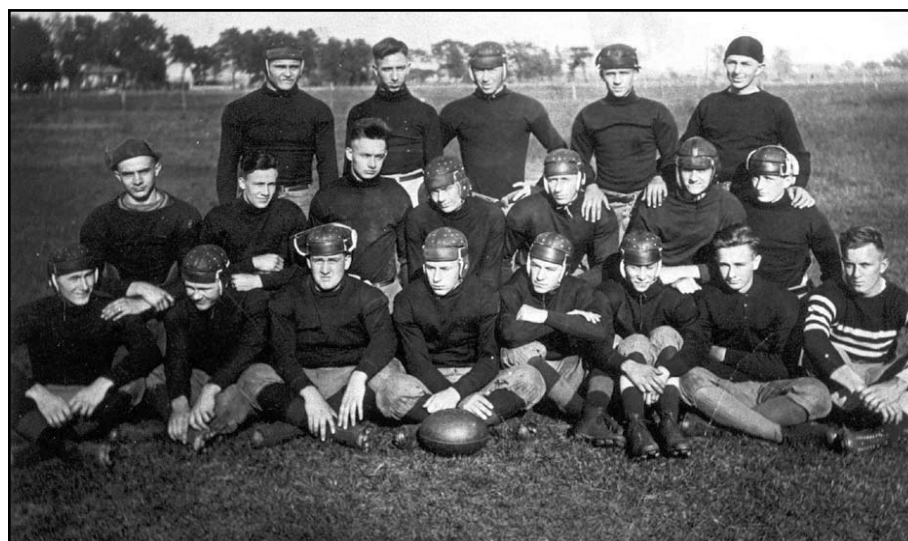
Led by Chet Chapman, the first BG player to earn first team All-Ohio honors, the 1928 team posted the first unbeaten record while allowing just 18 points in seven games.



Brian McClure is one of only two players in MAC history (both from BG) to earn league MVP honors twice.

In 1936, the federal government offered to help Bowling Green financially in the construction of a new football stadium and the Trustees accepted the offer. University Stadium was dedicated on October 23, 1937 and served as the home of Falcon football until 1966 when Doyt L. Perry Stadium was built. University Stadium was located in what is now the center of campus directly west of Jerome Library.

In 1941, Robert Whittaker was named the head coach at Bowling Green after compiling

an 11-year record of 89-19-2 at Sandusky High School. Whittaker's first of his 14 teams (the longest tenure in school history) tied Case Western Reserve for the Ohio Conference title and was thought to be one of the best teams ever, scoring 173 while allowing just 40.

After back-to-back losing seasons in 1953 and 1954, Doyt Perry began his legendary career as the Falcon head coach in 1955 and made an

immediate impact. BG posted a 7-1-1 record, scoring 224 points while allowing only 53. This came on the heels of a 2-7 record the previous season.

Perry, whose teams never lost more than two games in any of his 10 seasons, led his 1959 squad to the first perfect record in school history at 9-0-0. In the process, the Falcons were named the mythical small college national champions by the Washington, D.C. Touchdown Club.

BG's closest game that season was a Mid-American Conference victory at Ohio University by a 13-9 count to wrap up the perfect season and national honor.

The following season, BG came within one game of repeating as national champions losing only a 14-7 decision to OU at home as the Bobcats claimed top national honors.

In 1961, Bowling Green played in its first bowl game, the Mercy Bowl at the Los Angeles Coliseum. The game against Fresno State was played to raise money to help defray the expenses of the families of 16 members of the Cal Poly San Luis Obispo football team who perished in a plane crash shortly after takeoff from Toledo Express Airport after a 1960 game against BG.

The game netted \$170,000 for the memorial fund.



One of the most significant wins in school history was the 17-13 victory over 18th-ranked Purdue in 1972. A fourth quarter field goal by Don Taylor was the difference for Coach Don Nehlen and his Falcons.

The arrival of a skinny, much-heralded quarterback from Ravenna, Ohio in 1982 signaled the beginning of an 11-year period in which the Falcons would make four bowl appearances.

The quarterback was Brian McClure and all he would do in the next four seasons was lead the Falcons to a 34-12 record, a 19-1 record at home, two bowl games, and become only the second quarterback in NCAA history to pass for over 10,000 yards.

He became the starter in the third game of his freshman season, and despite missing the last two games of the regular season, he became the first freshman to be named the first team all-league quarterback.

He would rewrite the BG and MAC record

books before his career was over, setting five NCAA records as well. McClure still holds numerous school and MAC records.

In 1991, Gary Blackney was tabbed as the 14th head football coach, and much like the arrival of McClure, he made an immediate impact on the program.

In his first season, he took a team which compiled a 3-5-2 mark the previous season and molded them into an 11-1 squad, going undefeated in the MAC while winning the program's first bowl game.

The following season was more of the same as the Falcons were again perfect in league play and a win over Nevada in the first Las Vegas Bowl made it back-to-back bowl victories. The 1993 squad would extend the conference winning streak to a league-record 19 games while going unbeaten in the first 22 MAC games of Blackney's tenure.

Urban Meyer took over the reins of the Falcon program in 2001 and engineered the top turnaround in Division IA. The Falcons opened the Meyer era with an impressive road win at Missouri and followed that up with wins over Buffalo and Temple, surpassing their victory total of the previous year.

BGSU posted its first winning season since

1994 when it reeled off three straight wins to end the season. The Falcons' 43-42 victory at Northwestern made them the first MAC team to ever defeat three teams from BCS conferences in a single season. The Falcons ended the season six-days later with a 56-21 pasting of MAC Champion Toledo.

In 2002, BGSU roared to an 8-0 start including win over Missouri and Kansas and were ranked in both the AP and Coaches polls at the same time for the first time in school history.

Meyer's offensive coordinator, Gregg Brandon, took over as head coach in December, 2002, and guided the Falcons to their first-ever MAC West title and Motor City Bowl Championship and finished ranked in the top 25 (#23) in both major polls at the end of a season for the first-time in school history.

One player who links Blackney, Meyer and Brandon was All-American quarterback Josh Harris. The Westerville, Ohio native came to BGSU with the intention of sitting out the 2000 season as a redshirt, but was pressed into duty when injuries decimated the Falcon backfield.

Serving as a running back and kick returner for the bulk of the season, Harris showed signs of greatness in glimpses and even started his first career game on ESPN against Toledo.

Meyer took over the program the following season and inserted Harris into the starting lineup for good in the ninth game of the season and watched his team win 11 straight games over the next two seasons and earn its first national ranking since 1985.

The Motor City Bowl MVP guided the Fal-

cons to a 6-1 record in three seasons as a starter against BCS competition.

The 2003 season gave BGSU its highest national profile and elevated the program to new heights. Longtime Falcon fans have viewed the program's 1972 win over the Boilermakers as one of the biggest in BGSU history.

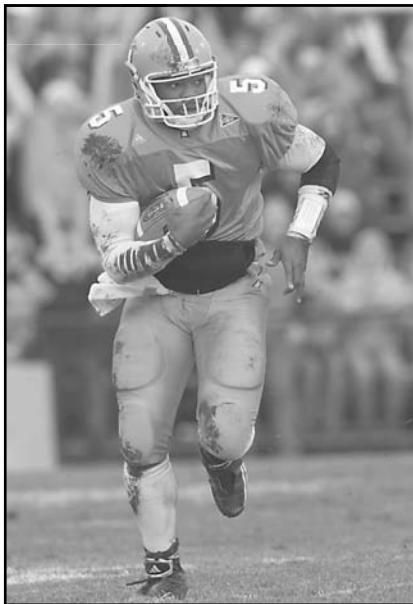
Well, lightning strikes twice. While Purdue entered the day with a #16 national ranking and visions of BCS aspirations dancing in their heads, the Falcons were able to keep it close and the Falcons converted twice on fourth down, capped by a 32-yard miracle pass-and-catch from Harris to Charles Sharon with 2:08 remaining to post a 27-26 win.

The Falcons were back into the national spotlight with a #23 ranking by the AP and a showdown with undefeated and #12 Northern Illinois showed so much promise that ESPN's

College Gameday made Bowling Green its home for the weekend. For the first time in 20 years, Doyt Perry Stadium was sold out and the game was shown on ESPN2.

All-American Janssen Patton set an NCAA record by picking off three passes in a game for the third time in his career and Harris directed the BGSU offense flawlessly as the Falcons prevailed 34-18 in just the second-ever regular season meeting between two nationally-ranked MAC schools. The Falcons would spend the next seven weeks in both national polls and were ranked 24th in the final BCS standings.

In what would be the most meaningful game in the history of the BGSU/Toledo rivalry a national TV audience and another sellout crowd would witness the first meeting in which the two schools played the final game of the regular season for an outright championship.



All-American quarterback Omar Jacobs set an NCAA record by throwing 41 TD passes with just four interceptions in 2004. He was named MVP of the 2004 GMAC Bowl as BGSU defeated Memphis, 52-35.

The Falcons rallied in the fourth quarter in front of a second home sellout crowd to post a 31-23 over arch rival Toledo. That would secure the Falcons' first-ever MAC Championship game appearance at home against #12 Miami.

In the MAC's first-ever battle with the Big Ten in post-season play, Harris earned MVP honors completing a bowl record 38 passes as the Falcons posted a 28-24 win over the Wildcats. The victory allowed the Falcons to finish a season in both the AP and Coaches polls for the first time in school history.

In 2004, BGSU once again enjoyed the national spotlight when they opened the season on the road at Oklahoma in a game that was televised by ABC. While the Falcons fell 40-24 to a team which would play for the national title, a new era was ushered in that day.

Sophomore quarterback Omar Jacobs, in his first collegiate start, would hold his own that day with Heisman Trophy winner Jason White. Jacobs would go on to earn All-American honors and

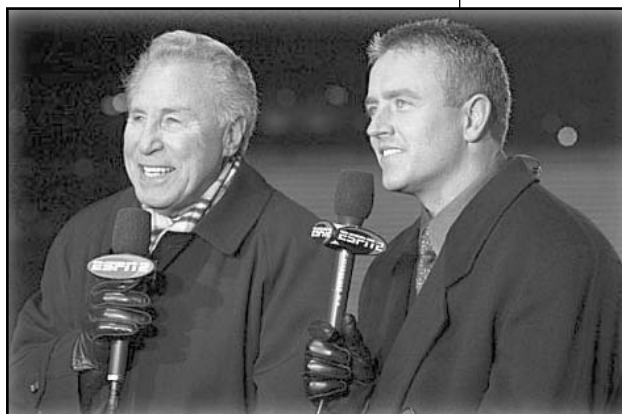
MAC Offensive Player of the Year recognition after throwing for a national best 41 TD passes. He completed 309 of 462 passes for a GSU record 4,002 yards.

Following a 1-2 start, BGSU erupted for a 70-16 victory at Temple, won their next seven games and were ranked by both AP and ESPN for the third straight year.

BGSU would earn its second straight bowl berth and played Memphis in the GMAC Bowl. In its first game ever against a Conference USA opponent, Jacobs would throw for five TDs and 365 yards and the Falcon defense would limit the Tigers to seven points in the second half as BGSU won 52-35. The Falcons were one of a MAC record five teams selected to participate in a post season contest.

BGSU began the 2005 season ranked 23rd by Sports Illustrated and Jacobs was featured in ESPN The Magazine.

In 2007 the Falcons were picked to finish fifth in the Mid-American Conference East preseason polls, but following a 32-31 win over Minnesota to open the season the Falcons rolled to MAC East co-Division Championship, going 6-2, and advancing to their third bowl appearance in the last five seasons, finishing 2007 with an 8-5 record.

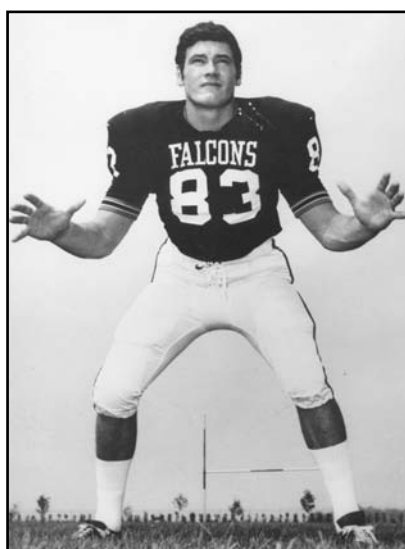


Lee Corso (left) and Kirk Herbstreit were part of the ESPN team which broadcast the 2003 MAC Championship game from Doyt Perry Stadium.

In a one-time game to help defray the expenses (burial and medical) of families of the 16 members of the Cal Poly San Luis Obispo football team who perished in a plane crash, Oct. 29, 1960, shortly after takeoff from Toledo Express Airport, Bowling Green and Fresno State, the undefeated champion of the California Collegiate Athletic Association, met at the historic Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum.

Playing before its largest crowd in school history, the Falcons, six-point favorites, were guilty, uncharacteristically, of six turnovers, which was the difference in the game. BG's defense, which was ranked fourth in the nation, yielded 468 yards, 196 more than it had given up to any opponent

during the season. Quarterbacks Beau Carter and Jon Anabo were thorns in BG's side all day passing for 368 yards and two touchdowns. Carter ran for two scores, also.

BG scored its only points early in the second stanza on the two-yard run by Ray Bell which was set up on a long pass play between Larry Smith and quarterback Jim Potts.

BG fumbled on its next two possessions with FSU turning the second miscue into a touchdown on a long pass play. Bowling Green did have a pass dropped in the end zone as the first half ended which would have given them the lead. Fresno State then scored 1:44 apart midway through the third period to put the game away, the second score set up by a fumbled snap on an attempted punt. The contest netted \$170,000 for the memorial fund which aided the survivors and the relatives of the victims of the plane crash. Cal Poly SLO had played at Bowling Green the afternoon before the crash.

After a full week of events leading up to the meeting with the Pacific Coast Athletic Association champion Fresno State, the Falcons entered the game against the Bulldogs a two-touchdown underdog.

The Falcons also had to contend with a partisan sea of red squeezed into Bulldog Stadium, the home of Fresno State.

But, the Falcons drew first blood converting a Jac Tomasello interception on the final play of the first quarter into the first touchdown of the game, a Chip Otten four-yard run capping a 48-yard drive. The Falcons took a 14-0 lead to the locker room after driving 73 yards on their next possession. Sophomore quarterback Brian McClure connected with John Meek on the scoring play.

BG looked to be in the driver's seat after McClure connected with Shawn Potts from five yards out in the third stanza. But, Fresno State answered BG's score with their first of the contest later in the quarter.

BOWL GAME HISTORY

Bowling Green came right back as Potts picked up a fumble by receiver Greg Taylor at the five-yard line and ran it in to put the Falcons back up by three touchdowns.

With Fresno State pinned back on its own 20-yard line and facing a third-and-ten, a Falcon stop might have put the final nail in the Fresno State coffin. But, FSU gained 15 yards on the third-down play and the comeback was on.

With future NFL receiver Stephone Paige running and catching a pass for a touchdown, FSU closed to within six points with three minutes left. BG used up just 1:05 of the clock on its next possession and FSU moved 45 yards in eight plays with Jeff Tedford finding Vince Wesson

over the middle with 11 seconds left. Scott Darrow's PAT was the deciding point.

BG gained just 26 yards on nine plays in the fourth quarter while FSU gained 220 of its 453 yards in the final 15 minutes.

The tone for what was expected to be one of the most evenly-matched California Bowls, came earlier in the week when BGSU head coach Denny Stolz told the team before their Wednesday practice he would be leaving after the bowl game to accept the head coaching job at San Diego State.

An indication of what was ahead for the Falcons in the game came early in the first quarter when, trailing 7-0, they drove to the Bulldog one-yard line where they fumbled the ball away in the end zone, the first of five on the day and the same number they had committed in the first 11 games of the season. Fresno State would score the next 37 points before BG would hit paydirt.

Not even being a double-digit underdog against Fresno State could keep the Falcons from completing its storybook season under first-year head coach Gary Blackney.

And the script for this game was all Hollywood.

The first quarter would have led the fans to believe it might take 40 or 50 points to win the game as the Falcons scored touchdowns on their first two possessions and the Bulldogs would get one of those back before the quarter was over.

The scoring continued early in the second stanza as BG's Erik White and Mark Szlachcic hooked up for a second time. But, FSU came right back on their next possession with Anthony Daigle running 57 yards to cut the deficit in half going to the lockerroom.

The defenses took over in the third quarter, each allowing just 65 yards total offense. Late in the quarter, FSU placekicker Derek Mahoney missed a 26-yard field goal, the most significant scoring opportunity of the quarter.

BG scored early in the final stanza moving 80 yards after the missed field goal to build another 14-point lead.

FSU came right back to score driving 71 yards as quarterback Mark Barsotti completed five-of-six passes, connecting with tight end Marty Thompson from five yards out.

After three changes of possession, FSU started the final drive of the game from their one-yard line, after an interception, with 2:29 remaining.

FSU used its last time out with 24 seconds left and the Bulldogs just nine yards away from the needed touchdown. After a running play for six yards and two incomplete passes, the final play of the game would determine the outcome with three seconds left.

The BG defense rose to the occasion covering all FSU receivers and Barsotti threw incomplete with BG linebacker Kevin O'Brien pressuring. It was BG's first bowl win.

BG won its 11th game making Blackney one of only three coaches in NCAA history to win 11 games in their first season as a head coach.

In the inaugural Las Vegas Bowl, which replaced the California Bowl, the Falcons faced the high-powered offense of the University of Nevada.

In a game in which the punting game took center stage, the Falcons won the first half and Nevada the second half, but a late BG touchdown proved to be the difference.

The Falcons scored on their first four possessions to grab a 28-3 halftime lead. BG had 267 first-half yards to just 116 for the Wolfpack as they had an 18-6 edge in first downs.

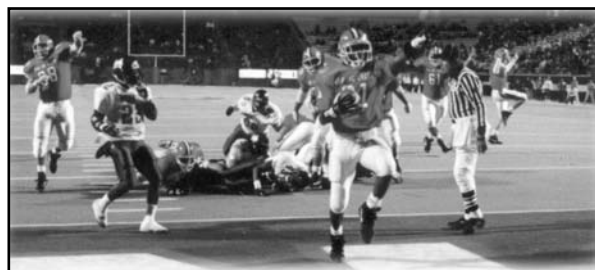
In the second half, it was Nevada quarterback Chris Vargas' turn. He had engineered six Nevada comeback victories in three years coming off the bench, including an NCAA-record 35-point comeback against Weber State.

Nevada scored three touchdowns in the third quarter with punts of five and seven yards by BG setting up the first two scores. The Wolfpack's third score was set up by a high snap from center on a BG punt.

Nevada finally took the lead with 12:41 left in the game and looked to possibly put the game away with a field goal with 7:13 left, ending their run of 31 unanswered points.

Bowling Green then moved to the Nevada six-yard line before turning the ball over on downs. After holding the Wolfpack to one first down, Nevada punter Steve Lester had the center snap go through his hands setting up the Falcons at the Wolfpack 15-yard line with 1:45 remaining.

A 12-yard Erik White to Mark Szlachcic connection on first down put the Falcons on the three-yard line. After two runs and a pass did not net any yardage, White found Dave Hankins alone in the back of the end zone on fourth down with 22 seconds left. Placekicker Brian Leaver made the PAT for the winning points and BG's second consecutive bowl win.

Northwestern took away Bowling Green's running game. So Josh Harris beat the Wildcats through the air. Harris passed for 386 yards and three touchdowns to lead Bowling Green to a 28-24 victory over Northwestern in the Motor City Bowl. It was the first postseason meeting ever between school's from the MAC and Big Ten.

Bowling Green took the lead for good on Harris' 3-yard touchdown pass to Cole Magner with 4:06 left. Harris, who also ran for a TD, set a Motor City Bowl and BGSU record for completions with 38 in 50 attempts. It also marked the third fourth quarter rally for BGSU against a Big Ten squad (Northwestern in 2001 and Purdue in 2003). Magner also set a game record for catches, finishing with 12 for 97 yards and two touchdowns.

Jason Wright ran for 237 yards on 21 carries and finished with 336 all-purpose yards for Northwestern. He had a 77-yard TD run - the second-longest run in Motor City Bowl history - to give the Wildcats a 17-7 lead early in the third quarter and an 88-yard kickoff return early in the fourth to set up Noah Herron's 2-yard touchdown run that made it 24-21.

Bowling Green used two 80-yard scoring drives to take a 21-17 lead early in the fourth. Harris threw a 7-yard TD pass to Magner, and put the Falcons on top with an 11-yarder to Steve Sanders.

Northwestern opened the scoring on Herron's 40-yard fourth-down run in the first quarter, and made it 10-0 on Brian Huffman's 31-yard field goal. Bowling Green answered with a 67-yard drive, capped by Harris' 4-yard run.

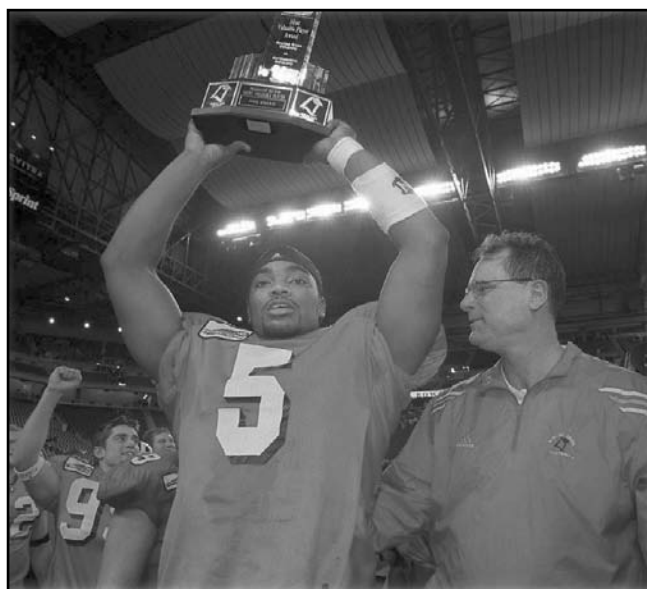

Omar Jacobs went from Bowling Green's question mark to the Mid-American Conference's latest star quarterback. Jacobs capped a marvelous sophomore season by passing for 365 yards and five touchdowns to lead

the Falcons to a 52-35 victory over Memphis in the GMAC Bowl.

The Falcons (9-3) turned a shootout into a blowout after leading 35-28 at halftime to win their fourth consecutive bowl game. Jacobs got them started with four first-half touchdown passes - two apiece to Charles Sharon helped carry them the rest of the way. Pope ran 28 times for 151 yards and a pair of 1-yard touchdowns. He also caught a 13-yard pass for the only score of the third quarter. The Tigers (8-4), playing in back-to-back bowl games for the first time, couldn't keep up with the nation's No. 4 offense, which totaled 558 total yards.

Jacobs, whose 41 touchdown passes led the nation and set a Mid-American Conference record, completed 26 of 44 passes with an interception to earn Most Valuable Player honors. If his first season as a starter is an indication, he's in line for the kind of prolific career of former MAC quarterbacks such as Byron Leftwich and Ben Roethlisberger. He used a number of rollout passes to counter a blitzing Memphis defense - a la Roethlisberger in last year's GMAC Bowl. At halftime, the teams seemed poised to take aim at the 2001 GMAC Bowl, the highest scoring bowl game in history with 125 combined points for Marshall and East Carolina. The offenses stopped themselves early in the third quarter. Jacobs threw only his fourth interception of the season to give the Tigers the ball at Bowling Green's 41. Memphis tried to go for it on fourth down but was twice penalized for having 12 men on the field. Bowling Green made it 42-28 on the ensuing possession with Pope slipping underneath for a 13-yard touchdown catch on third-and-7. The Tigers then squandered another trip across midfield when a scrambling Wimprine fumbled the ball and Bowling Green's Mike Thaler recovered 31 yards behind the line of scrimmage to set up a field goal. Even the weather worked in the offenses' favor, however, with a driving rainstorm subsiding a few minutes before kickoff to clear the way for Jacobs and Wimprine to go to work. They took full advantage. Jacobs capped his four-touchdown half with a 17-yarder to Sanders, who reached over defensive back Cameron Essex in the end zone with 37 seconds left.

Not surprisingly, it was a night for offensive records. Jacobs set the MAC record with his 41st overall touchdown rushing or passing in the first quarter, adding four more. He also joined Roethlisberger and Leftwich as the league's only 4,000-yard passers. The Falcons also set the MAC record for scoring average in a season.

Hurricane Paul Smith and the nation's top-rated offense turned a little charity into a lot of history in the GMAC Bowl.

Smith had his NCAA-record 14th consecutive 300-yard passing game, and Tulsa converted four fumble recoveries into first-half touchdowns on the way to a 63-7 win over Bowling Green in the 2007 GMAC Bowl.

With all that help, the Golden Hurricane (10-4) ran up a 35-0 halftime lead and capped coach Todd Graham's first season by reaching 10 wins for the first time since 1991.

Smith passed for 312 yards and five touchdowns. He broke the record of 13 300-yard efforts in a row he shared with BYU's Ty Detmer, whose streak stretched over the 1989 and 1990 seasons.

He and Tarrion Adams joined Houston's David Klingler and Chuck Weather- spoon as the NCAA's only 5,000-yard passing and 1,000-yard rushing tan-

dem.

Tulsa outgained Bowling Green (8-5) 562-229 in total yards.

Adams scored touchdowns running, passing and receiving before halftime and ran for 112 yards. Trae Johnson caught two scoring passes.

Bowling Green, which had won four consecutive bowl games, lost three fumbles in its own territory in the first quarter and never recovered.

Quarterback Tyler Sheehan was helped off the field with a left ankle injury with 24 seconds left in the first half and didn't return. Sheehan passed for 141 yards and ran for another 21.

Still throwing the ball despite the large lead late in the fourth quarter, the Golden Hurricane became the first team in NCAA history to have a 5,000-yard passer, 1,000-yard rusher and three 1,000-yard receivers. Smith came in needing 247 yards along with 45 yards receiving from Charles Clay, who reached the milestone with several catches midway through the fourth quarter and finished with 11 for 69 yards.

The Mid-American Conference had won five of six GMAC Bowls before the Falcons' fall.

Down 42-0, Bowling Green got on the board when Roger Williams scored on a 78-yard kick return early in the third quarter for the Falcons' only points. It was the first kickoff return for a touchdown in the history of the GMAC Bowl.

Despite the loss the 2007 season was a very impressive one for the Orange and Brown, who finished the year with an 8-5 record, matching Central Michigan for the most overall wins in the conference.

The Falcons, who were picked to finish fifth in the East Division finished MAC play with a 6-2 record, finishing in a three-way tie for tops among the East.

DOYT L. PERRY

1988 College Football Hall of Fame Inductee

The year 1988 will be fondly remembered by many who are associated with the football program at BGSU. That year Doyt L. Perry, a former player, coach and administrator was recognized by the National Football Foundation with its top honor, induction into the College Football Hall of Fame.

Perry traveled to New York in December of 1988 for the Foundation's Hall of Fame dinner and was officially enshrined into the College Football Hall of Fame in June, 1989, in ceremonies held at Kings Island, Ohio.

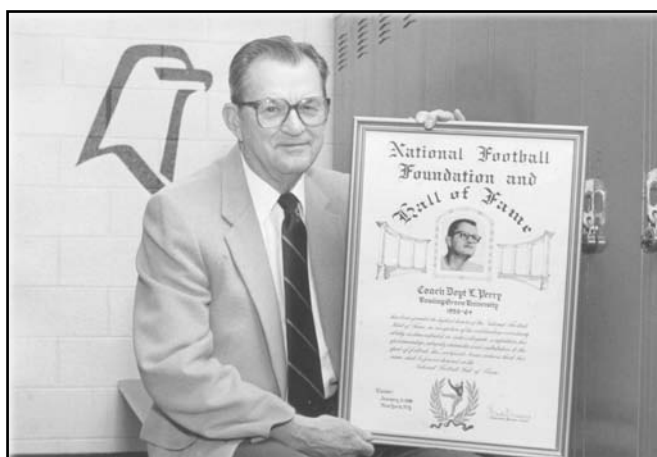
Perry's association with BGSU dates back to the 1920s when he lettered nine times in three sports (football, basketball and baseball). The Croton, Ohio native received his degree in 1932. He began coaching on the high school level before becoming an assistant at Ohio State in 1951.

Perry returned to his alma mater in 1955, leading the football program to a 77-11-5 (.855) record over the next 11 years. His teams won five Mid-American Conference titles and one national college division championship in 1959. Perry's winning percentage ranks fifth on the all-time NCAA list.

Perry, who retired from coaching in 1964 to become BGSU's athletic director, developed such outstanding coaches as Bill Mallory, Don Nehlen, Larry Smith, and the late Dave McClain. Many more of Perry's former assistants and players have gone on to enjoy success in the coaching profession.

Perry passed away in February of 1992. At his memorial service former Michigan coach Bo Schembechler, an assistant on Perry's 1955 staff, said, "I don't believe I can name a coach, anywhere, anytime, anyhow, who did it better than Doyt Perry."

A documentary on Perry's career was released in May of 1998. It was produced by WBGU-TV.

WHY ORANGE AND BROWN?

Orange and brown have been the school colors at Bowling Green State University since 1914, the first year of classes. Legend has it that Leon Winslow, an industrial arts faculty member, got the idea from watching a women's hat on a bus to nearby Toledo, Ohio. He liked the brown and orange color combination. So, too, did former Cleveland Browns' head coach Paul Brown. Following a trip to BGSU in the 1940s, Brown used the colors for his All-America Conference team.

Ay Ziggy Zoomba is Bowling Green's unofficial fight song. Gil Fox, an Air Force bombardier in World War II stationed in Italy, brought a loose translation of a Zulu war chant back with him, and since its introduction in 1946 to a campus spirit assembly, it has kept its place in BGSU history. The Falcon football team traditionally sings "Ay Ziggy Zoomba" after each victory.



SPIRIT & TRADITION



Retired Jersey

The only football jersey ever retired at Bowling Green is #29. It was worn by Paul Miles from 1971-73. Miles rushed for 3,239 yards and 25 touchdowns in his career and was a three-time first team All-MAC selection. He was just the third back in NCAA history to rush for 1,000 or more yards in three consecutive seasons.

Frieda & Freddie Falcon

Frieda and Freddie Falcon are the official mascots of the Bowling Green Falcons. Together with the BGSU cheerleaders, Frieda and Freddie boost spirit at intercollegiate athletic events. Tryouts are held each spring, and winners remain anonymous to the student body until each is "beheaded" at the last home basketball and hockey game. The Freddie Falcon tradition began in 1950 while Frieda Falcon was added for the 1979-80 athletic year.



Why The Falcons?

The 2008-2009 athletic year marks the 81st anniversary of Bowling Green's nickname, Falcons. Before 1927, BG teams were called the Normals or Teachers. Ivan Lake '23 suggested the nickname after reading an article on falconry. Lake, managing editor and sports editor of the Sentinel Tribune in Bowling Green at the time, proposed the name change because it fit headline space and because falcons were "the most powerful bird for their size and often attacked birds two or three times their size."



PEACE PIPE AWARD

The Peace Pipe is a traveling award that goes to the winner of the annual gridiron battle between Bowling Green and Toledo. The Peace Pipe tradition actually began on the basketball court during the 1947-48 season. At that time, the teams exchanged a six-foot long wooden peace pipe. The original basketball Peace Pipe disappeared, so, in 1980, the Peace Pipe was reinstated for football with former UT football player Frank Kralik creating the present trophy. Today's Peace Pipe is a smaller version of the original pipe, resting atop a trophy.



ANNIVERSARY AWARD

The Anniversary Award is a traveling award that goes to the winner of the football game between Bowling Green and Kent State. Established in 1985 by the respective alumni departments at BGSU and KSU, the Anniversary Award commemorates the founding of BGSU and KSU in the year 1910.

DOYT L. PERRY STADIUM



A new video board replaced the original scoreboard at Doyt Perry Stadium in the 2004 season.

Doyt L. Perry Stadium, with its 24,000 seating capacity, is celebrating its 42nd year as the home of Bowling Green State University football. In 2001 permanent lighting was installed at the venue and home attendance doubled. In 2004, a new scoreboard with video capabilities was installed and new FieldTurf and the Sebo Athletic Center were added for the 2007 season.

Built in 1966 for approximately \$3 million as a replacement for the 43-year-old University Stadium, Perry Stadium had a capacity of 23,272 until bleacher seats were installed in both end zones in 1982 (Those bleachers have been removed, to give way for the Sebo Athletic Center, give BGSU the 24,000 current capacity). One of the largest and most attractive athletic facilities in the Mid-American Conference, Perry Stadium set the conference record for single-game attendance.

On October 8, 1983, a huge crowd of 33,527 packed into Perry Stadium for the annual Northwest Ohio rivalry

between Bowling Green and Toledo, establishing a school and MAC record for single-game attendance. The Falcons went on to set a season record, breaking the six-digit figure for five games with a total draw of 100,021. It marked the first time in history that Bowling Green averaged more than 20,000 fans for five home football games.

That figure was topped in 1985, when Bowling Green posted a perfect record (11-0) in the regular season and clinched the MAC Championship by shutting out Toledo at Perry Stadium in November. More than 28,000 fans turned out that day, raising Bowling Green's season attendance to an of 22,422. In 1994, BG fans bettered the mark of 1985 as 114,802 fans, an average of 22,960, attended the five home games.

In 2003, Falcon faithful attended sellout games against Northern Illinois and Toledo as ESPN broadcast three games live from the facility and brought its weekly college football show, Gameday, to Bowling Green.

That year, BGSU averaged more than 21,000 per home game.

Perry Stadium is more than just a football facility. The east side of the stadium includes locker rooms, equipment and training rooms, along with the Athletic Department offices. The west side received a face-lift 12 years ago. A physical fitness center/weight room opened its doors to all intercollegiate athletic teams in the summer of 1988.

Sitting atop the press box on the west side of the stadium is the plush Stadium Club. The Stadium Club's 106 theatre-type seats, which are all sold, provide loyal BGSU fans with the best view of the game. The President's Box, located at the top of the east side of the stadium, provides luxury seating for the University President and his guests, along other supporters of Falcon football.

The construction of elevators on both sides of the stadium, completed in early 1998, has made the stadium more accessible for all fans. Renova-

tions to all boxes on both sides and the stadium club have taken place over the last few years making for a more "fan-friendly" atmosphere. Bowling Green won the first game ever played in Perry Stadium, defeating Dayton, 13-0, on October 1, 1966. Since that time, the Falcons have won over 67 percent of their home games, compiling a 139-64-6 record in the 209 games played at Perry Stadium.

In the event that a BGSU player does not hold a record, the top Falcon performance is also listed.

Perry Stadium is named in honor of the man who led Bowling Green to a 77-11-5 record in his 10 years as the head coach of the Falcons. Doyt L. Perry was simply one of the greatest football coaches of his day. His .855 winning percentage over 10 seasons in the 1950s and 1960s remains one of the highest in football history. In fact, Perry is fifth all-time behind Bob Reade (Augustana), Knute Rockne (Notre Dame), Frank Leahy (Notre Dame), and Larry Kehres (Mount Union) in winning percentage among coaches with at least 10 years of service on the collegiate level. Perry served as the BGSU athletic director for seven years (1965-71) after stepping down as football coach.

DR. CAROL A. CARTWRIGHT **Interim President, Bowling Green** **State University**

In a career distinguished by innovative teaching, pioneering research and national leadership, Dr. Carol A. Cartwright earned a place among the most highly respected voices in higher education. Dr. Cartwright will serve as interim president at BGSU in

2008-09.

She became Kent State University's 10th president -- and the first woman president of a state university in Ohio -- in March 1991. Dr. Cartwright retired as president in June 2006 and accepted a one-year contract to ensure a smooth leadership transition. Prior to her career at Kent State, she was vice chancellor for academic affairs at the University of California at Davis and dean for undergraduate programs and vice provost at The Pennsylvania State University.

In more than 15 years as president, Dr. Cartwright oversaw one of the nation's largest university systems. Kent State's eight campuses serve more than 33,000 students from throughout Ohio and the nation, and from 100 countries. One of the largest employers in Northeast Ohio, the university employs more than 4,600 full- and part-time faculty and staff.

Under Dr. Cartwright's leadership, student success became Kent State's top priority; many mutually beneficial partnerships were forged with businesses, schools and other universities; the status of teaching and public service was elevated; academic programs were launched in a wide range of high-demand and emerging fields; the university pioneered technologies that enhance teaching and learning; enrollment increased in quantity and quality; building and celebrating diversity became an institutional priority; new collaborations and exchanges connected Kent State to every corner of the world; the university constructed 21st-century facilities from residence halls to research labs; and Kent State successfully completed its first, major fund-raising campaign.

Dr. Cartwright held prominent leadership roles on higher education's most influential national organizations, chairing the board of directors of the American Association for Higher Education and serving on the boards of directors of the American Council on Education and the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges. She chaired the National Collegiate Athletic Association Executive Committee and served as a member of the NCAA's board of directors. She also served on the executive board of the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education; the Center for Research Libraries board of directors; and the American Council on Education Commission on Women in Higher Education. She currently serves on the

board of directors of the American Association of Colleges and Universities; the national board of the First Ladies' Library; the board of trustees of the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars; the Knight Commission on Intercollegiate Athletics; and the National Public Radio board of directors.

Dr. Cartwright was a leading member of numerous regional and statewide civic and economic-development organizations, including the Greater Akron Chamber, the Northeast Ohio Council on Higher Education and NorTech. She co-chaired the Ohio Technology in Education Committee, which developed Ohio's master plan for educational technology from preschool through graduate school. Her participation in initiatives to improve Ohio's economy includes past service on the Governor's Commission on Higher Education and the Economy and continuing membership in the Ohio Business Development Coalition. Dr. Cartwright also remains on the boards of directors of four companies with headquarters in Northeast Ohio: KeyCorp and PolyOne Corporation of Cleveland, FirstEnergy Corp. of Akron and The Davey Tree Expert Company of Kent.

The scope of her contributions to higher education led to Dr. Cartwright's induction into the Ohio Women's Hall of Fame in her first year of eligibility. She received Distinguished Alumni awards from the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater and the University of Pittsburgh; the Clairol Mentor Award in Education; the YWCA Greater Cleveland Women of Achievement Award; the Northeast Ohio ATHENA Award; and the March of Dimes Franklin Delano Roosevelt Humanitarian Award for Excellence. After announcing her retirement as president, she was honored throughout the region, state and nation, including recognition in the form of resolutions of appreciation from the Ohio Legislature and the U.S. Congress. She was awarded the title "President Emeritus" from the Kent State University Board of Trustees. In addition, the Auditorium Building on the university's Kent Campus was named "Carol A. Cartwright Hall" in her honor.

Dr. Cartwright earned master's and doctoral degrees from the University of Pittsburgh and her bachelor's degree from the University of Wisconsin at Whitewater.

She and Dr. G. Phillip Cartwright have three children, the youngest of whom is a Kent State graduate, and two grandchildren.

DR. ED WHIPPLE



Dr. Edward G. Whipple joined the Bowling Green State University staff in July of 1994, and continues a 25-year career in higher education administration.

As Vice President for Student Affairs, he is responsible for the overall administration of nearly every area of student life at BGSU and a variety of programs, including intercollegiate athletics, counseling, cooperative education, career services, health, disability services, multicultural affairs, recreational sports, golf course, ice arena program, residence life, Greek affairs, student life programs, student publications, the Bowen-Thompson Student Union and University Dining Services. Dr. Whipple coordinated the BGSU athletics department ten-year self-study review, in anticipation of the successful NCAA program evaluation visit in February of 2006.

Dr. Whipple is an adjunct associate professor in the Division of Higher Education and Student Affairs in the College of Education and Human Development.

Dr. Whipple graduated with a degree in English and French from Willamette University in Salem, Oregon. After earning a master's degree in English from Northwestern University, he taught high school English and French in Chicago and Reedsport, Oregon, in addition to coaching swimming and track. In 1978, he enrolled in the college student services administration doctoral program at Oregon State University. He received his doctorate in 1981 and his first student affairs position was Greek affairs coordinator at Iowa State University, where he supervised the activities of 48 fraternity and sorority chapters.

In 1982, he was named associate dean of students and assistant professor of education and a member of the graduate faculty at Texas Tech University. In 1985, he became dean of students at the University of Alabama-Tuscaloosa, and taught in the Department of English.

Prior to coming to Bowling Green, Dr. Whipple was vice president for student affairs at Montana State University-Billings; that institution's first V.P. for student affairs. While there, he was given the challenge of reorganizing the student affairs area at Montana State, a university of 3,800 students. In addition to managing the student affairs program, Dr. Whipple was also an associate professor and taught courses in both the School of Liberal Arts (English literature) and the School of Education (teacher preparation).

He has written articles for student affairs journals, texts, and monographs and is affiliated with several professional organizations. He has held leadership positions at the regional and national level in the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators (NASPA). Currently, he serves as President of NASPA's Foundation Board and is also a member of that organization's Journal Board. He currently serves as Chair of the Council on Student Affairs of the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges. He also serves on the Northwest Association of

Schools and Colleges as an evaluator for institution accreditation. Dr. Whipple served two terms as President of the Ohio Student Personnel Association. He is the past international President of Phi Delta Theta fraternity and is currently the national President of Order of Omega, the Greek/leadership/scholarship honorary.

Dr. Whipple currently serves on the Woodlane Industries Board of Trustees and is President of the Bowling Green Exchange Club. He has served as President of the BGSU Friends of the Libraries and the Bowling Green Junior High School PTO.

His educational background also includes traveling to France to study the French language at the University de Caen in Caen and graduate work at the Universite Catholique de l'Ouest in Angers. In 1988, he took a special management development program at Harvard University.

Dr. Whipple is the parent of a 20-year-old son, John. He and his wife, Cindy, a member of the Romance Languages faculty at BGSU, reside in Bowling Green.

GREG CHRISTOPHER



Greg Christopher enters his third year as Assistant Vice President of Student Affairs/Director of Intercollegiate Athletics at Bowling Green State University, having accomplished a great deal in his first two years in Northwest Ohio. Christopher, the 12th full-time athletic director in school history, began his duties at BGSU in July of 2006.

Christopher oversees an 18-sport program which has a budget of \$16.5 million and 73 full-time employees. BGSU, which is a member of the Mid-American Conference (MAC) and Central Collegiate Hockey Association (CCHA), is one of 13 programs in the country which sponsor Division I-A

football and compete in men's and women's basketball and men's ice hockey on the Division I level.

A native of West Lafayette, Ind., Christopher has moved the BGSU athletic department forward in multiple areas in his first two years. The Sebo Athletic Center was completed in the fall of 2007, featuring expanded and state-of-the-art sports medicine and rehabilitation facilities as well as a strength and conditioning area for all University student-athletes. The new front entrance for Doyt L. Perry Stadium, the building also houses administrative offices as well as offices and meeting rooms for the football Falcons.

The Sebo Athletic Center is part of \$14 million in new or renovated athletics facilities completed during Christopher's tenure. That facilities list includes the new Keefe Tennis Complex, a renovation to Whittaker Track and the FieldTurf inside Perry Stadium.

Additionally, more than \$44 million are in the works, including an \$8 million renovation to the BGSU Ice Arena and a \$36 million convocation center. The Stroh Center, a brand-new arena for the Falcon basketball and volleyball programs, is scheduled to be completed in 2012. Incremental facility improvement plans are also underway for other BGSU athletics venues.

Athletics highlights of Christopher's two years include three MAC championships, with two in women's basketball and one in baseball. The women's hoops Falcons became the first team in conference history to advance to the 'Sweet 16' of the NCAA Championships in 2006-07, winning a MAC-record 31 games along the way.

In 2007-08, the football program tied for the MAC's East Division title, being invited to the GMAC Bowl. The bowl bid was the program's third in five years. The women's basketball Falcons won the MAC regular-season title for an unprecedented fourth consecutive season, advancing to national postseason play – also for the fourth-straight year – with a trip to the WNIT. The baseball team tied for the MAC regular-season crown, while the women's soccer team advanced to the championship match of the MAC Tournament for the fourth time in five seasons.

In the classroom, the Falcons have flourished, as the number of student-athletes with a GPA of 3.0 or above has increased in each of the last two years. In 2007-08, BGSU student-athletes cracked the 3.0 barrier for cumulative GPA as a group, and no fewer than 184 BG student-athletes had a GPA of at least 3.0. The student-athlete graduation rate is greater than the overall student body's graduation rate.

Christopher implemented the Falcon Leadership Academy, a leadership development program for BGSU student-athletes. Christopher, along with several other administrators in the athletics department, serves as an instructor for the class, which represents each of the department's 18 varsity sports.

Christopher's background in fundraising and development has been evident in his first two years at BGSU. There have been double-digit percentage increases in the external funding areas, including development, corporate marketing, licensing and concessions. Christopher has furthered the department's logo transition and integrated an external communications plan.

Christopher came to BGSU after spending nearly a decade at Purdue University in his hometown. He served as Associate A.D. for External Relations and John Purdue Club Director at Purdue University. Christopher, who had been at the school since 1997, was a member of the department's senior staff. He served in that position since March of 2005 and was accountable for external and revenue-related areas for Purdue's \$50 million department. In his role, he oversaw several areas, including development, marketing,

promotions and advertising, athletic licensing and sports information.

Under his leadership, Purdue raised \$17.2 million in total giving for Athletics in his final year there. He also played a significant role in a seven-year campus-wide capital campaign which was on track to raise \$111 million for Athletics during that period. Projects that came to fruition in that time frame include tripling the number of endowed athletic scholarships and several facility additions or renovations. Among the facility projects were an indoor golf training center, football stadium renovation, aquatic center, indoor tennis center, and basketball video board campaign. He also was the advisor for Purdue's chapter of Athletes-in-Action, and served a period of time as the sport administrator for Purdue's men's and women's tennis programs.

He began his career on the Boilermaker staff as Assistant Director of the John Purdue Club, and was promoted to Director in 1999 and to Assistant A.D. in 2002.

Christopher served as Executive Director for the Society of Professional Journalists in Greencastle, Ind., from 1994 to 1997 after joining the organization in 1991 as its Marketing and Development Director. During that time, he managed a staff of 15 and a \$1.6-million budget for the nation's largest not-for-profit journalism organization. His tenure focused largely on external relations, fueling growth that doubled the net worth of the foundation and association. He also improved relations with SPJ's 250 local chapters and national volunteer leaders and negotiated contracts and corporate partnerships.

Prior to joining SPJ, Christopher was an Account Executive at WWV-FM in Charlottesville, Va., from 1988-90. In that capacity, he designed and managed station promotions, including partnerships with the athletics program at the University of Virginia. He also was part of the "Page Program" at NBC in New York in 1988 where he served as a research analyst, assisting the Manager of Sports Programming and Market Analysis in research of television sports. Christopher also produced network sports tracking reports and surveys of major league sports.

He earned a bachelor's degree in Mass Communication from MAC-member Miami University in 1988 and earned his MBA from the institution in 1991. He played football for one season before the former linebacker's career was cut short due to injury. In 1987-88 and 1990-91, Christopher was involved as a television color commentator in football and play-by-play voice for men's ice hockey which aired on regional cable television and WPTD-TV in Dayton. He also served as a graduate assistant in the Office of Admissions at Miami in 1990-91.

Christopher is a member of the Mid-American Conference's External Relations Committee, and is the women's basketball administrative chair. In the spring of 2008, he was appointed to the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee.

Christopher, 42, is married to the former Tina Smith of Leetonia, Ohio. The couple has a son, Zachary, 12, and two daughters, Megan and Allison, ages 10 and 8.

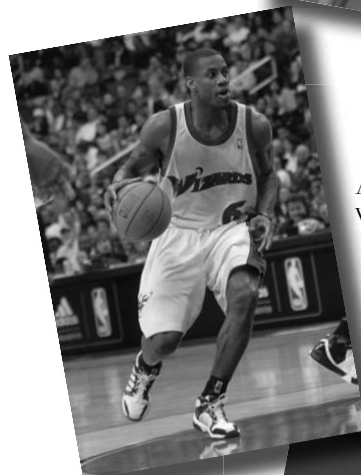

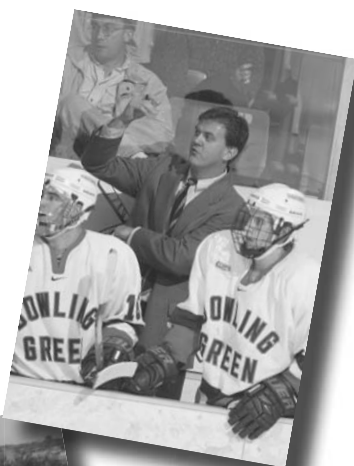

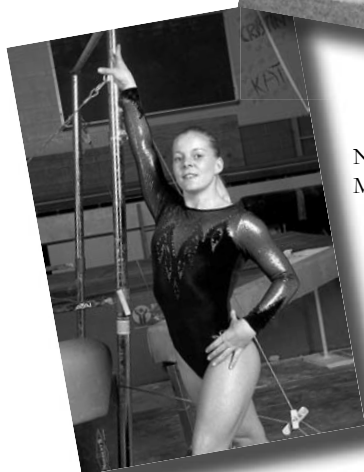

FALCONS COMPETE ON A NATIONAL LEVEL IN THE ACADEMIC AND ATHLETIC ARENAS

- BGSU was one of five colleges and universities chosen nationally to receive the 2007 CHEA Award for Institutional Progress in Student Learning Outcomes by the *Council for Higher Education Accreditation*.
- The *Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching* recognizes BGSU for its curricular engagement with the community. The foundation, which uses national data to classify higher education institutions, created the elective classification in 2006. Only four other U.S. campuses received the curricular engagement designation, defined as "teaching, learning and scholarship that engages faculty, students and community in mutually beneficial and respectful collaboration."
- The *Princeton Review* says BGSU's MBA program is among the nation's best. The MBA program ranks fifth among schools providing the greatest opportunity for minority students, according to the 2008 edition of the Review's "Best 290 Business Schools."
- BGSU is among a select number of universities with "programs to look for" in the 2008 edition of "America's Best Colleges", published by *U.S. News & World Report*. This year, the University was cited for its first-year experience programs and learning communities. In addition, BGSU's supply chain management program climbed in the national ranking to a tie for 16th place. Other nationally known academic programs include college student personnel, photochemical sciences, popular culture, applied philosophy, policy history, musical arts, demography and sport management. Additionally, the cooperative education program ranked among the top 10 percent nationally.
- Teacher education programs at BGSU are recognized for leadership and innovation by the *American Association of State Colleges and Universities*.
- BGSU is the home of the John P. Scott Center for the Study of Neuroscience, one of the first interdisciplinary research centers of its kind in the United States, and the Center for Family and Demographic Research, which has major funding from the National Endowment for the Humanities.
- BGSU Athletics has received the MAC's institutional academic achievement award three times in the past 13 years posting the highest overall GPA among the league members in 1995, 1996 and 2001. Since 1990, BGSU has seen 35 student-athletes earn Academic All-American honors including a total of 15 since the year 2000.
- At the end of the 2007-08 academic year, BGSU student-athletes boasted an overall GPA of 3.0. In that year, and each of the two previous, the student-athletes' cumulative GPA was at least one-tenth of a point higher than the general student body population.

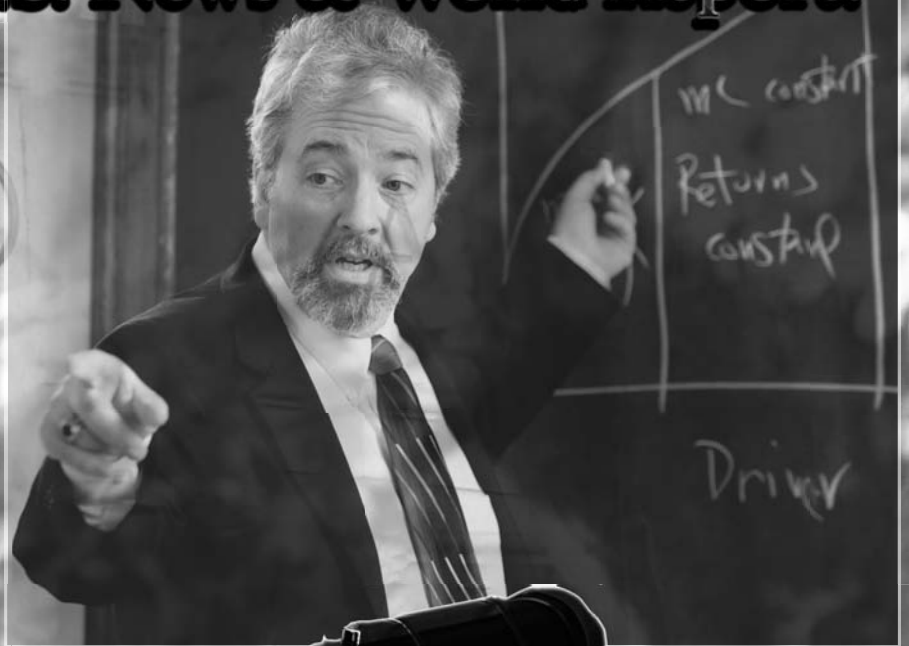

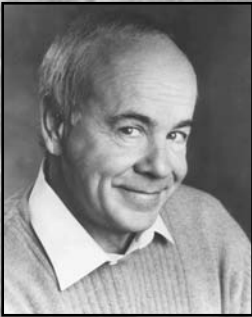

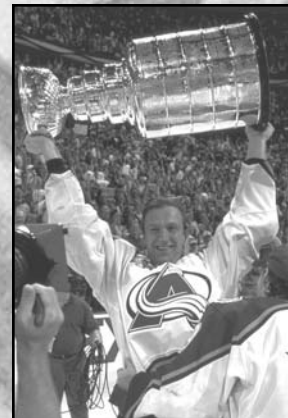

Eva Marie Saint, '46, Academy Award-winning actress, motion pictures include the classics *On the Waterfront* and *North by Northwest*.



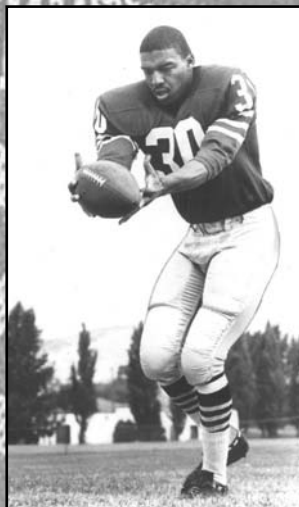
Dave Wottle (1970-73) won the gold medal in the 800 meters in the 1972 Olympics.



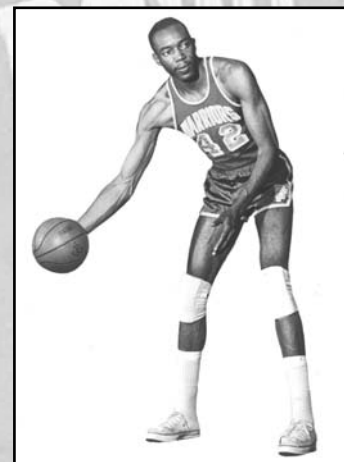
